\$114,000 Vanderbilt Park work starts

Revamping Vanderbilt Park near Quanicassee — Tuscola County's only county-owned park facility — begins this week after several years of planning and design revisions.

A ground-breaking ceremony Friday begins the \$114,000 remodeling and expansion project.

Original plans were to totally remodel and upgrade the park, but water quality issues necessitated changes, officials say.

A vein of fresh water was eventually found to provide flush toilets and showers; however, there isn't enough water pressure in the fresh-water well to operate the upgraded facilities, said District 4 Commissioner Norma Bates of Caro.

Plans for showers and flush toilets were scrapped, but now efforts will go to develop a nicer primitive park.

Also, officials want to bring in fill dirt to level the camp-

ing sites, plus provide electricity to each camp site at the 6.5-acre park.

The park is about a mile off M-25 on Saginaw Bay, at the

end of Quanicassee Road that meets with Gilmore Road at the park.

Saginaw Bay offers access to fishing, duck and goose hunting.

Although the park itself doesn't have a boat ramp, it is near a state-owned ramp and near the privately-owned 86-slip Quanicassee Marina.

Funds for the revamping come from a \$85,500 state grant and \$28,500 in county funds.

Construction work will get underway in full swing the middle of this week.

Terry Auman, project manager with Johnson, Serenus & Son Construction Co., Bay City, said he expects to have the main part of the buildings done by Christmas and to come back in the spring to complete the work in time for the 1993 camping season.

Boat license fees repealed

Those controversial boat license fees imposed on recreational crafts in November, 1990 have been repealed by President George Bush. He last week ended the fee schedule which charged a tax of \$25 to \$100 on all boats longer than 16 feet.

Owners of boats 21 feet and under no longer have to pay the tax. Crafts 37 feet and under will be exempt after Oct. 1, 1993, while the tax will be completely repealed Oct. 1, 1994.

The legislation repealing the fees was introduced by U.S. Rep. Bob Davis (R-Gaylord), who did not seek re-election last week.

New state park rates

New fees for Michigan State Parks will be charged in 1993, according to the state Department of Natural Resources.

Summer fees for all modern campsites will be \$14 per night at Caseville's Sleeper and Port Austin's Port Crescent State Parks, plus many other major State Parks, for next year, the DNR says.

State Park motor vehicle permit fees rise to \$18 per year, up from the present \$15, as the next phase in price adjustments approved in 1989. Special senior annual permits rise to \$4.50 from the current \$3.75, the DNR says.

Elkton woman's tumor may cause loss of tongue

A baby's birth heralds a new phase in a parent's life. Emotions swirl as husband and wife adjust to the demands of the newest member of the family.

But the birth of their youngest daughter brought Steve and Chris Schulz of Elkton more worries than usual.

Higher levels of hormones caused by her pregnancy caused a tumor to grow on Chris Schulz's tongue, making breathing and eating difficult.

The seven months since the birth of daughter Danielle have been months of fear and uncertainty for the couple.

And more fear and uncertainty face them in the next few months, as Chris Schulz faces at least three bouts of laser surgery aimed at removing the tumor.

Even further down the road, if those surgeries are unsuccessful, she could lose at least two-thirds of her tongue.

When Schulz first noticed the tumor, a doctor prescribed antibiotics. A 10-day dose of those drugs, though, had no effect and started the long road through the offices of doctors in Michigan and Minnesota. Those doctors had a difficult time diagnosing her complaint, as it was nothing they had ever seen before.

At an Ann Arbor hospital, Schulz underwent a biopsy, usually a 45-minute procedure. But the tumor, which doctors found was made up of many blood vessels fed by one large one, swelled and bled uncontrollably, forcing doctors to perform a tracheostomy so she could again breathe.

"They wanted to amputate two-thirds of my tongue at Ann Arbor, but I felt there had to be something else," Schulz said.

After recovering from the biopsy, she met with yet another doctor, who referred her to the world-famous Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., in October.

Doctors at the clinic prescribed a round of steroids, but they have failed to shrink the tumor.

On her last visit a month ago on Oct. 13, Mayo clinic doctors decided on laser sur-

gery to cauterize the many blood vessels in the tumor, in hopes of cutting off its nutrient supply and causing it to shrink.

