Following more than three years of hard work, Laker Junior High School has earned its accreditation through the Michigan Accreditation Program (M.A.P.). Laker Supt. Robert Drury and Laker Junior High Principal Dick Pauly traveled to Lansing last Tuesday to receive the accreditation certificate at a special recognition dinner sponsored by the State Board of Education.

Locally, the accomplishment was celebrated with an informal gathering last Wednesday by members of the Laker Junior High staff at Greenfields Restaurant. At that time, Principal Pauly presented the accreditation certificate to Yvonne Bushey, representing the Laker School Board of Education.

**SAVING \$240,000 IN INTEREST COSTS**  
Huron County has successfully completed its 1992 Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund borrowing of \$3 million on a new plan—Commercial Paper—according to Huron County Treasurer Roberta Moetteli. Thanks to some extra office work, the county could save as much as \$240,000 in interest costs on the borrowing, she says. The county's financial consultant, Municipal Financial Consultants, Inc., offered the commercial paper investment option several years ago, and Treasurer Moetteli decided to utilize it. "In the old days we issued notes maturing once a year at a rate of interest set for two or three years. The borrowing rate was always higher than we could get on re-investment, but we had no choice but to invest the money at a loss until we could retire our notes one or two years later." Now, the interest rate is re-adjusted every week. The notes are retired once a month with money collected from delinquent taxpayers, she says. "In fact, I expect to retire as much as \$900,000 of our borrowing on June 11."

# Leipprandt looks forward to teaching retirement

One definition of "retire," according to Webster, is "to withdraw to a private or secluded place."

That's exactly what Virginia Leipprandt won't do when she "retires" as librarian at North Huron High School, where she's been helping students for 17 years. No withdrawing for her, as the Pigeon resident plans to continue her deep involvement in the Laker Board of Education and the Michigan Association of School Boards.

And, Leipprandt says, she just might get re-involved in the Huron County Republican Party.

Her participation in politics took a backseat to school board and MASA activities a few years back, but now with extra time on her hands, it might be the right time to jump back in.

And she just might take the time to learn to play the piano and learn to speak Spanish — two things she's always wanted to do but has never gotten around to.

But first things first. There's

a matter of the Christmas decorations that need to be taken down at home. And a bit of cleaning that's been waiting for awhile—how long, she's reluctant to admit.

But that type of thing hasn't had a priority in Leipprandt's life.

What has been a priority is education, starting in 1958 when she took a job as English teacher and half-time librarian at North Huron. She took the job sight unseen, having never been to the Thumb Area before, as a new

graduate of Central Michigan University.

"I also was tapped to teach girls' phys. ed. and coached basketball in that class," she said. "I wasn't trained for that and I never knew the rules. I still don't."

She lived in an apartment in Bad Axe, and through college friends who were from Huron County, she met her future husband Bruce.

They courted six months before they married in the spring of 1969, "before the spring planting, of course."

She left her job at North Huron in 1960 and didn't return until 1975, two years before her oldest son Larry graduated. During those years, she taught as a full-time substitute at Laker High in 1964 and again in 1969.

"I remember those classes with a great deal of affection," she said.

In 1976, she ran for and won election to the Laker Board of Education, a seat she still holds today.

There's no conflict in being a teacher in one district and holding a board of education seat in another, Leipprandt feels.

"Being a teacher makes you more aware of curriculum and the day-to-day operations of the school," she explains.

Her school board activities and committee meetings take at least two to three evenings a month, and MASA activities mean another couple of evenings. She has served on the board of directors of MASA since 1982.

"The MASA helps board members to become better informed about what they need to do to educate children and operate the school district within the law," Leipprandt said. "It's a service organization that provides support for board members."

Students have changed in many ways since Leipprandt started her career.

"In some ways kids are basically the same, and in other ways they're more sophisticated," she said. "They have opportunities we never had and they're more mobile than we ever were."

"They're brighter in a lot of ways, and most, I believe, have very strong goals." After a good deal of thought, Leipprandt says her contribution to the students she's

known has been her "understanding and a listening ear."

"A librarian has a chance to counsel a lot. I truly believe I saved a child from suicide. It was very frightening, but very gratifying."

She's been teaching a college reading class, made up of seniors. "It's a very small class and on Fridays we have a current topic for discussion. A lot of the kids have brought up the need for communication with parents."

