Tuesday mediation for TISD

Observers are hopeful Tuesday's mediation session will head off the possibility of a work stoppage at the Tuscola Intermediate School District. Frustration over lack of a teachers' contract at the TISD is mounting and teachers again picketed before the Oct. 19 TISD Board meeting.

The district's 80 teachers have been without a contract since Aug. 31. Nine sessions have been held since negotiations began in April, and both sides agreed in August to mediation. Tuesday was the first mediation meeting.

The ISD employs teachers, specialists, speech therapists, social workers and psychologists who instruct 200 handicapped students at the Highland Pines School, Caro, itinerate staff who provide services to school districts throughout the county, plus vocational education at the Skill Center to 800 students.

No charges likely in resurrection attempt

Although the investigation continues, it is doubtful any charges will be filed against members of the Unionville religious group who kept the decomposing body of an infant, in efforts to resurrect it.

According to the autopsy report, the body was of a six-month term child stillborn during a premature delivery about Aug. 30.

Because of the age, it is considered a fetus rather than a body of an infant.

"It's a matter of first impression," said Tuscola County Prosecutor James Reed.

He said keeping a stillborn infant seems illegal but "there is no law against it that I know of." Reed de-

clined further comment.

The infant's body was removed Wednesday, Oct. 14 from a home on Sheridan Road by Michigan State Police from the Caro Post.

Authorities issued a search warrant following a tip the Ministry of the Word religious group was trying to resurrect an infant's body.

An anonymous call made to Tuscola Central Dispatch tipped authorities to the alleged resurrection and speculated another family member in the church who is pregnant with twins would have one of her babies taken to replace the dead infant.

The decomposing body was kept on a bed for six weeks before authorities intervened.

The Ministry of the Word organization includes about 25 people, officials say, and was founded in 1982 by Leona Trischler and her late husband, Joseph Trischler, Sr. It is comprised largely of Trischler family members.

Members have politely declined interviews.

Reed and Michigan State Police Detective Sgt. Allan Ogg of the Caro Post have met several times over the last two weeks to discuss possible charges. They met with Tuscola County Medical Examiner Dennis Smallwood last Wednesday, but no further meetings are scheduled.

Ogg said he is continuing investigations, but it is up to Reed's to press charges.

The Ministry of the Word is headquartered in downtown Unionville. Members keep mainly to themselves with minimal contact with neighbors and other churches.

Although Unionville Moravian Pastor Terry Weavil hasn't had any personal contact with sect members, he said he is glad no charges may come from the incident. "They've gone through (enough) pain," said Pastor Weavil. "It is a painful time during a miscarriage. Everyone mourns for the loss of a new life."

And, he sympathized with the groups' efforts.

"They have a strong belief that through God all things are possible - I believe that -

Huron Youth Center auction to help kids Nov. 7

As the weather gets colder and colder and kids are forced to find indoor activities on weekends, boredom can quickly set in.

What parent wants to listen to the plaintive cry of "there's nothing to do?"

Well, organizers of the Huron Youth Center in Elkton have a least one solution to that boredom problem — as they've opened up the Center on Saturday afternoons for school-age kids.

The center is open from 1 to 10 p.m., with plenty of activities to keep youngsters occupied, under the supervision of watchful adults.

And, since the Laker School District has an in-service day this Thursday, the Youth Center will be open that day from 1-5 p.m.

Advisory Board Vice Chairman Lee Jaworski says ping-pong, hockey and board games, along with basketball, are available for the kids' use. There is a small charge for using the equipment.

"We want to have the center open every Saturday, and we plan to have two to five adults there for supervision all the time," Jaworski says.

Volunteers for the Youth Center also plan to finish the upstairs portion of the Center to house a TV and VCR so that movies can be shown on Saturday afternoons. The upstairs section will also house two study rooms.

By Christmas, two half-rooms should be in place and

lined out for 3-on-3 basketball, Jaworski says, so that area youngsters will have even more choices of activities.

Other plans include a Christmas Dance on Dec. 12 with a live band.

Volunteers are always needed to help plan and supervise these events, and Jaworski has one simple reason why local parents should volunteer.

"A lot of adults don't realize they're setting an example for their kids when they volunteer," she says.

