## 27-year search for mother finally successful

If you can measure the size of the accomplishment by the obstacles that had to be overcome — as Booker T. Washington said — then you'd need a very large yardstick to measure Bonnie Fritz's achievement.

Her search for her birth mother, whom she has never seen, took over 27 years and reached all the way to Colorado.

She met obstacles along the way, including uncooperative agencies and judges.

But in August, her dream of finding and talking to the woman who bore her was fulfilled, as the two spoke tentatively and tearfully on the telephone.

"I was scared to death to talk to her, but it was something I had to do," Fritz said. "I talk a lot when I get nervous so I don't think she had a chance to say much of anything."

Fritz's search for her family roots began when she turned 18, and living in Colorado. Her adoptive parents, a farming couple in Fowler, Colo., had never made any secret of her adoption.

They had taken her into their home when she was six weeks old, and adopted her when she was 16 months. But they couldn't or wouldn't provide her with more details.

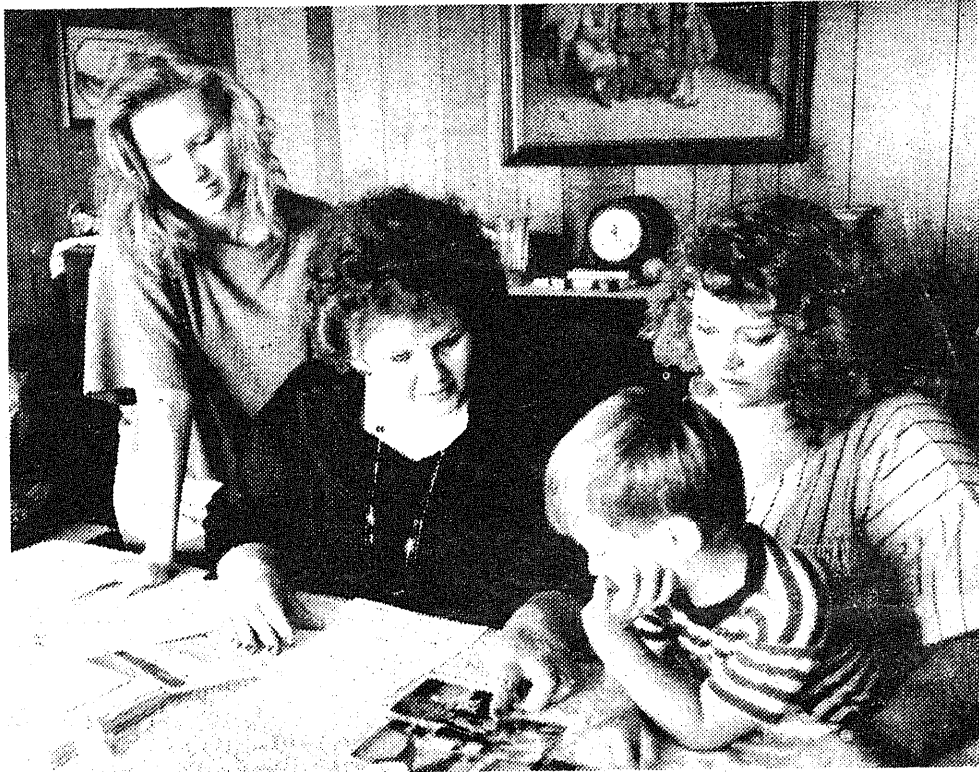
She first contacted the Colorado Department of Social Services, but was told that records of the adoption were sealed and could only be opened with a court order.

Her search then was put on hold for awhile when she met and married Raymond Fritz, an Elkton native, who was serving in the Army in Colorado Springs.

When Raymond mustered out, he packed up his new wife and her daughter Amy and took them back to Michigan to live.

A couple of years after moving to Michigan, she learned a few tidbits of information, that her adoptive grandparents were from Oslo, Norway, as were her maternal grandparents.

"That little bit of information just whetted my appetite for more," Fritz said. "I still didn't know my birth name or my mother's name."