"The doctors say that it may take three laser surgeries to get rid of the tumor," Schulz said. "They also said it will swell a lot after each surgery."

"My doctor didn't say it but I got the feeling that he considers it an exploratory surgery because this type of tumor is so rare."

If the laser surgeries fail, Schulz will probably have to undergo amputation of most of her tongue. Two years could pass before she would be able to talk again, as the remaining tongue tissue fills out into her mouth.

"It's especially scary because I have three little ones to care for," Schulz said. "It's been especially hard on my oldest."

Four-year-old Matthew understands some of his parents' travails, but mainly what he knows is that something is wrong with his mother.

Two-year old Chelsie has the typical self-centeredness of the young child, while youngest daughter Danielle is too young to care little about anything but being fed and loved.

Her tracheostomy has probably been the scariest part of her treatment, Schulz said. "When I woke up with the

trach it was very scary," she said. "It's a scary way to breathe because you can't feel yourself breathing."

A public health nurse visits her once a week to check on the tumor and a respiratory therapist to take care of the cool mist machine that she hooks up to her tracheostomy every night.

The therapist also checks Schulz's lungs for signs of pneumonia, a real danger for her because of the hole in her throat.

Added to the worries about the future of her health are the worries about the family's finances.

Steve Schulz has been working as many hours as possible at his job with Thumb Truck Equipment, but doctors' bills and travel expenses threaten to overwhelm the young couple.

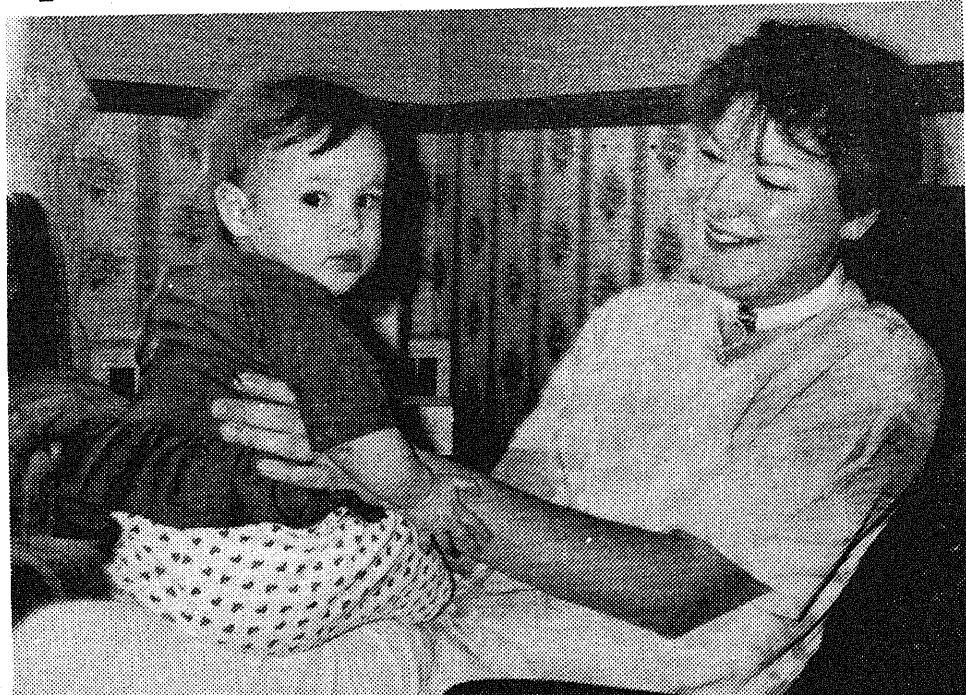
Steve Schulz's insurance covers 80 percent of medical bills, but for some reason hasn't paid for the \$109 office call bills from her doctor at the Mayo Clinic. Added to Chris Schulz's bills are those rung up by young Matthew's stay in the hospital a couple of weeks ago, caused by dehydration from flu.

But medical bills aren't the only problem.

Each trip to Minnesota costs the Schulzes over \$500 for car expenses, meals and motel rooms.

"Sometimes it's over-

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Christian Care Network helps keep cold away

If this past summer and fall weather is any indication, winter '92-'93 should be a rough one for Michigan.