"They have problems just like adults and they all need to be listened to," she said.

Along with all the fine students she's known at North Huron, she'll remember the practical jokes of her co-workers.

She admits she's pretty glib, and friends took advantage of that trait when she was put in charge of a retirement party.

"They told me that the restaurant had burned down. I called the fire department and they didn't know any-

thing about it," Leipprandt says, with a smile.

And those same co-workers, whom she laughingly calls "untrustworthy," have continued to put ads for nursing homes on her desk.

But she admits that the people of the North Huron district have been wonderful and they honored her recently with an appreciation dinner.

Husband Bruce has been supportive of her activities, knowing how much they mean to her. She admits that getting involved in too many things can mean that nothing gets the attention it deserves and she guards against that.

"My mother trained me to get involved," she said. "And she calls herself 'a random person in a linear world. I don't like details and that's a contradiction for a person involved in library science. My activities force me to be disciplined, to pay attention to business.'"

# McGee to grads: 'believe it, achieve it'

For the 32nd year, the strains of "Pomp and Circumstance" greeted the 95 soon-to-be graduates of Laker High School as they filed into the Laker Gym for graduation exercises last Sunday.

And for the 32nd year, the rousing notes of the Laker Fight Song followed the newly-minted grads as they clutched their hard-earned diplomas and marched out of the gym.

Rev. Steve Miller of Salem United Methodist Church, Pigeon, gave the invocation

before Class President Christina Gaeth greeted the hundreds of parents, relatives, friends, the Laker Board of Education and staff and faculty members.

**SALUTATORY:** Salutarian Michel Keefer used his address to the assembly as an opportunity to say "thank you" to the community in which he lived and grew up.

"I'm sure that a large number of school districts, not only statewide, but nationally as well, suffer from a lack of parental and community involvement.

"It is with great pride that I say ours is not one of them," Keefer said.

He also encouraged young students to set high goals for themselves for their school years and their lives. And he exhorted his classmates to find their hidden potential and use it to its fullest.

"Awaken the giant inside of you and overcome life's obstacles. When you do, success will surely follow," Keefer said.

**VALEDICTORY:** Laker Valedictorian Tricia Elston told her classmates that they are beginning a new phase of their lives, but that their education never stops.

"A truly educated person never stops learning," Elston noted. "At school, at work, at home, wherever they are, educated people always seek knowledge."

A diploma is nothing but a sheet of paper with words printed on it, Elston said.

"Only you can demonstrate that you have a mind and can use it. No matter what you end up doing in life, as long as you're learning from it, it's a valuable experience," she said.

**KEYNOTE:** After a performance of "Everything I Do, I Do It For You" and "Wind Beneath My Wings" by the Laker High School Band, guest speaker and 1969 graduate Kathy McGee reminded the graduates that their diplomas weren't just any diplomas, they were receiving Laker diplomas. She praised the Laker teachers, some of which taught

her as she went through high school.

"They've taught you more than you realize. And most of these lessons aren't measured by SAT or ACT scores," McGee said.

**McGee is a teacher** at Flint Powers High School, and coaches basketball at the school. She most recently coached her girls' team to a Class B state championship, and has been honored twice as Coach of the Year by her peers.

She quoted from Robert Frost's poem "The Road Less Traveled," telling the graduates to heed the advice in the poem.

"Be daring and adventurous in your decisions," she said. "You are well prepared to take the road less traveled."

McGee urged the students to use three "C's" in the future—character, confidence, and commitment. "If you believe it, you can achieve it," she said.

After McGee's address, the Senior Choir sang "It's So Hard to Say Goodbye to Yesterday," then High School Principal Lisa DiCamillo presented the Class of 1992.

**FINAL ACTIONS:** Laker Board of Education President Yvonne Bushey then formally accepted the Class of 1992 and Board Vice President Burt Keefer presented diplomas to each graduate as they were introduced.

Rev. DeWeerd Smith of Community Wesleyan Church in Elkton gave the benediction, asking God's blessing on the graduates.

According to John R. Axe, president of Municipal Financial Consultants, Inc., Huron County's current rate of interest on its notes is 3.75% per annum. Contrasted with that, Monroe County sold its notes several weeks ago at a net interest rate of 5.6741% per annum.