"Kids realize you really care about something when you volunteer. And the people who have volunteered their time and energy to help us are people who really care about their kids and the direction they'll take in the future."

But just keeping the center open, paying the utility bills, and buying more equipment costs money.

To replenish the Center's coffers, youth center officials are planning a Benefit Auction on Saturday, Nov. 7 at 10 a.m.

The centerpiece of the auction will be a basketball autographed by Detroit Pistons stars Isiah Thomas and Joe Dumars, and a football autographed by Detroit Lion powerhouse Jerry Ball.

Both the special balls were donated by Laker alumnus and Flint Powers coach Kathy McGee, who organizes sports camps for Thomas and Dumars and Lions players.

All kinds of items are being donated for the auction, including a hand-made

Edison work moves ahead

Construction on Detroit Edison Company's "North Area Energy Center" in Cass City is progressing. Completion of the complex is expected by the end of the year, said village Manager Lou LaPonsie. However, the facility isn't expected to be fully operational until mid to late January, LaPonsie said.

The 50,000 square foot facility is on an 18-acre site in the village's industrial park on the south side of the village. When completed, the complex will house about 45 administrative personnel plus a 60-man maintenance crew.

Along with the new facility comes the revamping of Detroit Edison Company's structure with six offices and service centers in Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties closing. The change is to centralize services, to meet future needs of customers and to provide better service, Edison officials say.

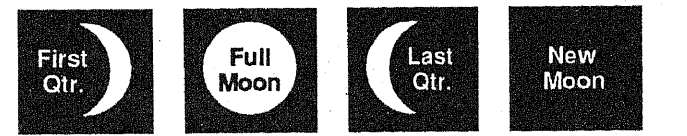

Down Memory Lane

From The Pages Of The Sebewaing Blade

70 YEARS AGO OCT. 19, 1922

Beatrice Beckman, who came down with diphtheria a few weeks ago, has practically recovered.

The pupils of the Sebewaing schools were examined last week for diphtheria and a half dozen "carriers" were found. They were taken out of school for a few days and given antitoxin treatments. It is hoped the dreaded disease will have no further spread here.

60 YEARS AGO OCT. 14, 1932

William Demo, 58, died at his home near Sebewaing of injuries received in a fall Aug. 24. He leaves his mother, his widow and five sons. Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Miller were entertained 60 guests Monday evening for their 25th wedding anniversary. Wednesday night brought the first killing frost of the season. Water in pails and other containers bore ice a quarter of an inch thick.

For the first in Michigan's history, the names of the various candidates for president and vice-president will appear on the November ballots. Formerly the ballots listed the names of the 19 presidential electors only and there was much confusion. Under the new law, a vote for any constitutives vote for each of the electors, who on reality elect the nation's chief executives.

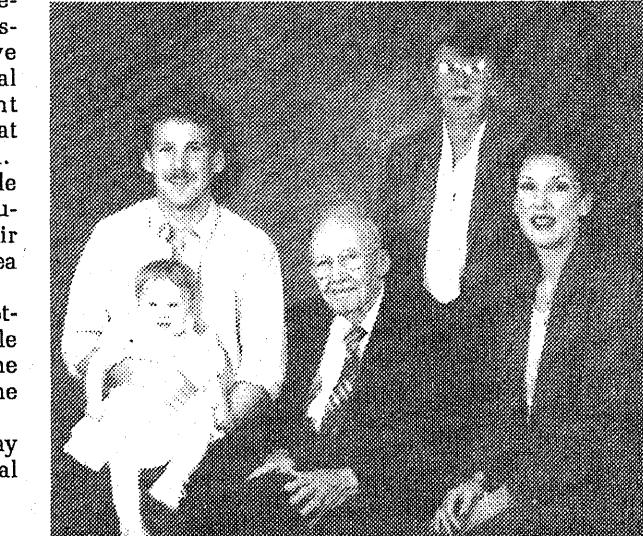

Mark Samborski got the **Eagles** on the scoreboard early in the game with a low shot right into the net, after an assist by center half **Kevin**

