"Give, and it shall be given to you; good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye mete, . . it shall be measured to you again." Luke 6:38

Dr. Norman Vincent Peale told of a store clerk who helped an elderly woman with her shopping, then summoned a taxi for her when a rainstorm struck. Apparently she told her family about the clerk. When the shopper's son, Andrew Carnegie, needed a sales manager several years later, he remembered the kindness shown to his mother. He sought out that clerk, who made a successful career for himself.

The point is NOT that helpful clerks are likely to meet relatives of famous people, but that people who succeed are often those who give more than required or expected.

It's not the "That's not my job" or "See Department ABC about that" crowd. It's the "givers" who go beyond their "responsibilities" and who "do the extra task".

Somehow, the "givers" still find time to phone a lonely person, to write a note to a bereaved, or who call on the ill The world is full of people who need a boost, or an assist. They are our "test" to see how we respond.

If we want "good measure, pressed down . . running over", there's a way to get it. In Luke 6 we are told that we are measured by the same gauge that we use to measure

Frankie's mission was to clean the outside of the giant picture window. Somebody had the same idea this year, for when I walked back to the grove of pines behind the window, the outside glass shone just as clean as it did on our wedding day in 1968.

Our 10-year-old Peter found his way to the waterfront quickly. Most kids are attracted to Lake Lucerne's sandy beach, canoes, raft, and pers. I decided to don my swimsuit for a quick swim while

Ed and Peter canoed a bit. I had forgotten what a refreshing

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