**Huron County's** interest costs from May 1, 1992, through July 1, 1993, are expected to be less than \$72,000, while an issue structured like last month's Monroe County issue would have cost \$186,287 through July 1, 1993, a savings of \$114,287.

For the whole life of a Monroe County style issue, Huron County could have paid, through July 1, 1995, \$336,287 while Huron County actually should pay less than \$95,000 in interest on its \$3 million issue.

The combination of lower interest rate—almost 50% lower than Monroe's—and the quick retirement of the note issue will result in the huge interest saving of more than \$240,000.

Moetteli made a complete distribution of all amounts from the Revolving Fund to all school districts and other units of government in Huron County on May 27, with a total of \$3.62 million. The balance of \$662,111 did not have to be borrowed.

Since becoming Huron County Treasurer in 1984, Moetteli has distributed more than \$25.45 million to schools, cities, townships and Huron County from the delinquent tax revolving fund.

### TRAXLER GETS 30 STITCHES...

U.S. Rep. Bob Traxler (D-Bay City) said he was "happy to see the sunrise" Thursday morning, after a mugger jumped him three blocks from the Capitol Building in Washington, D.C. robbed him of \$8 and caused a forehead gash requiring 30 stitches to close.

Rep. Traxler told police he was confronted by a lone assailant demanding money about 1:30 a.m. Thursday, as the longtime lawmaker left a nearby hotel following dinner. Police said he was next to his car when he was struck by his attacker and was "bleeding profusely from the forehead" when they arrived moments later. Police are searching for the robber, and the FBI has joined the search since the crime was committed against a federal official.

He was released from Washington Hospital Center Friday afternoon and was to have the stitches removed Tuesday. "I expect to fully return to my duties sometime next week," he said. "I do not consider my assault experience to be a newsworthy event and I have no further comment," he said in a Saturday press release.

The 60-year-old Representative announced April 30 he would not seek re-election to an 11th two-year term, noting stress and job frustrations. He was elected to Congress in 1974, and his district includes most of the Thumb Area.

### MUXLOW STUDYING RUSSIAN TRADE

One person seeking to replace the retiring Rep. Bob Traxler as the Thumb Area's Congressman is learning about business half-way around the world.

State Rep. Keith Muxlow (R-Brown City) is among 43 Michigan residents studying export and import possibilities in Russia. He and state Agriculture Director Bill Schuette are touring Russia and other former Soviet republics, studying the privatization of agriculture and the food distribution network there. The study mission is part of the People to People International organization, first begun in 1956 by then-President Dwight Eisenhower.

The group is visiting Russian farms and collective farms, ag research centers and ag-industrial complexes.

### BOY IN CRITICAL CONDITION

A 10-year-old Sebewaing boy was listed in critical condition Monday morning in Bay Medical Center, Bay City, following a traffic accident at 6:20 p.m., Friday.

Paul M. Lutz, 10, of 11555 Beck Road, was struck when he failed to stop at the intersection of Sebewaing Road and Caro Road on the east side of the village, said Michigan State Police Bad Axe Post's Sgt. Norm Maeder.

The vehicle which struck the boy, which was registered to Cynthia Lutz, of the same address, was driven by Travis J. May, 16, of Sebewaing. May attempted to avoid the impact, but it wasn't possible, said Maeder.

Paul Lutz is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Lutz.

