

# Mustang model gifted to Gascho at YFC Benefit Auction!

Dwight Gascho of Pigeon was able to "drive his model 1965 Mustang home," thanks to the generosity of an auction bidder at last Saturday's Bluewater Youth for Christ Benefit Auction held at the Pigeon Recreation Park.

While Gascho and Don Faupel got into the spirit of bidding for the replica model that Wayne Keim had hand-crafted especially for the auction, Faupel held out for a \$100 bid, then turned around and gave the senti-

mentally-valuable car to Gascho.

"I had to stop bidding when I knew I couldn't afford to go higher," said Gascho, touched by the gift from YFC Board Member Faupel.

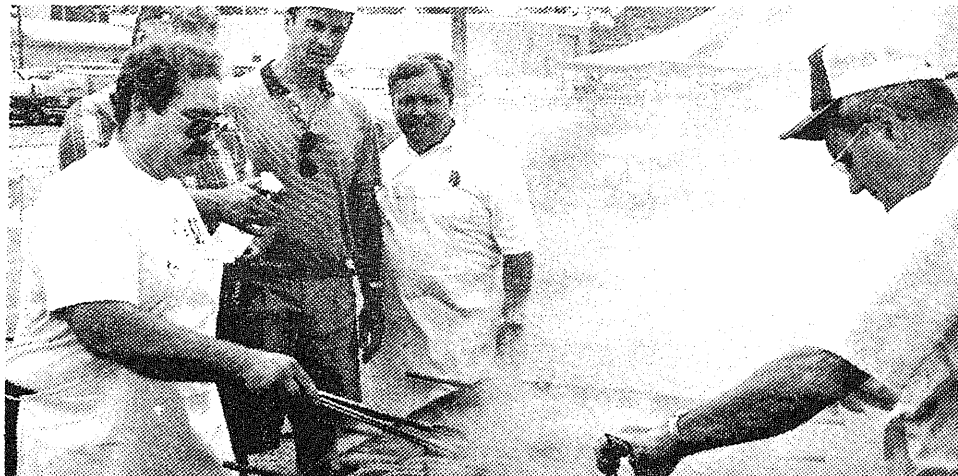
That \$100 bid was just one of hundreds of bids offered by auction-goers at the YFC benefit, which brought over \$30,000 in net profit to the organization.

While YFC Executive Director Ken Smeader says there were fewer actual auc-

tion items this year, he says that certificates for events and products went over very well and brought in substantial donations.

A suite at a Red Wings game, donated by BASF/Inmont Corp. arranged by Scott Meyersieck, brought in \$1,050 and the Detroit Lions VIP Package was sold for \$675.

Dinners also went well, according to Smeader, with auction bidders purchasing themed meals at area homes.

And certificates, like for 50 gallons of gas at the Village Qwik Stop and 50 t-bone steaks from Luke's Supermarket in Sebewaing were also popular on the auction block. A donation of 300 ears of corn by the Pigeon IGA for YFC concessions added to the diversity of offerings, from sales to baked goods to refreshments.

Quilts once again drew a lot of interest, including one made by former Pigeon resident Elmira Chrisner which sold for \$1,000. Other quilts brought in over \$800 apiece.

On a traditional note, a utility barn built by Dwight Gascho, Ken Smeader, Steve Fletcher and Dale Killinger sold for \$1,000 — and Smeader admits he could have sold half a dozen of the barns if they could have been built in time for the auction.

And it wasn't Katie Albrecht's peanut butter pie, but it was a peanut butter pie nonetheless, and it fetched \$230.00 from a hungry bidder.

This year's Benefit Auction helped brighten YFC's end-of-the-year financial picture, enabling the non-profit organization to start off the school year in September in a better cash position.

Smeader met with the YFC Board of Directors last Thursday and an increased budget of \$246,000 was unanimously approved for the 1992-93 fiscal year.

YFC plans to add at least one full-time and one part-time staff member and will be working in the Cass City and Akron-Fairgrove school systems during the coming school year.

