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Thumb Weekly News Round-Up

HURON ELECTION RESULTS

All Huron County elected incumbents were re-elected in last Tuesday's Primary Election and generally face little opposition in November's General Election.

A modest 32% of Huron County's registered voters cast ballots, said Clerk Helen Lemanski, among the 23,702 persons registered.

HURON COUNTY SHERIFF Michael Gage of Kinde defeated his Republican challenger, former Sheriff Richard Stokan of Bad Axe, by a three-to-one margin, 6216 to 1497. Gage, who first won election in 1988 when Stokan did not run, said he was pleased with the results and somewhat surprised by the wide margin.

No Democratic candidate is on the November ballot for sheriff. The Huron County Sheriff earns \$38,025 annually.

HURON COUNTY PROSECUTOR Leslie Hagen of Port Austin won re-election by a two-to-one margin over Republican challenger Douglas Lee of Bad Axe, 5070 to 2377.

She and supporters worked hard to win, she said, and did much door-to-door campaigning and community work. For instance, she pitched in to help bread fish at Bay Port's Fish Sandwich Weekend recently.

Hagen, who was first elected prosecutor in 1990, is paid \$51,000 annually. She has no Democratic opposition this fall.

HURON COUNTY TREASURER Roberta Moetteli of Elkton was re-elected by defeating G.O.P. challenger Kenneth Gay of Bad Axe 4009 to 3198 votes.

Moetteli's support generally came from the northern and western areas of the county, and she said she is grateful for the support she was given. She looks forward to serving them another four years, Moetteli said. She has been working in the Treasurer's Office for 19 years, including the past eight years as Treasurer.

She has no Democratic opposition in November.

OTHER HURON CANDIDATES elected in uncontested Republican races are:

■ County Clerk Helen Lemanski received 6038 votes and is unopposed in November;

■ County Register of Deeds Frances Holdwick received 5999 votes and is unopposed, and

■ County Surveyor Russell Brown received 4748 votes and is unopposed.

AREA, REGIONAL RACE RESULTS

Incumbent Republican State Rep. Dick Allen (R-Caro) came within a whisker of losing his 84th District seat, but defeated G.O.P. newcomer Julia Heilig of Ubyly 4148 to 3291. The new district includes all of Huron and nearly all of Tuscola County.

Allen and Heilig each carried their home counties, but the difference of victory was barely 93 votes — and Heilig is evaluating whether to seek a recount of some of all of the districts.

Rep. Allen, who has held the post for 10 years, said challenger Heilig's campaign was "aggressive" and noted Tuscola County voters did not turn out in large-enough numbers, as Huron voters did.

In the Fifth Congressional District race, former State Sen. James Barcia (D-Bay City) defeated fellow newcomers State Sen. John Cherry of Clio and Don Hare of Saginaw. Barcia gathered 27,130 total votes in the 10-county district, versus 16,919 for Cherry and 14,665 for Hare.

Barcia gathered 846 votes in Huron County, Hare got 261 and Cherry had 245. He also carried Tuscola, Bay and Arenac Counties, while Cherry won Genesee, Lapeer, Alcona and Iosco Counties. Hare, former Staff Assistant to the retiring Cong. Bob Traxler (D-Bay City), took Saginaw and Sanilac Counties.

Republican State Rep. Keith Muxlow (R-Brown City) won his party's Fifth Congressional District race, earning 19,767 votes versus 10,578 for Joseph Mellendorf of Caro and G. Stewart Francke of Saginaw with 7181.

Elkton AutumnFest starts Sept. 4

There's only a few weeks left until the last big holiday weekend of the summer, and with Labor Day comes the last big festival of the year in Huron County, the Elkton AutumnFest, set for Sept. 4-7.

Along with the old favorites, there's some new events to pique the interest of Fest visitors, organizers say.

There's a pitching contest for baseball fans that starts on Friday evening and continues all weekend.

This year's AutumnFest runs Friday, Sept. 4 through Monday, Sept. 7

All day Saturday, hoopers will compete in the AutumnFest 3-on-3 Basketball Tournament. There's brackets for all ages, and teams under age 14 get a break in entry fees.