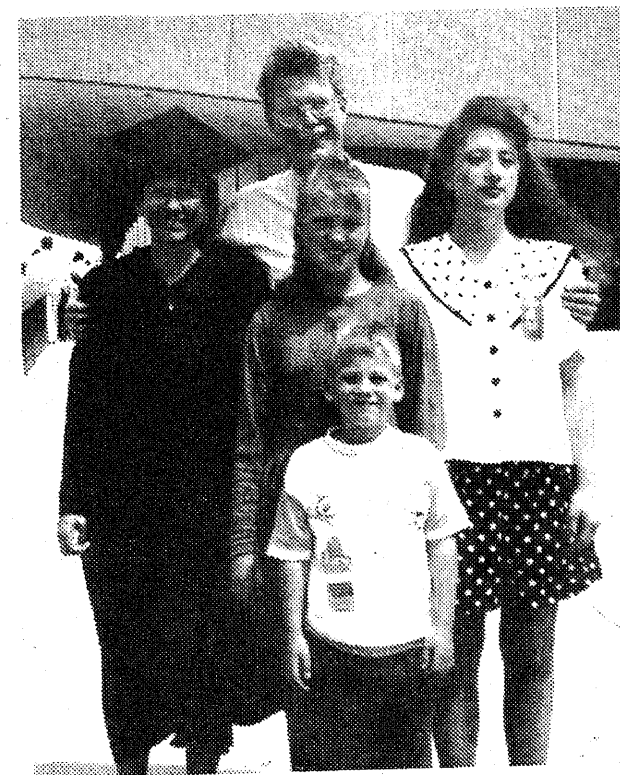

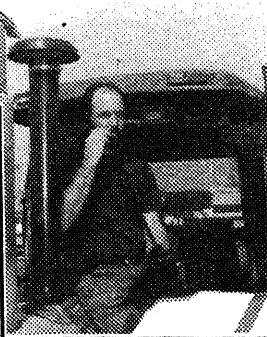

## From Laker student to Congressional Page!

# Liesl Eichler turns the 'page' in her life

When Liesl Eichler begins her junior year of high school this fall, she will be opening up a new page in her life — as a "Congressional Page" in the nation's capitol.

The 16-year-old Eichler was selected by application and interview to spend the fall semester working for Eighth District Congressman Bob Traxler (D-Bay City.)

In her new position, Eichler will deliver correspondence and small packages, answer phones or relay messages from the House floor for Cong. Traxler, as one of only 66 Congressional Pages.

Eichler and her parents, Edwin and Wanda Eichler of Pigeon, attended an afternoon reception on Friday at Saginaw Valley State University, honoring her appointment.

Her selection, instituted by Cong. Traxler to insure objectivity in the competition for Page positions, was overseen by a four-member SVSU faculty committee, chaired by Dr. David R. Weaver, professor of Political Science.

Cong. Traxler, because of his injuries resulting from a mugging incident early Thursday morning in Washington D.C., was unable to attend Friday's reception. Eichler was welcomed by Beverly Presley, who represented Cong. Traxler's Saginaw office.

Coincidentally, Eichler's term as a Congressional Page will end at approximately the same time Cong. Traxler completes his 11th term in the U.S. House of Representatives — in January, 1993.

Cong. Traxler has served as the Eighth District Congressman since 1974 and just recently announced his plans for retirement at the end of his term.

It's likely that Eichler is the last Page to be selected from the Eighth District for many years to come, as only House committee officials with years of seniority have Pages working for them in their offices and on the House floor.

For Eichler, being a Page has been a dream she has carried with her since the eighth grade.

That was the year she decided to pursue a future career in political science, and her activities at Laker Junior and Senior High School have all been directed towards that goal.

Her interest in politics was especially piqued when she participated in Student Congress in Lansing last fall — helping to write bills, debate bills through House and Senate Committees and writing joint bills, as well as working with lobbyists with 150 students from throughout Michigan.

Eichler, who is used to carrying a long list of extra-curricular activities on top of advanced college-bound academics, should thrive on the busy schedule of a Congressional Page.

Her day at the Page School will begin each weekday at 6:45 a.m. and her Page duties will begin when Congress convenes in the Capitol at noon. A Page's work day ends at about 5:30 p.m.

Pages may study independently or contract to do additional work in a specific course which could qualify them for credit in an honors course.

Pages must maintain at least a 2.75 grade point average while attending Page School. For Eichler, who now carries approximately a 3.95 GPA, keeping up with academics while in Washington shouldn't pose much of

According to Laker High School Principal Lisa DiCamillo, she plans to help Eichler design an independent

study course that will allow her to use her on-site government experience. "I'm confident Liesl will thrive in her new environ-

ment as a Page in the nation's capitol. She is very independent and has achieved all the goals she has set for herself thus far."

## Named 'Female Athlete' at Caro

Laker trackster Wendy Russell continues to break records at track meets, and at the Thumb Meet of Champs in Caro, Russell was named the Female Athlete of the Meet.

She won three individual events, the 100- and 200-meter dash, plus the long jump as well as running a leg on the first place 400-meter relay team.

Her record-breaking performance came in the 200-meter dash, as her time of 26.30 broke the record of 26.33 set by Janet Frank of Frankenmuth in 1981. Russell's time in the 100-meter dash was 13.0 and she cleared 5'2" in the high jump.