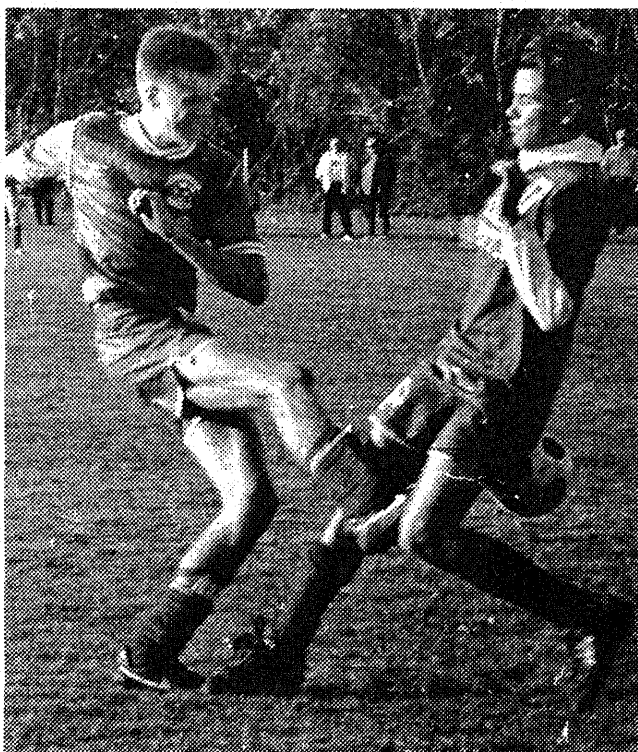
Gettel. **Gettel** went down in the game later after tearing ligaments in his knee.

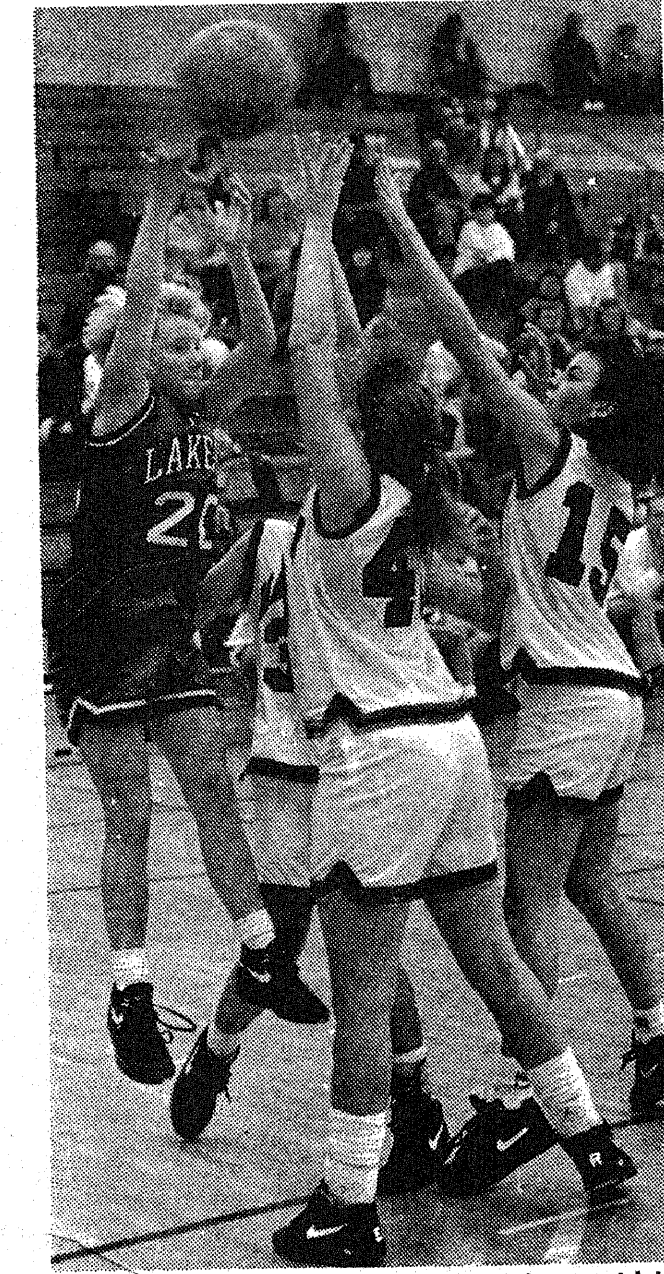
Bollenbacher finished with a team-leading 13 points, Smith had 10 and McLellan and Sturm each added 9.