Her first big break came after her adoptive mother died and she and Amy and a friend went back to Colorado to help sort through the estate.

"Amy was going through some papers and found one dated in 1948, and in it was my birth name. She screamed at me 'Mom, come look at this right now,'" Fritz said.

On that paper, given to her adoptive parents, was her name, Madonna Marie Piper. Bonnie Jean, the name she'd always assumed was hers, was the name given to her by her new parents in 1946 when she was given up by her mother.

The paper also gave up a few more clues. Her mother had been married when she gave up her daughter, and already had a three-year old daughter. Apparently, her parents felt that raising two daughters in a room in a basement would be unfair to parents and children alike.

After her return to Michigan, she then contacted a judge of the juvenile court in Pueblo who agreed to let them see her files if her adoptive father agreed.

"We drove to Colorado not knowing what we'd find," Fritz said.

But her hopes were dashed again when the files proved

to be written in shorthand, and no one in the office secretarial pool would consent to transcribe them.

"We couldn't take anything in and we couldn't make copies. Then the judge literally threw me out of his office and told me not to come back," Fritz said.

That was 13 years ago, and in the intervening years, Fritz has spent a small fortune on phone calls, running up such large bills that her phone was disconnected twice.

She watched every episode of "Unsolved Mysteries," hoping that one of her relatives was searching for

## Teacher talks continue

Teachers in Unionville-Sebewaing Area School District are expected to have a teachers' contract in place in about 30 days.

A tentative three-year agreement was reached Thursday, said Supt. William D. Dodge.

"The agreement still has to be ratified by the USA Teachers' Association, the Tri-County Bargaining Association and by the Board of Education," said Dodge.

"We are not releasing any of the details until the ratification is completed."

The district has about 904

students and 55 teachers.

The contract expired June 30 and the teachers have been working without a contract.

While things are looking up at the USA School District, contract negotiations in the Tuscola Intermediate School District are in mediation.

Both sides agreed negotiations are at an impasse. An teachers are doing informational picketing.

The Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port School District is also without a contract and negotiations have gone to mediation.

### Transfer station continuing

Columbia Township will continue to operate its trash transfer station on Hoppe Road during the 1992-93 year.

The township will contract with Cove Sanitation Inc., Bad Axe, to provide trash removal services.

Costs for removal have increased slightly, but not enough to increase the current \$60 per year special assessment on rural township residents.

The new charge for a 31-yard compactor truck is \$650 per load, and a charge of \$16.50 per yard will be made for partial loads and estimated at the site.

It is \$50 a truck load more, and about \$2 a yard more than last year, officials say.

Transfer station manager Cora Hartman noted more residents are recycling and decreasing the amount of trash.

Using the transfer station costs residents about \$5 per month, while the cheapest bid for house-to-house pickup was \$9.50 per month, said Township Sup. Edward Spannagel.

Transfer service station service will continue on the second and fourth Saturdays of each month from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The special assement doesn't impact Unionville Village residents, who have curb service.

Wayne Butcher was appointed to a four-year term on the township's zoning board to replace John Schulz.

The Township Library has a fax service available for persons needing the function.

## Crime to pay for books?

Tuscola County District Judge Kim Glaspie is changing the formula to make crime pay — for books. Judge Glaspie increased the funding formula for county libraries by 5 percent, in a recent decision. Now, libraries will receive 55 percent rather than 50 percent of the fines collected in district court. County librarians had requested an increase this spring in an attempt to bring their funding levels back to where they had been before local and state budget cuts.

