## No charges likely in resurrection attempt

Although the investigation continues, it is doubtful any charges will be filed against members of the Unionville religious group who kept the decomposing body of an infant, in efforts to ressurect it. According to the autopsy According to the autopsy month term child stillborn month term child stillborn during a prema
about Aug. 30. about Aug. 30.
Because of the age, it is considered a fetus rather than a body of an infant
"It's a matter of first impression," said Tuscola County Prosecutor James Reed.

He said keeping a stillborn infant seems illegal but "there is no law against it that I know of."Reed de-
clined further comment. The infant's body was re moved Wednesday, Oct. 14 from a home on Sheridan Road by Michigan State Police from the Caro Post. Authorities issued a search warrant following a tip the Ministry of the Word religious group was trying to resurrect an infant's body. resurrect an infant's body. An anoymous call made to Tuscola Central Dispatch tipped authorities to the alleged resurrection and speculated another family member in the church who is pregnant with twins would have one of her babies taken to replace the dead infant.
The decomposingbody was kept on a bed for six weeks before authorities intervened.

The Ministry of the Word organization includes about 25 people, officials say, and was founded in 1982 by Leona Trischlerand her late husband, Joseph Trischler, Sr. It is comprised largely of Trischler family members. Members have politely delined interviews.
Reed and Michigan State Police Detective Sgt. Allan Ogg of the Caro Post have met several times over the last two weeks to discuss possible charges. They met with Tuscola County Medical Examiner Dennis Smallwood last Wednesday, but no further meetings are scheduled.
Ogg said he is continuing investigations, but it is up to Reed's to press charges.

The Ministry of the Word is headquartered in downtown Unionville. Members keep mainly to themselves with minimial contact withneigh bors and other churches.
Although Unionville Moravian Pastor Terry Weavil hasn't had any personal contact with sect members, he said he is glad no charges may come from the incident.
"They've gone through (enough) pain," said Pastor Weavil. "It is a painful time during a miscarriage. Everyone mourns for the loss of a new life."
And, he sympathized with the groups' efforts.
"They have a strong belief that through God all things are possible - I believe that

## BAY F'BALL CROWN

The Lakers wrapped up yet another football conference title Friday night, as they shut out Blue Bay rival Bad Axe 24-0.
Thisgame starred the Laker defensive team, as they held the Hatchets to a measly 55 yards rushing and 15 yards passing, plus 6 first downs. By contrast, the Lakers racked up 270 yards on the ground.
Kendal Truemner scored in the first quarter on a 4 -yd. run, and Chris Schember added the $2-\mathrm{pt}$. conversion.
Then in the third quarter, Schemberscored his own'TD on a 4 -yd. run, and John Klosowski leapedhigh in the air to snag a Jason Krohn pass for the extra points. Eric Maust added another 6 points for the Lakers in the fourth quarter on a 10 -yd. run. Josh Santos grabbed a Krohn pass for the $2-\mathrm{pt}$. conversion.
The Hatchets had a least one scoringopportunity, but their TD was nullified because of holding penalty.

Both teams were plagued with penalties, especially early in the game. "We made a few mistakes early in the game penaltywise," Coach Bill McLellan said. "But we played well defensively and we didn't give up much yardage."
Schember gained a total of 113 yards in 16 carries and Truemner had 61 yards in 11 carries. Brian Gebauer gained 35 yards in 4 carries, most of those on quarterback keepers. Krohnconnectedon 5 of 10 passes for 40 yards. The Laker defense gave the Hatchets fits, gettting 11 tackles for yardage losses. Bob Blome had 9 assisted tackles and a solo, Matt Keefer had 2 solos and 7 assists and Truemner had 4 solos and 4 assists. Truemner and Kevin fantzi each had a quarterback sack.

Friday's match-up with feature cross-county rival Harbor Beach, in what prom-
ises to be the most important and excitinggame of the Lakers' undefeated season.

I can only say "thank you" o state officials for your supportand to the residents, who have put up with the inconvenience of the sewer contruction
Just a final note on the boardwalk: Caseville will be the only community in the state to provide a handicap ramp for ice fishing. This project will be completed his year.
The new police chief was appointed to the position, upon the resignation of councilman JackJensen. Iencourge the Council to adopt this proposed amendment, as it will give Caseville the necessary authority to enforce the removal of junk, trash, ubbish and abandoned auomobiles and boats on any private property, except when completely hidden from view on all sides. If anyone is concerned with this proposed amendment, attend the public hearing and voice your concerns.
Councill awarded the recycling contract to Green, inc., with a one-year low bid f $\$ 12,400$. Two other bids J\&C Enterprises and \$14,500 from Zings Recyclables. Green Inc will split revenues from recyclable sales as follows: from the first $\$ 1250$ received the village share is $\$ 1,000.00$ and Inc 's share is $\$ 250$. The bal no. share ance of revenue for the year pick-up should start some

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## Laker band teacher resigns

The Laker School Board Mondaynight accepted the resignation of band in－ structor Vincent Aiello，after meeting in closed session with the board＇s attor－ ney．
Aiello had been the subject of charges brought by Laker High School Principal Lisa DiCamillo on Oct． 12.
The Board had agreed at its regular meeting to suspend Aiello with pay from his position and to proceed with a hearing on the charges．Aiello would have had the right to cross－examine any witnesses and to be represented by an attorney．
In the resolution accepting Aiello＇s resignation，the Laker Board agreed to drop DiCamillo＇s charges and rescind the resolution to hold ahearing on those charges．
That agreement came on the advice of the district＇s attorney，Michael Eschel－ bach of the Lansing firm of Thrun， Maatsch and Nordberg，who met with
the Board Monday night．
Aiello＇s resignation letter states that he was resigning＂from employment with the Elkton－Pigeon－Bay Port Schools for engaging in unprofessional conduct with a student．＂
Aiello has been the focus of an investi－ gation by Michigan State Police on be－ half of the Department of Social Ser－ vices，but no charges have been filed at this time．
State Police Detective Mark Krebs said Monday night that Huron County Prosecutor Leslie Hagen would release a statement on Tuesday concerning the investigation．He declined further com－ ment at press time．
Aiello was hired by the district as band instructor in 1991 and has been a probationary teacher．
Laker Supt．Robert Drury said the Board agreed to accept Aiello＇s resigna－ tion to＂avoid a hearing to prove the charges．It＇s in the best interest of every－ one involved，＂Drury said．