Deadline for entries is Aug. 21, according to organizer Dan McIntosh, and entry blanks are available at stores all over Elkton and Huron County.

All day during the tournament and through the teen dance, volunteers at the Huron Youth Center will sell pop, hot dogs, nachos and chips.

There's also a polka dance featuring the Tenbusch Brothers Band planned for the adults.

Another new event is the pie social on Saturday at the Civic Center, with delicious fruit pies available whole or by the slice.

After the parade on Saturday, a memorial service is planned for Lt. Col. Roy Keyt, who died when his F-16 collided with another jet in the skies over Oliver Township in March.

At the Hitching Post Inn will be a show of quilts and collectable hobbies, featuring the collectables of several local residents.

Other new events include a puppet show at the Youth Center, and the Pushcart Races on Sunday afternoon. Those pushcarts are simply four wheels and a chassis, with one kid to steer and one to push.

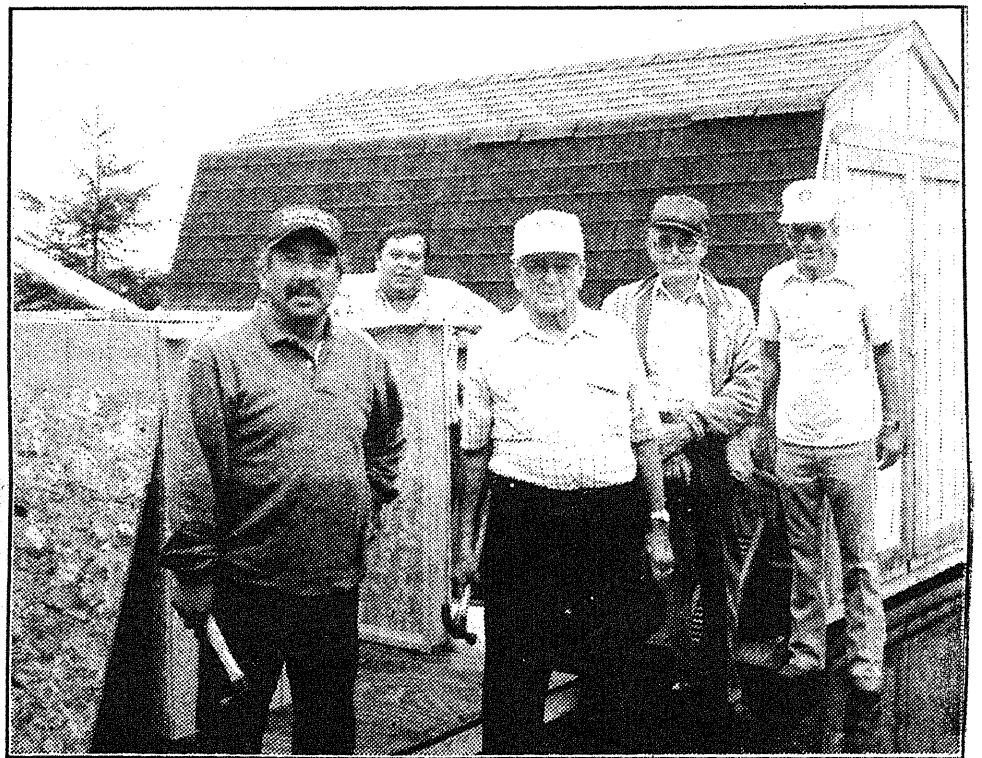

in the rear meeting room of the Pigeon District Library. A recap of the '92 Festival will be presented, and various volunteers are invited to provide ideas and input.



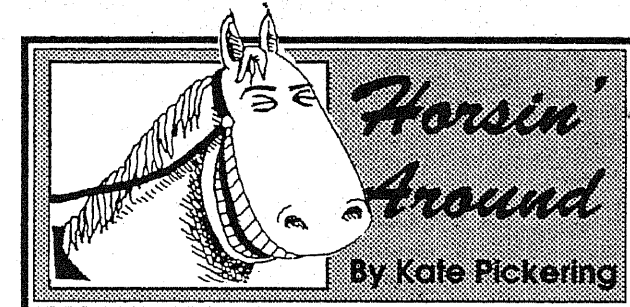

RECOLLECTIONS Of By-Gone Days BY GEORGE KEIM. Includes a small portrait of George Keim.