And if temperatures drop below normal, or stay in the dungeon for a long time, some Huron County residents will be hard-pressed to pay their heating bills.

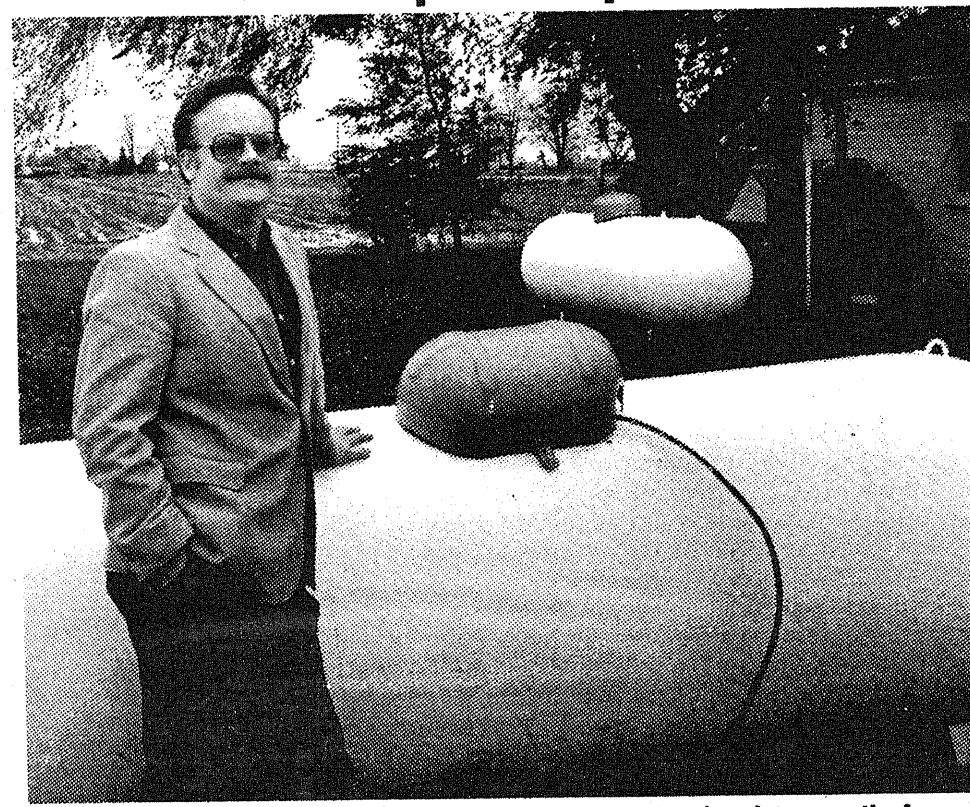
But there is help available for people needing help paying utility bills this winter, from the Huron County Christian Care Network.

The Network is a non-profit organization formed in 1991 to provide emergency assistance to needy citizens in the county, focusing this year on energy bills.

Rev. George Lewis of Kilmanagh United Methodist Church and a trustee of HCCCN says at least 15-30 county churches are represented at each meeting of the group.

"We took a look at what churches were doing in the county with their food pantries and other programs. We wanted to meet needs that churches were not meeting," Rev. Lewis says.

They decided to focus on energy assistance after welfare rolls were cut last fall and the state cut off funds for heating assistance. State De-

partment of Social Service or Human Development Commission clients who have exhausted all other resources are referred to HCCCN when their gas or electric is in danger of being shut off, Rev. Lewis says.

FYI: Here's how to help

Donors are invited to send checks to the Huron County Christian Care Network, P.O. Box 42, Bad Axe, MI 48413.

The group also maintains contact with Detroit Edison, Consumers Power and other utility companies in an effort to keep utilities from being shut off for non-payment.

"Consumers Power has a box on their bill where customers can donate a dollar or two for these energy protection programs," Rev. Lewis says. "Those are very helpful."

But HCCCN focuses exclusively on the needs of people in Huron County, he says. "We want to provide these people with a warm home. Our call in Scripture is that God's heart is poured out to people in need. We realize that God feels for people who are hurting," Rev. Lewis says.

