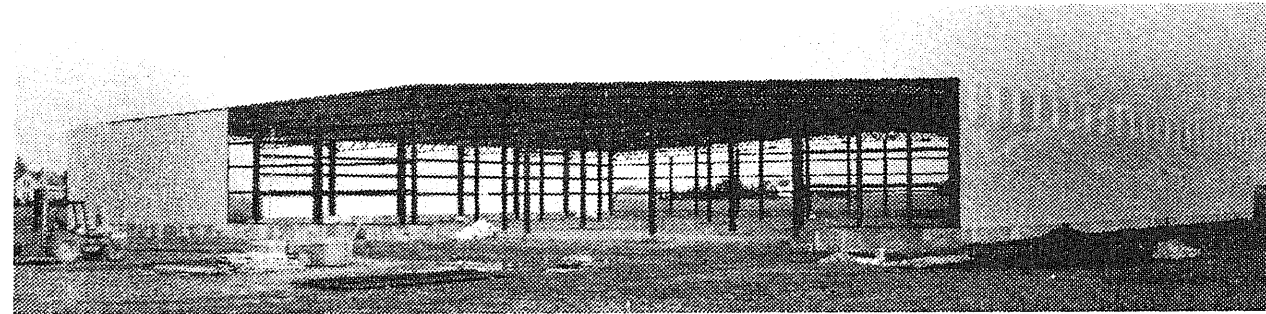

THE LIVING WILL

Efforts have been made to allow for beneficent euthanasia - pulling the plug when there is no hope - in spite of inherent legal difficulties. The first state to pass legislation addressing this issue was California in 1977. This bill provides for the patient to sign a statement expressing his desire not to have his life artificially maintained should there be no reasonable hope of his recovery. This "living will" has no relationship to and should not be included in a last will and testament.

The living will must be signed not more than five years before the life-threatening situation arises. There are specific legal safeguards (e.g. witnesses, provision for revocation) to protect the patient from the designs of unscrupulous relatives anxious for the inheritance.

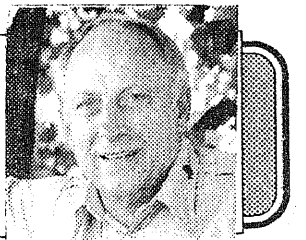
If the patient is conscious and capable of actively participating in the process, then all others involved bear less of the responsibility. If the patient is not conscious, then the signed statement serves as the conveyance of his or her wishes.

Woods & Waters

HEROES

Someone once said, "Life without heroes would be a bore indeed." I totally agree! However, sometimes we tend to worship them for the wrong reason.

Movie stars, rock performers, and athletes seem to lead the list for young America. Perhaps it is our insatiable desire to have it all, and have it now, that propels us to idol worship these types. In essence, we want to be like them.

However, not all heroes have such notoriety. In fact, many of them go unnoticed during their lifetime, and only are raised to the hero status long after their death. Some of my favorites fit this category.

Aldo Leopold, a man before his time, has sometimes been called the "father of conservation". He was born in 1887, two years after my Dad, and died in 1948 at the age of 61.

He lived in an era when men viewed the land and all it produced as a commodity to be owned and used to the fullest. Aldo thought differently, and now, 40-odd years after his death, conservationists the world over, view his thoughts and writings on the subject as the gospel.

He joined the forest service in 1909, was one of the founders of the Wilderness Society, founded the profession of game management, and died while fighting a brush fire to protect the trees and the land he loved so much.

I was given a copy of his biography recently. A scholarly work that will surely make sense out of the vast array of documents attesting to his life.

But, until I get a chance to absorb it, I still refer to his classic work entitled "A Sand County Almanac" as

the best reference to his life. Aldo was a college professor and later a high ranking official in the field of conservation in the state of Wisconsin.

However, his famous book comes from notes made while trying to reclaim a sandy farm in northern Wisconsin that was his weekend retreat.

If you love the emotional aspects of the out of doors, you must read "A Sand County Almanac". If you don't believe me, listen to the forward written by the author.

"There are some who can live without wild things, and some who cannot. These essays are the delights and dilemmas of one who cannot.

Like winds and sunsets, wild things were taken for granted until progress began to do away with them. Now we face the question whether a still higher "standard of living" is worth its cost in things natural, wild, and free."

My second hero is the former outdoor writer for the Milwaukee Journal, Gordon MacQuarrie. Gordon, like Aldo, was a man before his time and died prior to becoming the guru of all outdoor writing gurus.

MacQuarrie was famous for

his make believe organization called the Old Duck Hunters' Association of which his father-in-law was the president, and he, the only other member.

Gordon entered the outdoor writing profession when it was at a low ebb and through articles that included both information and entertainment, vaulted to a high degree within his profession.

After his death, his manuscripts were formed into several books. The first, "Stories of the Old Duck Hunters and other Drivel" was quickly followed by "More Stories of the Old Duck Hunters."