# This YFC project was 'for the birds!'

This Bluewater Youth for Christ auction item really was "for the birds." A total of 100 wren bird houses were crafted and sold at last Saturday's YFC Benefit Auction, bringing in \$1500 from an original "investment" of only \$25.

Peggie and Ted Leipprandt of Pigeon originated the idea of building bird houses back in January and earmarked \$25 out of \$100 in seed money they were given from a generous Bluewater Youth for Christ donation.

Herman Rathke of Pigeon then donated the lumber needed for the project and John Kleinfeld put his talents to work in planing the wood.

Gil Wichert of Pigeon cut out the birdhouse design in the wood and then Leon Swartzendruber helped nail the 100 birdhouses together.

Once the birdhouses were actually constructed, hours of work in painting and decorating remained.

Peg Leipprandt coordinated the efforts of Tina and Vic Lewandowski who helped her paint the houses, then turned the project over to

"decorators" Mary Ann Thick, Ivougn Depner, Gale Anderson and Marlene Shetler and herself.

"The birdhouses were really a popular item, even before the auction," says Leipprandt. Ted took a birdhouse with him to a Detroit Edison Board of Directors meeting and ended up selling eight of them, including one to retiring Edison CEO John Lobbia.

County merchants even got into the spirit of the birdhouse project, providing many of the needed materials. The Mill End Store and Stein-Walker Decorating Center in Bad Axe, as well as Elftman Hardware and Universal Printing in Pigeon, were generous with their giving of supplies, according to Leipprandt.

The Leipprandts used the remaining \$75 of the seed money given to them to purchase certificates for bushels of apples available to auction bidders last Saturday.

"We 'only' doubled YFC's money with the apples," says Leipprandt with a chuckle. "We '60-timed' the investment put into the birdhouses!"

Auxiliary, Alpha Omicron Pi Sorority and, the YWCA Foundation Board of Governors. She also helped organize the Hurley Medical Centers Auxiliary.

She is survived by her daughter, Rita M. Johnston of Flint; a grandson, David M. Johnston of Flint, sisters-in-law Grace Biondi of California and Berenice Gordon of Flint, brother-in-law, Kent MacGregor of N. Carolina and several nieces and nephews.

Mrs. MacGregor was preceded in death by her husband, Delbert M. MacGregor in 1967 and one brother and two sisters.

# Top walleye winners earn Caseville's tourney prizes

Manuel Thies was the Grand Prize winner in the Caseville/Budweiser Walleye Contest, sponsored by the Caseville Chamber of Commerce.

Thies of Owendale, weighed in the largest walleye, at 10.02 lbs. He pocketed \$1,000 for his fishing efforts, along with another \$50 for the largest fish in the daily contest.

Second prize of \$500 went to Judy Schweitzer of Sebewaing, with a walleye weighing 9.90 lbs. Third prize of \$250 went to Brian Stock of Sebewaing, with a fish weighing 9.84 lbs.

Jerry Adams took home \$125 for his fish weighing 9.84 lbs, and Dennis Young was fifth with a walleye weighing 9.79 lbs.

Prizes of \$25 each went to the sixth through tenth place winners. They were, along

with the weights of their fish: Al Rundell, 9.52 lbs.; Tom Wichert, 9.42 lbs.; Jim Jaworski, 9.39 lbs.; Roland Dutcher, 9.37 lbs.; and Art Britt, 9.24 lbs.

Daily winners were awarded \$50 for the largest fish caught each day of the contest.

George Willoughby was Monday's winner, with a 8.28 lb. fish; Ken Wares was Tuesday's winner, at 8.68 lbs.; Thies was Wednesday's winner, with the top-prize winning fish; Rundell, at 9.52 lbs. was Thursday's winner, and Friday's winner was Adams with a fish weighing 9.84 lbs.

According to contest organizer Gene Poirer, over 120 anglers entered the contest this year, and the best fishing was six to eight miles northeast of Charity Island.

# Here's candidate line-ups for Primary Election on Tuesday

The Tuesday, August 4, primary election in Huron County may bring some sweeping changes as incumbents face challenging newcomers.

