Scarlet Fever. In as much as scarlet fever has been raging to some extent for the last six or seven months in this village and vicinity, it becomes the duty of this Board to instruct the people somewhat in regard to its nature, the means to be used in preventing its further spread. **Scarlet fever or scarlatina is now generally believed by physicians and public health officers to be one of the most contagious diseases; that it may be communicated from one to another by contact and that the contagion or poison which gives rise to it may be conveyed by infected clothing, toys, books, etc., or by any of the discharges from the body of a patient with this disease. One attack usually prevents another. Much may therefore be done to limit the spread of the disease by their nurses or those coming in contact with them, from the public, and by the thorough use of ventilation and disinfection.**