Her teammates in the 400-meter relay were Wendy Osentoski, Dawn Shuart and Sherry Elenbaum, and their time for the win was 51.8.

Other wins and places by Laker tracksters included a third in the shot put by Kim Sturm (34'4"). Reggie Ignash was second in the boys' shot put (48'4"), and he was third in the long jump (19'5"). Bob Blome finished third in the shot put (48' 1 1/2").

At the state finals Saturday, Russell finished 7th in the 100 meter dash with a time of 13.60. She also ran on the 400

A Page's job is not without its rewards. In addition to the experience of working alongside law-makers and seeing the political process at work, Pages are also financially compensated for their efforts.

A Congressional Page typically earns \$900 per month, \$300 of which will pay for housing and a meal plan at the Page Residence Hall, located two blocks from the Capitol.

And you can't put a price on the experience. Eichler is hoping that being a Congressional Page will help her in her pursuit of a Political Science degree from a major university when she graduates from Lakers in 1994.

She's also looking forward to the challenge of being on her own in a city like Washington D.C.

While Eichler will be living among lots of people she doesn't know, she has relatives who make their home nearby, including her great-uncle Keith Geiger, whose office as president of the National Education Association is in Washington D.C.

Eichler is only the second Congressional Page ever to be selected from Huron County.

Lori Shemka of Bad Axe traveled that path before her when she was selected for a Page position from September, 1989 through January, 1990.

## U.S. Senator Carl Levin makes stop at Bad Axe

Huron County Democrats and Chairman Roy Reynolds hosted a visit from U.S. Senator Carl Levin last Wednesday in Bad Axe.

County officials, Bad Axe Mayor Fred Kalis, local business people and both Democrats and Republicans discussed county, local and national issues, including Michigan unemployment, users boat fees, loans to foreign countries, wetlands act, small business loans and help for rural hospitals.

Sen. Levin agreed that the U.S. needs a fair Agricultural Exportation Policy, because U.S. ag products are discriminated against in foreign markets. He has also been involved in the Great Lakes Protection Act, hoping to clean up the Great Lakes.

Sen. Levin noted that Michigan has higher standards than many neighboring states, which causes Michigan to be a more expensive state in which to conduct business.

He also remarked that this presidential election may find the U.S. in a position it hasn't been in since 1824, when the House of Representatives had to elect the President because there was not a majority win.

Andrew Jackson won the largest share (a plurality, but not a majority) of the popular votes: 151,174 or 40.3% of the total.

Jackson's nearest rival, John Quincy Adams, received 113,122 votes or 30.9%. Ninety-nine of the 261 electors then voted for Jackson, again a plurality, but far short of the Constitutionally-required majority.

The election was thus sent to the House and, early in 1825, it elected Adams to the Presidency.

The popular vote winner has failed to win the Presidential three times, in 1824, 1876 and 1888.

Sen. Levin did not declare support for any Presidential candidate, but said the same situation may happen again in 1992. The emergency of Independent Party candidate H. Ross Perot as a third presidential hopeful could deprive either the Republicans or Democrats of a vote majority in the Electoral College, even though one may win the popular vote majority.