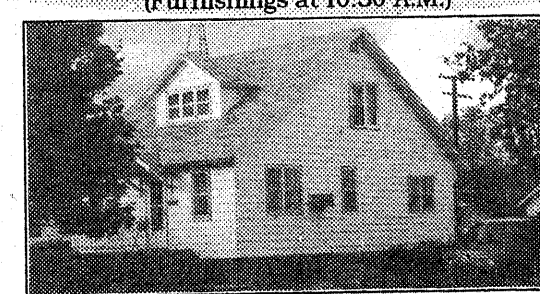
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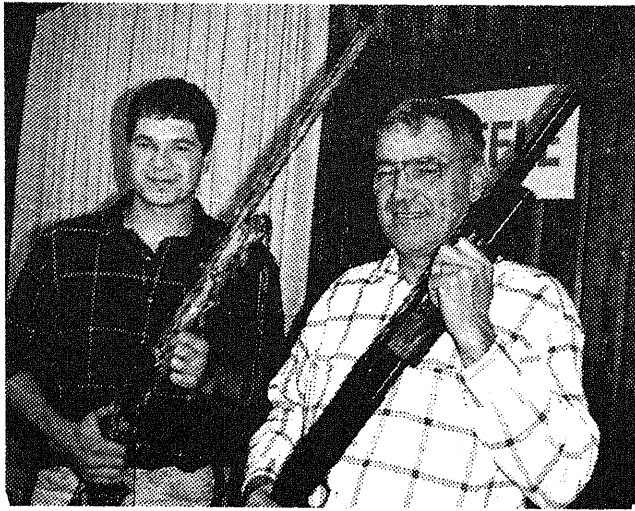
DU dinner draws biggest crowd ever

Mayor's Report to Caseville Residents

Oct. 9 was an historic day for Caseville. Over 200 residents and state and local officials turned out to help village officials dedicate four major projects that were completed in 1992: the Sewer Treatment Facility, Recycling Building, Municipal Parking Lot and the Pigeon River Boardwalk Project.

I can only say "thank you" to state officials for your support and to the residents, who have put up with the inconvenience of the sewer construction.

Just a final note on the boardwalk: Caseville will be the only community in the state to provide a handicap ramp for ice fishing. This project will be completed this year.

The new police chief was appointed to the position, upon the resignation of councilman Jack Jensen. I encourage the Council to adopt this proposed amendment, as it will give Caseville the necessary authority to enforce the removal of junk, trash, rubbish and abandoned automobiles and boats on any private property, except when completely hidden from view on all sides. If anyone is concerned with this proposed amendment, attend the public hearing and voice your concerns.

Council awarded the recycling contract to Green, Inc., with a one-year low bid of \$12,400. Two other bids were received: \$12,675 from J&C Enterprises and \$14,500 from Zings Recyclables.

Green, Inc. will split the revenues from recyclable sales as follows: from the first \$1250 received, the village share is \$1,000.00 and Green, Inc.'s share is \$250. The balance of revenue for the year will be split 50/50. Recycling pick-up should start some

time in November.

Caseville received a Certificate of Achievement from the Michigan Municipal League for its sewer project and also received word that the tree planting grant application to the DNR submitted jointly with the Township for \$1500 was approved. This is an Urban and Community Forestry program developed by the USDA Forest Service State and Private Forestry.

This will be a \$3000 total project, with \$1500 from the DNR and \$500 each from the village and township, with \$250 each in "in kind" service. The trees will be planted in the by the water tower next spring and Global Relief will oversee the project.

In other action, Council approved retroactive pay to former police chief Jack Jensen in the amount of \$1451.88; delayed the reappointment of Pete Dutcher to the Harbor Commission and received notice from Harron Cable that they will be charge the customer for franchise fees previously absorbed by them, costing approximately 65 cents per month, per cable customer. The rate will vary depending upon the services each customer has. Harron Cable paid Caseville \$2827.49 in 1991-92 for franchise fees.

Council and Police Chief Tom Shedd explained this would eliminate the parents of small children using a bar as a "babysitter" for their youngsters. There were two establishments that objected

to the amendment. However, Council adopted the amendment at the regular meeting later that evening.