Many small churches have the desire to help needy families but are unable to because of the size of their congregations.

But by donating to the HCCCN, they can be sure their money is used for a specific purpose.

"We have seen as we all came together that we can do tremendous things," Rev. Lewis says. By putting aside denominational barriers, the group can focus on providing help where it's needed most.

HCCCN paid over \$1,300 in utility and fuel oil bills last winter and expects to spend more than that this year, Rev. Lewis notes.

"As the needs have come in, we've met them. But right now we're turning away requests because our funds are extremely low. We expect that we'll have to turn down some requests this winter, but we're doing the best we can."

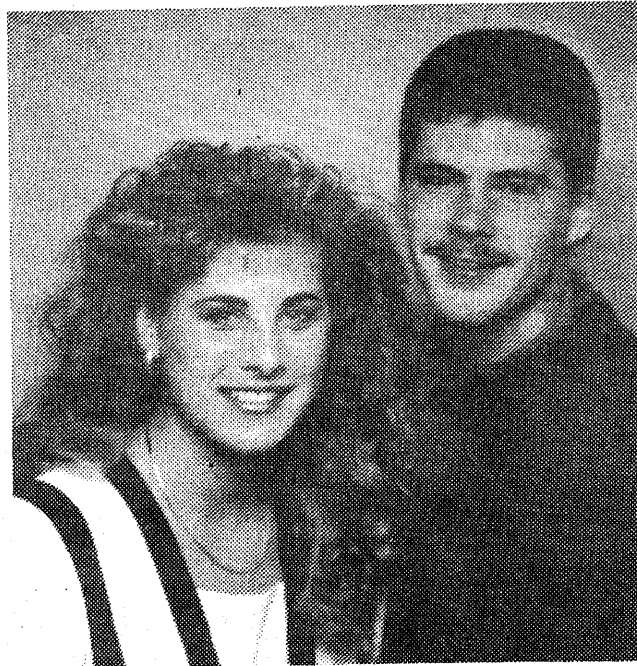

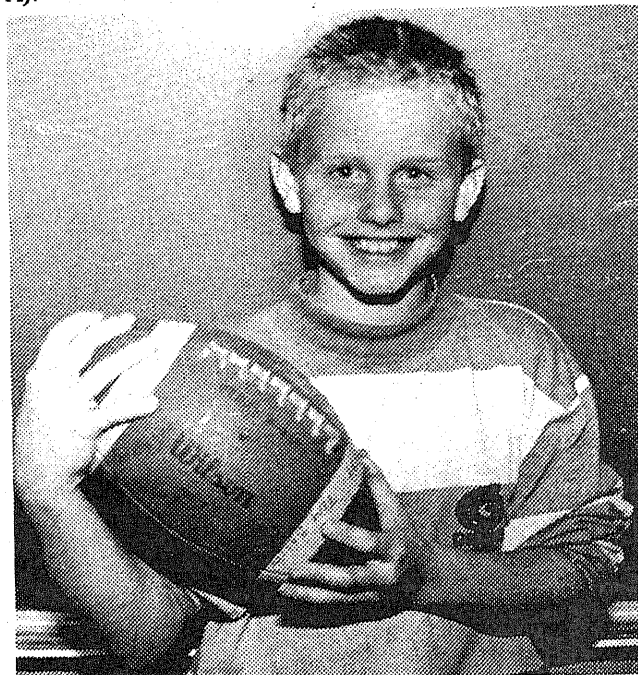

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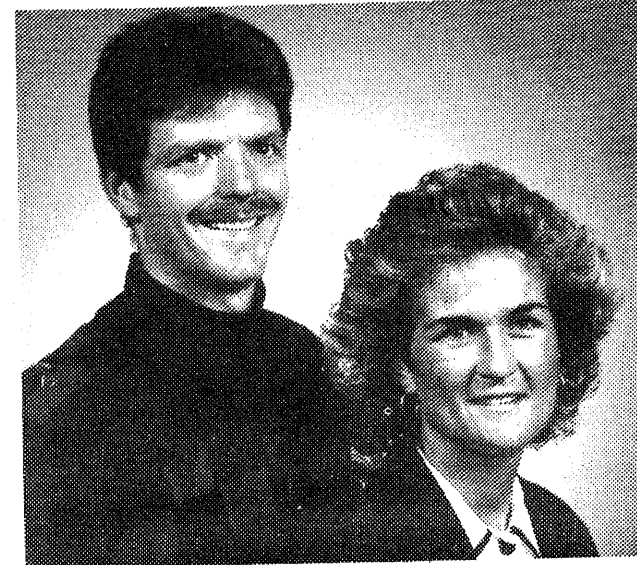