DEAR EDITOR: When we older men get together we like to talk about the old days. Some were very good and some weren't. There aren't too many of us who can talk about what happened 50 years ago but I can go a little farther than that.

If you drive around the county you can see a lot of big old barns. When I was a young man those big barns were always surrounded with a big barnyard with a lot of cows and pigs and always several nice big horses, and there always was a big driving shed.

That's what they called the machine shed and we always hauled in our grain and beans and got our neighbors together and trash them.

When we got at it usually it was pretty hot when we thrashed our grains and we had every door and window open to get in all the air you could. Some people don't know it but only two men out of 10 fork right-handed and it seemed that everywhere we thrashed it took a right-handed man to feed the machines or put it down on the feeding table.

I am a right-handed forker and some times I would fork left-handed for a while till they got started. So I didn't have to feed the machine.

Once I didn't have to feed but I had to push it out on the table. We were thrashing the bearded barley and I got itching with the beards and the man had some pigs in the barn and it was very hot and I never thought pigs could smell too bad.

MICHIGAN'S FINE FRUIT is always admired by my mother this time of the year. We'll be chatting on the phone about her Wisconsin garden and my Michigan garden. Then will come the fruit conversation.

"We're getting a few peaches now. Have you seen any in Michigan yet?" she'll be asking me soon. Every year when I tell her about the price of a bushel of Red Havens or report on the twenty pounds of blueberries that I like to freeze, Mom will let me know that we in Michigan are blessed with good fruit in the summer.

I made a fruit salad that reminded me of that this weekend. Starting with storebought nectarines, bananas, kiwi, and blueberries, we raided the garden and added a few everbearing strawberries and raspberries. I stir two or three teaspoons of sugar (also a Michigan product!) into a quarter cup of water and toss the fruit in the sweetened syrup.

Placed in an antique blue willow bowl, the salad was served with little sugar cookies and freshly brewed coffee. Mmmm, luscious! Michigan blesses us with bounty, fruit and otherwise in summer.

These young people will present the 8 p.m. program, promising humor and music. All are invited to come and share with them. TTLM especially urges high school and college-age youth to attend.

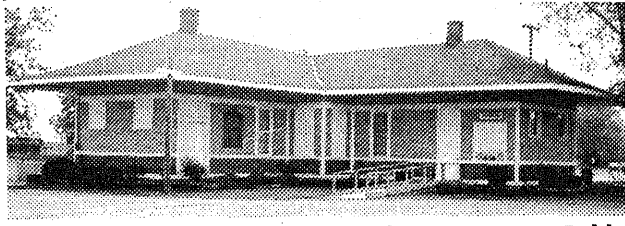

The River

We slipped into Badger Creek Rapids, the first below Glen Canyon Dam, with the anticipation and exhilaration of a 10-year old taking his first ride on a Cedar Point roller coaster.

The raft glided over the initial drop, plunged into the first hole and reared like a giant rubber horse when it met the standing wave waiting behind the unseen boulder hidden beneath the river's surface.

Screams of delight, some from pure joy, others masking an inner fear, peeled from one side of the raft to the other. They would be echoed many times in the next several days, sometimes louder than others depending on where the source of the scream was sitting and how much water had dumped in their laps.

The raft was now committed to the 239 mile journey which would end at Separ-

ation Canyon. More rapids than we wanted to count lay between us and the finish line.

Some would be cute and fun, like Badger Creek we had just passed through, others would be serious and even scary like Crystal, Hermit and Lava Falls. All would have a story tacked on the name and our boatman would weave a spell before we entered each.

Raft trips on the Colorado are becoming very

popular. This year, 15,000 people will traverse the Grand Canyon using the water route. About a third of that number will be private parties, and the remainder, like us, will be on a commercial carrier.