The chapters are mainly about duck hunting and trout fishing, with a few deer tales thrown in.

The President, referred to as Hizzoner, is knowledgeable, cantankerous, and lovable. He is always right and proves it on each hunting or fishing trip.

The stories are laced with a conservation and hunting ethic theme while providing the best outdoor reading ever.

Just before I finished this article I took a short break and flipped through the TV offerings.

Stopping momentarily on the MTV channel, I watched Michael Jackson prance

across the top of a car while he smashed the windows with a sledge.

In my book, he just can't compare with Aldo and Gordon.....

Keim's model a labor of love

classic Mustang about four years ago when he found out one was for sale locally, then adds that it sat in his garage for over a year before he was able to do any restoration work on it.

"Terry Shetler and Keith Stalter from Bay Shore Collision really helped me do a job on this one," says Gascho. Major work was painstakingly done to restore the car to mint condition, and Gascho admits he'd still like to restore the engine, "but that's in the future."

No less painstaking was the work Keim did to put Gascho's Mustang features into miniature for his classic model.

All the car parts were painted before assembly — the same burgundy color

sported by Gascho's "real life" model.

Because the car model didn't have a driver's side door that would open, Keim fashioned his own hinge out of tiny parts from his workshop.

All the interior was intricately painted and "interior designed" for authenticity.

And Keim's miniature engine is the envy of Gascho,

who has dreams of his own Mustang's "inner works" being shiny and new like the model's. "I painted fish wire black to look like real wires," explained Keim.

He "souped up" the standard motor included with the kit originally, and added more chrome to match the best offered in the 1960s.

While this Mustang model took more time than some of

the other dozen or so models Keim has worked on in recent years, Keim sees value in his work far beyond just having a completed model at the end.

In his work as a social worker and pastor, Keim often uses his models as an "ice breaker," especially when he counsels young men.

"It's a common ground we can start with," explains Keim. "Many of these men are so self-conscious coming into my office for counseling that talking about models 'warms them up.'"

It also helps them remember some of the feelings they had in high school and younger, because many feelings felt by young men have to do with cars and power.

It also helps Keim in dealing with younger people, too. "Oftentimes when a child comes to me for counseling, we'll put together a model and it gives that child help in learning how to follow directions correctly and see a positive result.

Often those feelings can directly carry over to situations at home and school where following directions will yield positive results," explains Keim.

Girls, too, can relate to model-building.

"Once I counseled a young lady who was grief-stricken over the death of her brother in a drowning accident. He had been working on a real Mustang at the time of his death. Her grief problem became so serious that she could no longer function on a daily basis," says Keim.

"So each of us bought a Mustang model and completed it in our own time. By the time we had completed our models, I had given her time to work through her grief.

"Then she wrote a letter to her deceased brother, buried it at her brother's gravesite and her pastor and the funeral director were there to help her through."

While most model work is not taken as seriously as in the situation above, Keim's model hobby is one he takes seriously at home as a way to relax and unwind around his family.

He and his wife Joyce have two sons, Bryan and Darrin and a daughter, Christa and all have dabbled in model-making at some time, although Bryan seemed to enjoy the hobby the most.

Keim is already talking about building another model for next year's Auction, saying "Bluewater Youth for Christ has done so much for my children and my family, it's a way I can give back to them."

It should be noted that this program was originally scheduled for later in the series and a Singspiration with Daleand Floris Wertz was planned for July 15. That program will be on July 29.

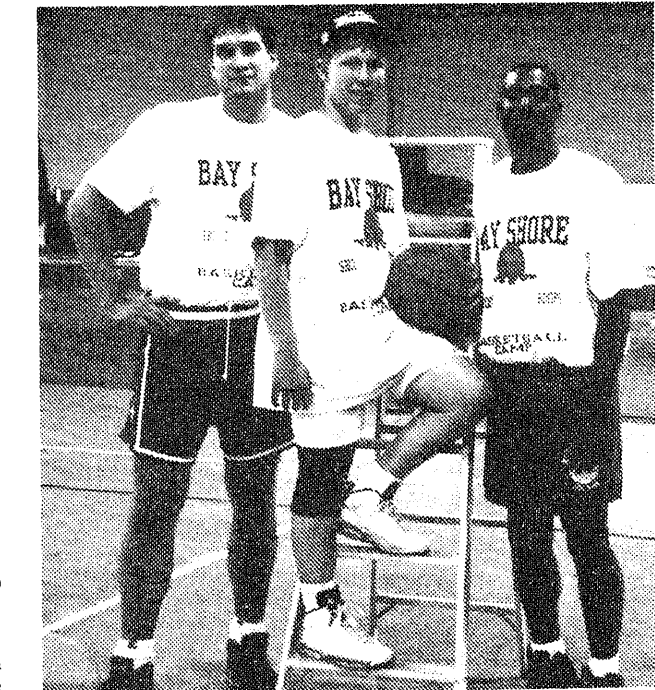