A graduate of Oak Hills Bible College and Michigan State University, Rozema was previously employed by Bloomer Enterprises for



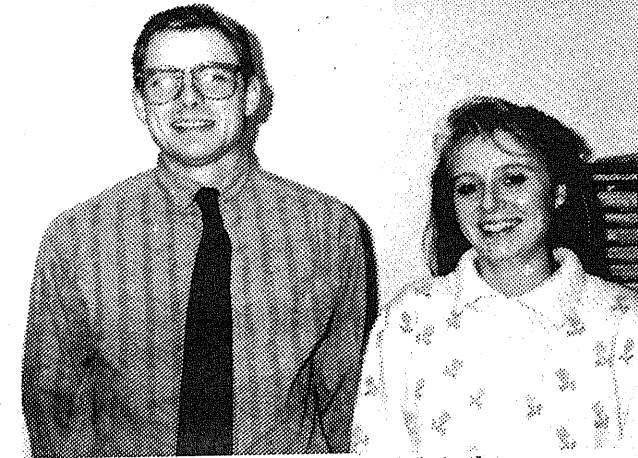

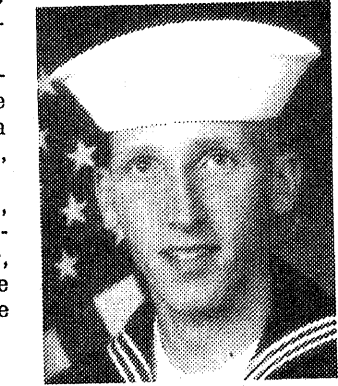

Tanks, but no 'tanks fee' for Unionville, thanks to Niedrich

An alert Unionville Village Clerk Harvey Niedrich saved the community from becoming a victim of a statewide scam.

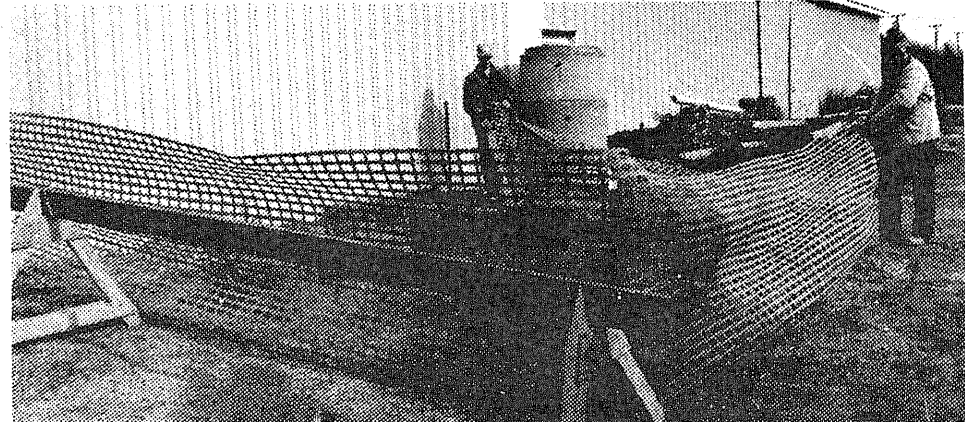
Bogus letters were sent to communities throughout the state, including Unionville, seeking payment of \$50 per tank surcharge to a Lansing address to keep them enrolled in an insurance program — one that doesn't exist.

The Michigan State Police Fire Marshal's Office has arrested the person conducting the fraudulent gas tank removal surcharge, said Tuscola County Cooperative Extension Director Dennis Stein.

"This person was arrested for sending some 15,000 letters to underground storage tank owners across the state," said Stein.

The State Police Department is advising officials who sent in \$50 checks to the bogus company call 1-800-827-8277.