Incumbent District 1 Commissioner Bruce W. Kuhl, of Sebewaing, a Republican is challenged by Democrat Gerald Elston of Unionville, but the real decision will come in November.

District 1 covers Sebewaing, Fair Haven and Brookfield townships.

In the redesigned District 2, there is no incumbent because R. Dale Wertz who represented that district now covers District 3.

In District 2, the two candidates are Republican Gary

V. Krug of Bad Axe and Democrat David J. Jaroch of Ubyly. District 2 covers Grant, Sheridan, Bingham, Paris, and Sherman Townships.

Republican R. Dale Wertz of Bay Port is the lone candidate for District 3, which covers Caseville, McKinley and Winsor townships.

District 4 will see the most action during elections as four newcomers vie for Julia Heilig's former post.

The candidates are: Republicans - Edward F. Draves Jr., Bad Axe; Frederick W. Duggan, Bad Axe; and Alvin L. Long of Bad Axe against the lone Democrat, Orville Liedke, of Elkton. District 4 covers Chandler, Colfax, Meade, and Oliver townships.

Huron Races

A heated race is on for the Huron County Sheriff's badge, as incumbent Sheriff Michael L. Gage, a Republican from Kinde, is challenged by former Sheriff Richard V. Stokan a Republican from Bad Axe.

The winner will go on to November elections unopposed.

Incumbent Huron County Prosecutor Leslie A. Hagen, a Republican from Port Austin, is challenged by attorney Douglas J. Lee, a Republican from Bad Axe. That winner also will go to November elections unopposed.

Incumbent Treasurer Roberta Moetteli, a Republican from Elkton, is chal-

lenged by Republican Kenneth Gay of Bad Axe. The winner will go to November elections unopposed.

Incumbent county Clerk Helen M. Lemanski, a Republican of Port Austin is unopposed in her bid for reelection. Incumbent Registrar of Deeds Frances L. Holdwick, a Republican from Harbor Beach, also is unopposed in her bid for reelection.

Incumbent county Surveyor Russell L. Brown, a Republican from Harbor Beach, is unopposed in the primary.

Caseville Twp.

Incumbent Republican Joseph Cilic is challenged by newcomer Democrat Harold

Lankey for the supervisor position.

Incumbent Republicans Clerk Rose Marie Spies and Treasurer Margaret Barton are unopposed in their bids for re-election.

Incumbent trustees Gale Schwalm and Jerry Cilic are challenged by Democrats Velja Cullen, Michael Quinn, and Charles Kirk; and by Republicans Jack Hopkins, Mike Power and Elwood Smith.

Chandler Twp.

Incumbent Republicans Supervisor William Renn, Clerk Kevin Roedel, and Treasurer Connie Herford are unopposed.

Incumbent Republicans Frederick Renn and David Tait are unopposed in seek-

ing re-election to their expiring trustee seats.

Voters in Chandler Township will decide on a proposal of 2 mills for 9 years to improve township roads.

Fair Haven Twp.

The position for supervisor in this township is up for grabs as incumbent Republican William Forge is challenged by former supervisor Melvin Kuhl.

Incumbent Republican Rhea Dutcher Walden is challenged by Democrat Peggy Kuhl for treasurer.

Democrat newcomer Frank Shivley is challenging incumbent Republicans Orin Engelhardt and Danny Terrian for their expiring

### PLAYING THE GLOBAL GAME

Barcelona, Spain has front and center attention in our family room as we gather round the television for the highlights of the Twenty-Fifth Olympiad each evening.

We've never seriously considered the satellite dish that would allow us to touch base with the world of cable television, so our dose of Olympics has to come us via network evening broadcasts, rather than in the constant recital of cable offerings.

From the snatches of opera that Europeans love, to the drama of a flaming arrow lighting the Olympic torch, we enjoyed the pageantry of the opening ceremonies. But after one evening of highlights, I could see again the slant that the U.S. puts on the games.