# Caseville sewer hook-up deadline nears

Caseville Village Council has set next Friday, Oct. 2 as the final deadline for residents to hook up to the new sewer system. The system has been in operation since December, giving residents plenty of time to make their hook-ups, according to Village Treasurer-Deputy Clerk Shelley Lisowski. Council also set Oct. 12 at 7 p.m. as the date for a public hearing on a proposed ordinance limiting the hours a


minor can be in an establishment that serves alcohol. The ordinance would prohibit minors from being such an establishment after 11 p.m. At last week's meeting, Council adopted a water franchise agreement that had previously been adopted by the Caseville Township Board, allowing the village to sell water to township residents. Residents who request village water must follow a series of steps outlined in the

village's water ordinance and must pay the costs of providing the hook-up, Lisowski says. In other business, Caseville Village Council: ■ Authorized Village President Frank Malosky to apply for a Rebuild Michigan Initiative grant through the Michigan Department of Commerce. The grant would total \$500,000 and would not require matching funds from the village. The grant would help pay for improvements to the vil-

lage, such as water lines and storm sewers, park improvements and sidewalks. ■ Re-appointed Barry Pawluk and Barb Quinn to the Planning Commission. ■ Appointed Council member David Lewis to the Recreation Commission for a two-year term. Lewis will take over the spot vacated by Clare Heron. ■ Approved pay raises for Controller Pam Stahl and Department of Public Works Supervisor Bob Peter.

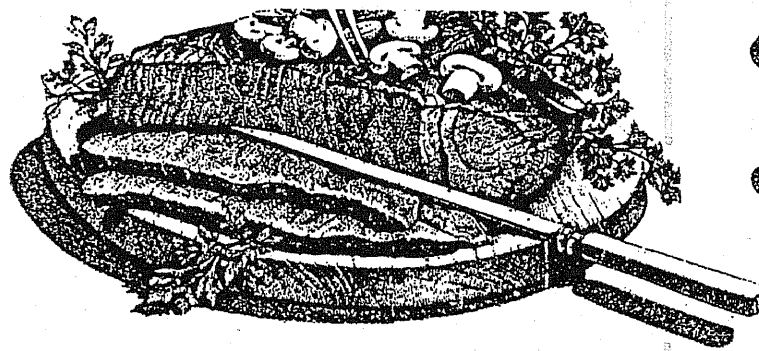

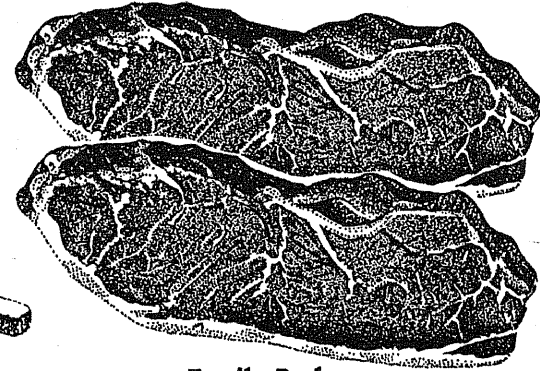

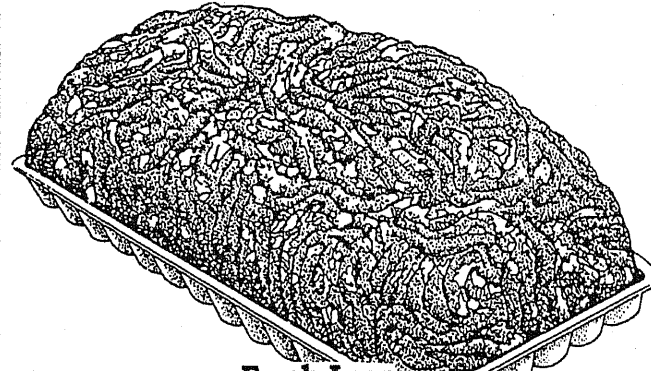

### USA GRIDDERS LOSE TO DECKERVILLE

**Liberacki returned** the second-half kickoff 50 yards to the Eagles' 45-yd. line, giving the Pats good field position. The Pats made good on this threat, scoring on an 11-yd. pass from Nietzke to Liberacki. The conversion pass fell short, and the Eagles still led 22-14.  
Deckerville scored again with three minutes left in the game on a Conser 7-yd. run.

The Patriots meet Harbor Beach this Saturday afternoon at 2 p.m. in a TCC game.