State Police Fire Marshal officials say they feel they have collected all the checks sent to the post office box before they were cashed.

The past few weeks were both interesting and exciting as we came in contact

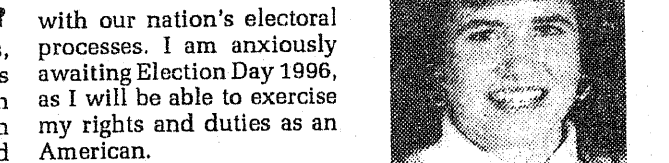
with our nation's electoral processes. I am anxiously awaiting Election Day 1996, as I will be able to exercise my rights and duties as an American.

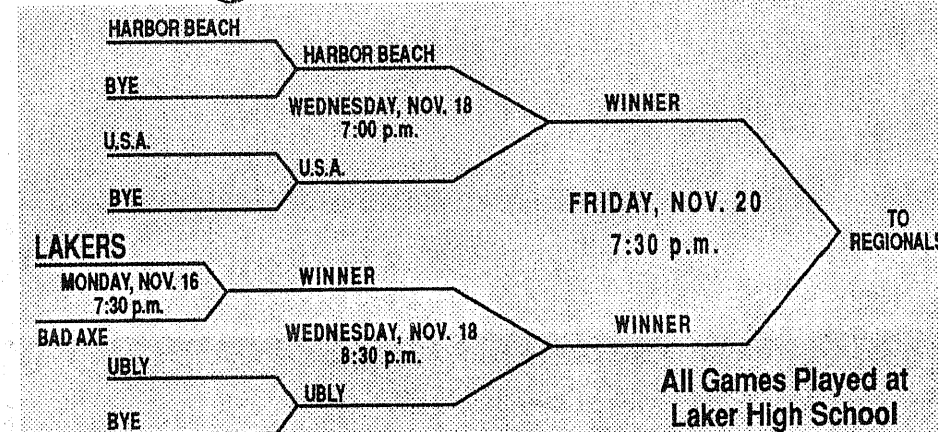

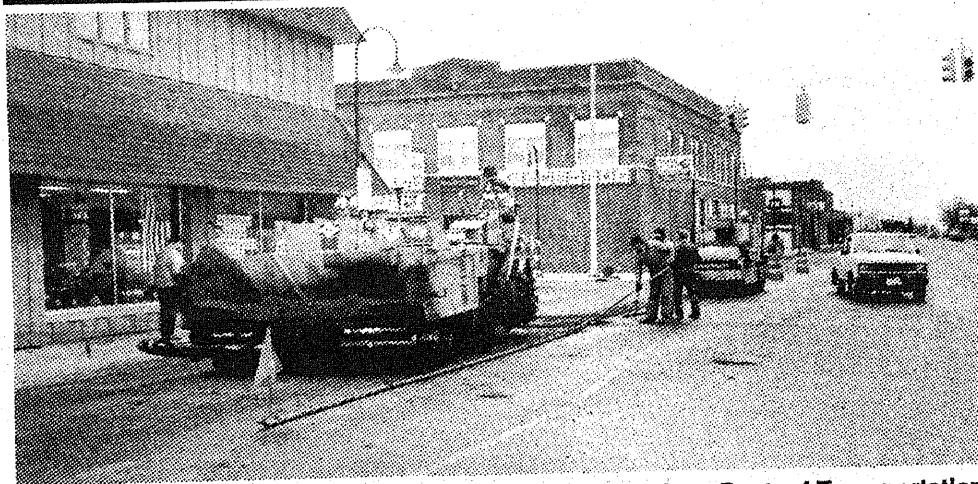

EXTENT OF FUNERAL EXPENSES

Whether small and simple or large and elaborate, categories of funeral expenses are generally the same. There are the costs associated with the disposition of the body. If earth interred, there is the cost of the grave and the charge for opening and closing it. If cremated, there is the charge for the cremation, plus the cost of an urn in which to place the cremated remains. Along with this comes the costs for memorialization, such as a monument or marker for the grave or a niche in a columbarium for the urn.

These include such items as: honoraria, flowers, newspaper death notices, additional limousines, burial clothing, and out-of-town transportation of the body.