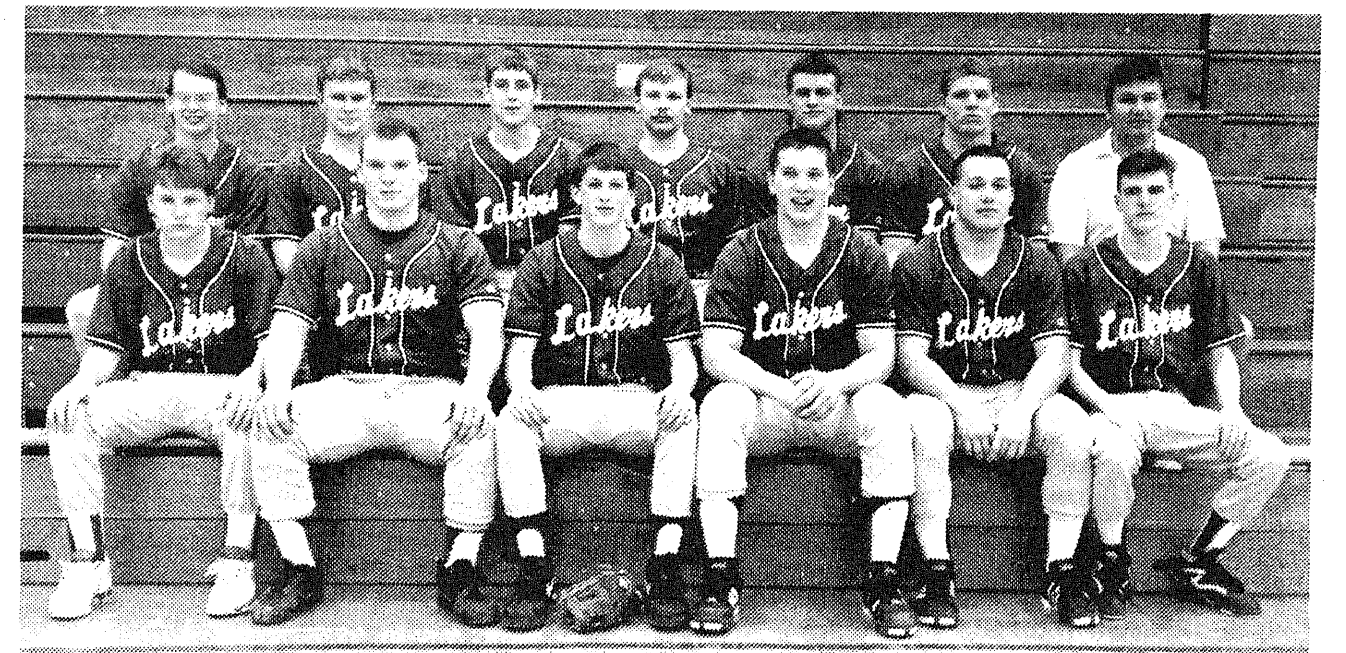

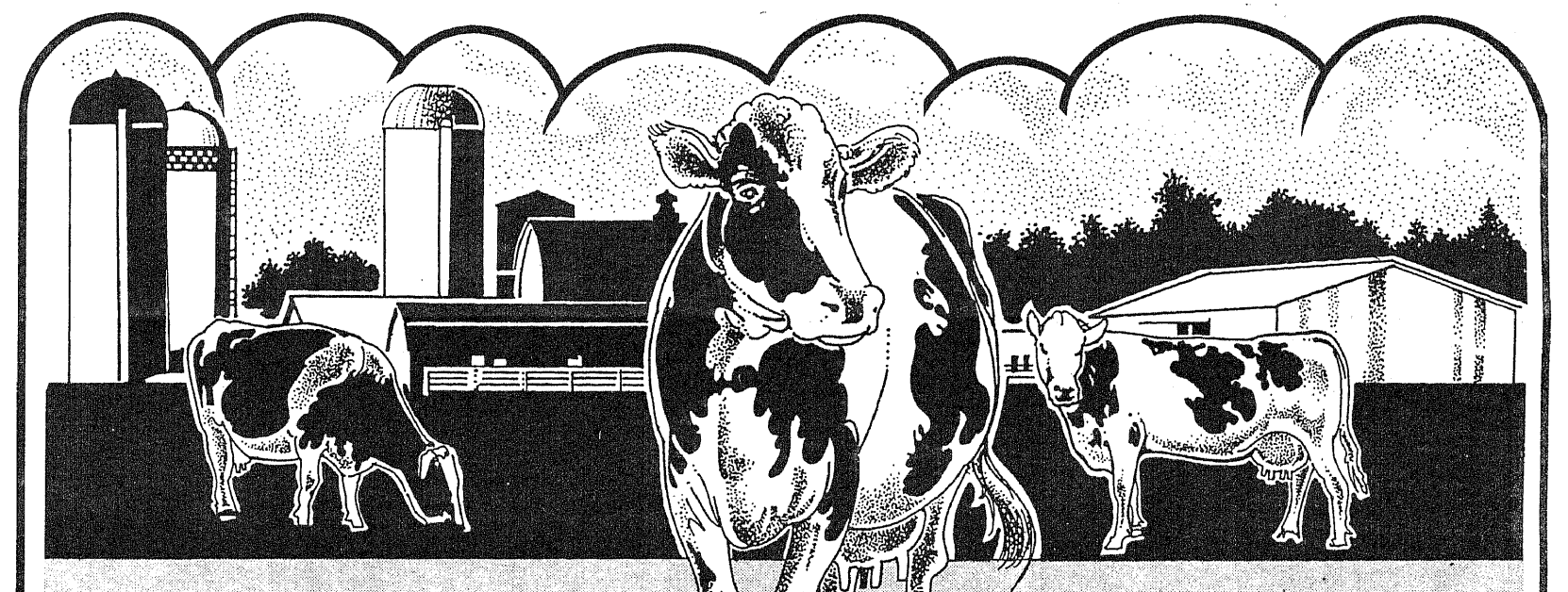

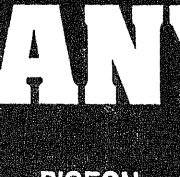

# Love of quilting passes down the generations

The craft of quilting isn't going to die out if 97-year-old Amanda Error of Pigeon has anything to say about it. She's helping two great-granddaughters learn how to piece quilt blocks and recently she took them through the intricacies of how to tie and bind a quilt.

The great-granddaughters, Mindy and Kelly Collison, 12 and 11 years of age, got training in sewing from their grandmother, Dorothy (Collison) Rummel of Pigeon, who had a lifetime of quilting training from her own mother, Mrs. Error.

Rummel helped the girls learn to sew by drawing pic-

tures—or tracing them out of coloring books or newspapers. Using simple snowman, gingerbread boys, Christmas trees or similar pictures, she traced them on 6x6-inch cards, then punched holes at half-inch or quarter-inch spaces in the outlines.

Next she had the girls learn to poke their needles with colored yarn into one hole and bring it up through the next.

She also taught them to tie knots and learn cross-stitching.

Recently, the girls' younger sister Loren started her first basic "lessons," often using

the same cards her sisters had practiced with four to five years ago.

After the girls finished their blocks, Great-Grandma Error pieced the squares and sewed them into a quilt top. She also sewed together a quilt bottom, and stretched it onto her quilting frame which has been rounded and smoothed through many decades of turning and tightening.

In her career, Error records having made 104 quilts. One of them was made in 1940 for her daughter, Dorothy, in one of the basic patterns she has used many times.