The National Park service has introduced strict rules concerning rafting in the canyon. Its purpose is to provide a unique experience to those wishing to test their courage and fortitude.

It hasn't always been that way. The canyon itself was first discovered by Franciscan Fathers Escalante and Dominguez in 1776.

But, it was more than a century later when John Wesley Powell, a one armed adventurer, led a crew through the canyon's entire length in small wooden boats. Since that first time, men the world over arrived to "run the canyon."

It was slow at first, by 1949 only 100 men had made it through, by 1963 the number had reached 300 and an important chapter of Grand Canyon history was closed with the construction of the Glen Canyon Dam.

Several more dams were proposed in the 60's and a heated debate between dam builders and conservationists took place.

This debate, with the media's help, suddenly propelled an interest in the Grand Canyon and the Colorado and people flocked to see "the big hole" and "run" the spectacular river that had cut it in two.

The National Park Service now regulates travel on the river. Permits have been issued to 20 qualified com-

mercial outfitters. With them, you can ride the river in oar-powered rafts and dories, or motorized pontoons. Some even support do-it-yourself kayak trips.

Private river runners can apply for permits to travel in the canyon, but the waiting list is long.

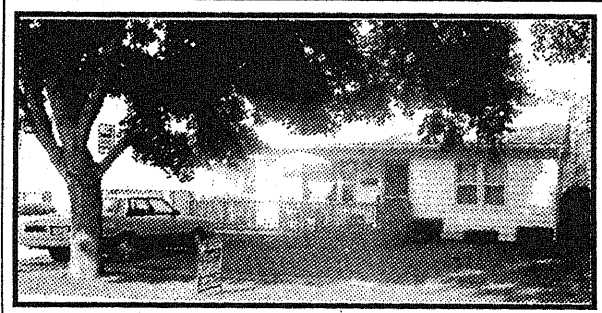
I met a kayaker from Seattle who had waited 7 years to get his. He was enjoying his trip to the fullest. It would probably be the only time in his life he would get the chance.

Our trip was on a motorized pontoon, they had become popular when the World War II surplus inflatable crafts became available. A woman, Georgie Clark, pioneered present-day commercial river running. She

lashed three bridge pontoons side by side and hauled 50 passengers and their gear down the river.

Modern rafts are about 25-feet in length and have two pontoon tubes strapped to each side. They carry 12 passengers and a crew of two. With this setup they are large enough to be safe, and small enough to give the rider a thrill.

River running has come a long way since John Wesley Powell's crew sat with their backs to the river and rowed heavy wooden boats downstream. Today river running is a well developed art. But I'm about to find out first hand because just around the bend I can already here the roar of Soap Creek Rapids.....

The biggest problem facing teens today, a problem that can be the source of so many others, is simply learning to get along with others.

So says new Laker Junior High guidance counselor Kathy White-Dickens, whose main goal in her new job is to help junior high students learn ways of getting along with others.

White-Dickens, a graduate of Corunna High School, recently finished her education master's degree in guidance and counseling at Eastern Illinois University after earning her bachelor's degree at Michigan State. From January to May, she worked as a counselor at Charleston Middle School.

At Morenci Area Public Schools, she taught history, geography and English, instructed adult education classes and served as the seventh grade volleyball coach, although she admits she had never played volleyball before.

She understands how sixth graders can be almost overwhelmed by the change from elementary school to junior high.

"Their biggest problem is simply getting along with their peers. It's a time to meet a lot of new kids, and that can be intimidating. But with adult supervision, it can be a fun time," White-Dickens says.

A rural school can present problems if there's nothing offered for the kids to do after school, she notes, but she says the Laker district doesn't have much of a problem with that.

"There seems to be a lot for the kids to do, plenty of extra-curricular activities," she says.

But even with extracurricular activities, some students need support to fend off the lure of drugs and alcohol.

"I'm focusing on prevention, to inform and give kids the facts so they can make informed decisions," White-Dickens says.

But she said she'll get lots of support from the Laker staff and administration.