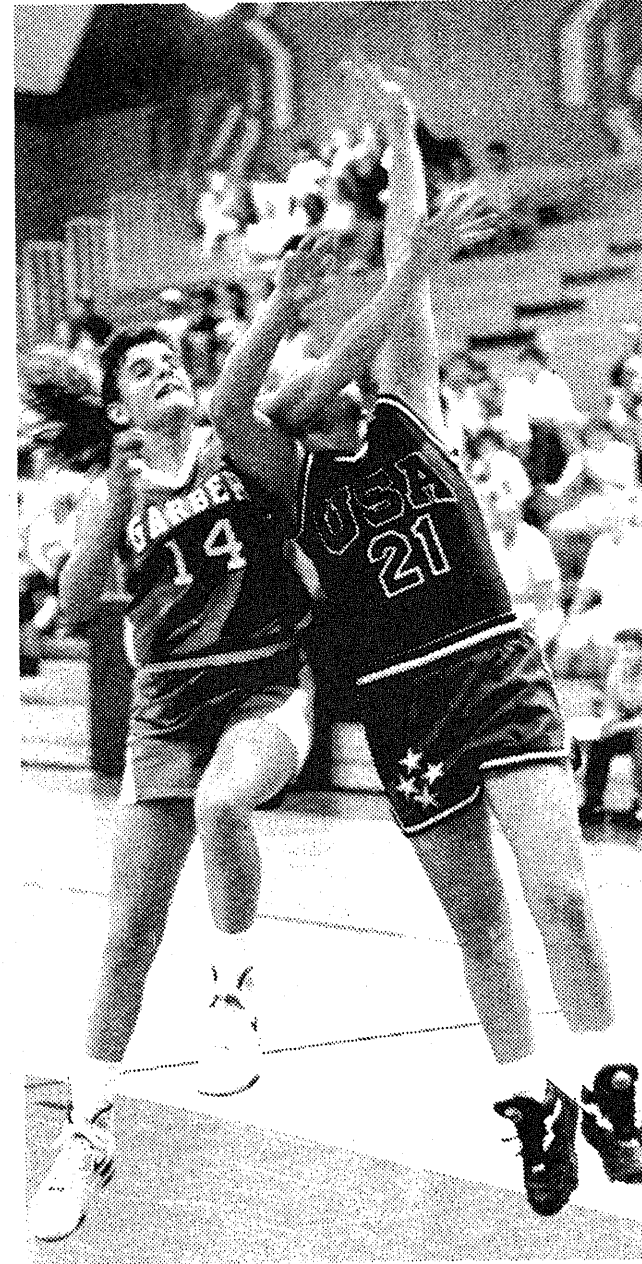
**LAKER FOOTBALL SQUAD DUMPS MARLETTE**

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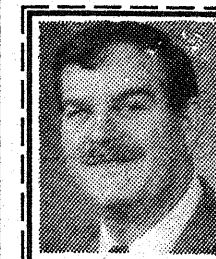
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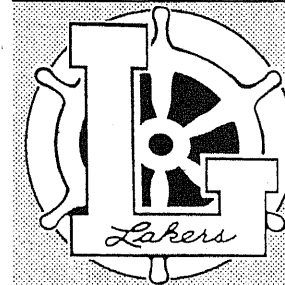