Rummel, a surgical nurse at Scheurer Hospital in Pigeon, made up a sewing box for each of her three granddaughters. Each box includes many colors of embroidery cotton, a pin cushion, three needles, a thimble, a small scissors and embroidery books in small and medium size to be handled by small hands.

Her daughter-in-law Terry Collison, also a nurse at Scheurer Hospital, watches for colored threads and cloth swatches that the quilters can use in their productions.

Great-Grandma Error and Grandmother Dorothy discovered long ago that one good way to help keep the girls' interest is to let them use their own favorite colors in quilt blocks and piecings. They also collect their favorite animals or comic characters for quilt subjects.

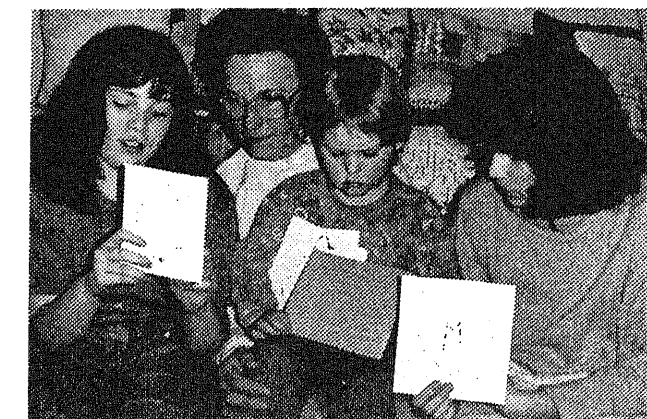
Farm animals rate high on their list of choices as their dad Allen Collison is a farmer. Interest in the quilts keeps the whole family inquiring and alert to find favorite, suitable subjects.

Although approaching her 98th birthday later this year, Great-Grandma Error retains good eyesight and easy mobility. She attends church regularly, visits relatives and friends, and has a good appetite.

"I'm lucky," she says, "because I can eat everything and I'm interested in news and TV programs."

She has another interest, too — quilting. She concludes that as long as she can help her great-granddaughters learn about piecing and quilting, she intends to devote the necessary time to give them a craft they can enjoy throughout their lives.

"Maybe this is a good way for them to remember their great-grandmother, too," she declared.