The announcers obviously and understandably favor the U.S. athletes. While there were some very good vignettes of athletes from other countries, the emphasis is on the USA. I have no argument with showcasing US athletes. That's the way things should be when watching US television.

My argument is with the underlying assumption that the games are only about winning. The so-called "Dream Team," the USA basketball team isn't even staying in the Olympic Village where athletes from all over the world are housed. Detroit Free Press columnist Mitch Albom reported that the Dream Team is enjoying the comforts of expensive hotels and missing out on the camaraderie of getting to know people from all over the world in a day to day living situation that the Olympic Village provides.

The Olympics, begun in 776 B.C. and revived in 1896, bring together the youth of every country. French educator, Baron Pierre de Coubertin, in reviving the games in the late 1800's, felt that youth and athletics go together. He saw athletic competition as a natural approach to international understanding.

Here in the 1990s we tend to talk more about "global awareness" than "international understanding." We wear shoes made in Korea and watch the Olympics on Japanese made television sets while sipping our Colombian coffee. Very much a part of the global economy, we Americans (NORTH Americans, that is) lean toward a nationalistic isolationism that clouds our attempts at understanding the world beyond the fifty states.

Would it be better for all athletes to be housed in one common village at Barcelona? Would it be good to hear Spanish broadcast as the primary language of these games

I heard one kid ask his mother what a calf was and she said "a baby cow." I still think that the best place to raise a family is on the farm, or at least out in the country.

I was up town in Pigeon to see the children's parade and enjoyed it very much. When I was little, they didn't have such a thing.

But I do remember when World War I came to an end, the whole school marched. I was around eight years old and there was no pavement on Pigeon's streets. But they walked us all over town. Even some country schools took part and a Civil War veteran led the parade.

John Murdoch was town president and he had a pair of cymbals to pound with and Fred Neibel beat a drum. Some ladies dressed like Red Cross nurses also marched and they had a platform in front of the Ford garage (which is now Diener's furniture store) and a speaker really laid the law down.

In Proverbs 10:5 it says "he that gathereth in the harvest is a wise man, but he that sleepeth in harvest is a son that causeth shame."

Well, the stuff don't grow very well in this cool weather. But it's not fall yet and I've been around for quite a while and never saw a complete crop failure yet.

## SYNOPSIS OF VILLAGE OF CASEVILLE ORDINANCE NO. 92-5

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING THE EDITING AND INCLUSION OF CERTAIN ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS AS PARTS OF THE VARIOUS COMPONENT CODES OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR THE ADOPTION OF NEW MATTER IN THE UPDATED AND REVISED CODIFIED ORDINANCES; AND REPEALING ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS IN CONFLICT THEREWITH.

### THE VILLAGE OF CASEVILLE HEREBY ORDAINS:

Section 1. The editing, arrangement and numbering or renumbering of the following ordinances and resolutions and parts of ordinances and resolutions are hereby approved as parts of the various component codes of the Codified Ordinances of the Village, so as to conform to the classification and numbering system of the Codified Ordinances.  
(A full listing may be obtained by contacting the village office.)

Section 2. The following section of the Codified Ordinances is new matter in the Codified Ordinances and is hereby approved, adopted and enacted:

1048.13(a)(12)

Section 3. All ordinances and resolutions or parts thereof which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of the new matter adopted in Section 2 of this ordinance are hereby repealed as of the effective date of this ordinance except as follows:

(a) The enactment of such sections shall not be construed to affect a right or liability accrued or incurred under any legislative provision prior to the effective date of such enactment, or an action or proceeding for the enforcement of such right or liability. Such enactment shall not be construed to relieve any person from punishment for an act committed in violation of any such legislative provision, nor to affect an indictment or prosecution therefor. For such purposes, any such legislative provision shall continue in full force notwithstanding its repeal for the purpose of revision and reclassification.  
(b) The repeal provided above shall not affect any legislation enacted subsequent to April 1, 1992.

Section 4. If any section, clause or phrase of this ordinance is declared to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof other than the part so declared to be invalid.

Section 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 6. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and cause the same to be published as required by law.