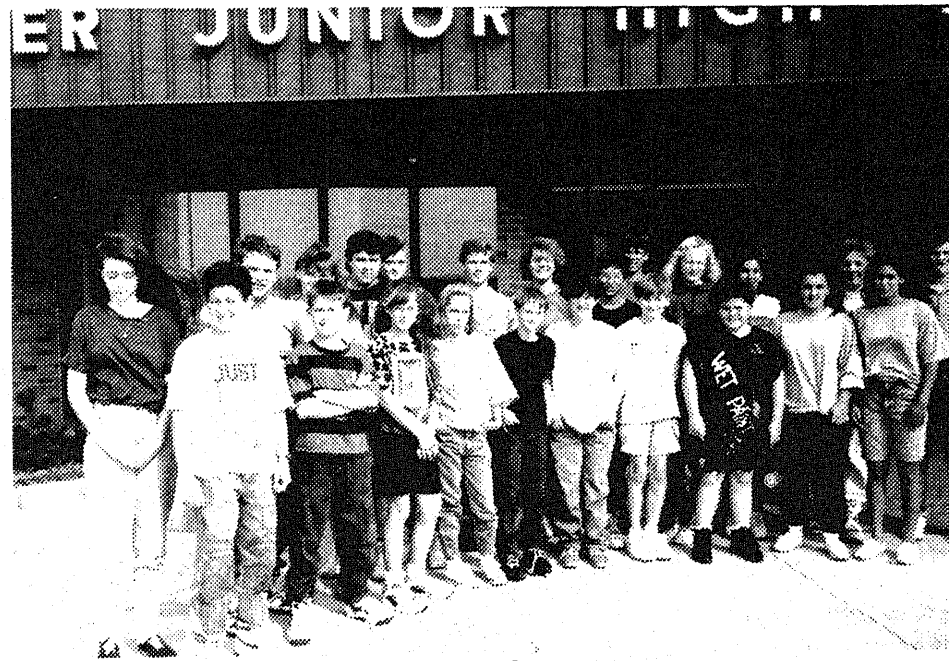
The children swam, as did Miss Snoop (she even has her own bathing suit), enjoyed refreshments, talked about the books they had read over the summer and played math and word games for prizes.

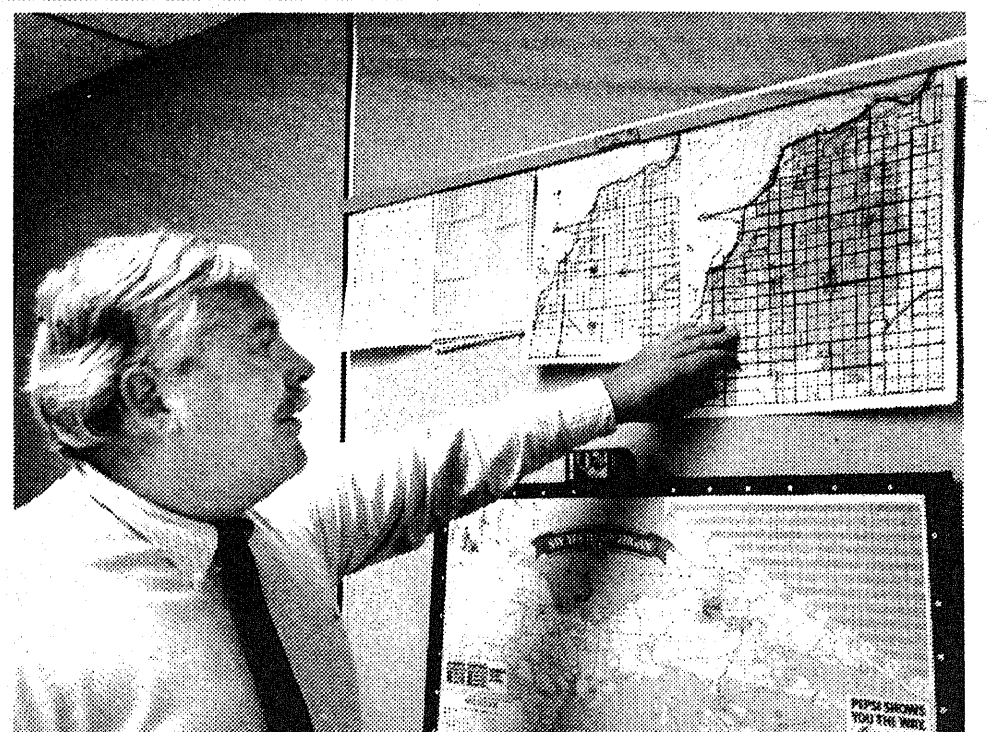