Halloween hours have been set for Oct. 31 from 5:30 to 7 p.m. IGA owners Terry and Linda Hogan and Gus Hineman will again provide hot dogs and drinks for "Trick or Treaters" at 7 p.m. in the IGA parking lot, assisted by Caseville Fire and Police Departments.

Thank you again, IGA, for doing something so special for between 350 and 400 children. IGA will also provide cash prizes for best costumes in three different categories.

Council passed a resolution supporting the proposed school addition, including a swimming pool. Superintendent Jim Stahl explained the new addition of 20,125 sq. ft., plus renovation, will cost \$3.6 million.

The millage increase will vary from a starting 5.55 mills, down to 1.12 mills for a 25-year bond issue and 5.55 to 1.67 for a 20-year bonding. These figures are based on an estimated 8% financing.

If added, the swimming pool will be an additional \$1.2 million. The Board of Education has not yet discussed the pool project in detail, but petitions are being circulated locally for support of the pool.

Council also approved sending full-time patrol officers to an Interview and Interrogation Seminar, at a cost not to exceed \$240. A public hearing was set for Nov. 9 at 6:30 p.m. on a pro-

posed amendment to the Health Officers Ordinance.

A public hearing was held for public comments on an amendment to local ordi-

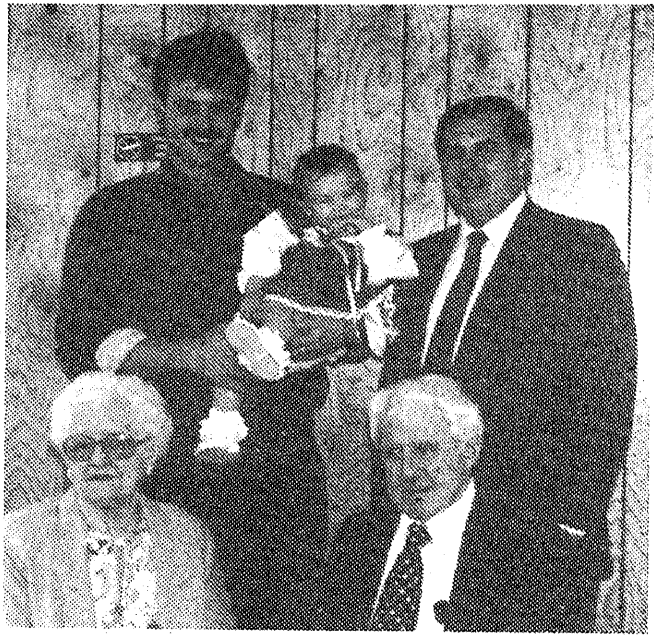
nance 604.19, involving persons under 18 years of age in an establishment that sells alcoholic beverages, after 11 p.m.

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Laker band teacher resigns

The Laker School Board Monday night accepted the resignation of band instructor Vincent Aiello, after meeting in closed session with the board's attorney.

Aiello had been the subject of charges brought by Laker High School Principal Lisa DiCamillo on Oct. 12.

The Board had agreed at its regular meeting to suspend Aiello with pay from his position and to proceed with a hearing on the charges. Aiello would have had the right to cross-examine any witnesses and to be represented by an attorney.

In the resolution accepting Aiello's resignation, the Laker Board agreed to drop DiCamillo's charges and rescind the resolution to hold a hearing on those charges.

That agreement came on the advice of the district's attorney, Michael Eschelbach of the Lansing firm of Thrun, Maatsch and Nordberg, who met with

the Board Monday night.

Aiello's resignation letter states that he was resigning "from employment with the Elkton - Pigeon - Bay Port Schools for engaging in unprofessional conduct with a student."

Aiello has been the focus of an investigation by Michigan State Police on behalf of the Department of Social Services, but no charges have been filed at this time.

State Police Detective Mark Krebs said Monday night that Huron County Prosecutor Leslie Hagen would release a statement on Tuesday concerning the investigation. He declined further comment at press time.

Aiello was hired by the district as band instructor in 1991 and has been a probationary teacher.

Laker Supt. Robert Drury said the Board agreed to accept Aiello's resignation to "avoid a hearing to prove the charges. It's in the best interest of everyone involved," Drury said.