"It seems as if everyone is behind the school one hundred percent. They're all super dedicated," she says.

One important goal she's

set for herself is to make sure the students are able to focus on their studies and learn.

But when that focus gets a little blurry, she's there to help get the picture sharp again. "They can come to me to get refocused."

White-Dickens and her husband Brion, an industrial arts teacher and licensed building contractor, are currently searching for a house in the area, and while she waits for school to start, she's been busy setting up her office and getting acquainted with the staff.

his divisional events to go on to All-Stars, placing first, third and sixth there.

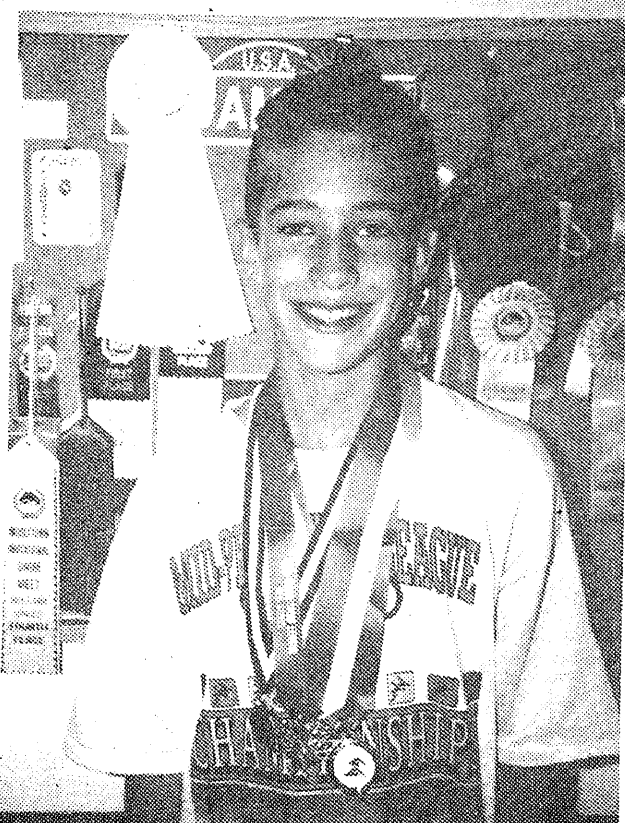
The finals in Carlisle, PA gave him second and seventh place awards.

*167 countries, territories, areas and protectorates are officially recognized for competition in the Olympic Games.

*25 sports are approved for

competition the Summer Olympic Games.

*Gold, Silver and Bronze medal winners are not the only Olympic athletes who receive awards for competition. Fourth through eighth place finishes in each event receive special diplomas in recognition of their achievement.

*Larissa Latynina of the USSR has won more total Gold, Silver and Bronze medals than any other athlete. She was won 18!

*The only athlete to win the same event in four separate Olympic Games is Al Oerter of the U.S., who won the discus in 1956, 1960, 1964, and 1968.

*The most popular sports in the Olympic Games are track and field, swimming, and diving, gymnastics and boxing.

*The U.S. traditionally excels in the sports of men's track and field, men's and women's swimming and diving, boxing, wrestling, shooting, yachting and archery.

*U.S. athletes have never won gold medals in field hockey, soccer, judo, modern pentathlon, team handball, biathlon and luge.

*The names of all winners are to be inscribed on the walls of the stadium where the Olympic Games have taken place.

*Although peace is often considered the major goal of the Olympic movement, Baron Pierre de Coubertin, founder of the Modern Olympic Games, envisioned the competitions as an event which would help develop better individuals and those individuals would help bring about a better world.

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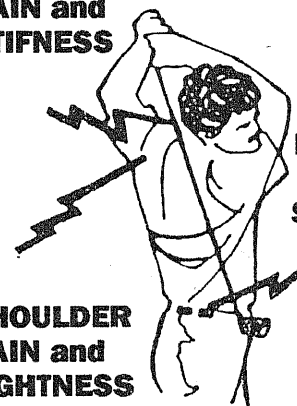
