STATE FAIR AT DETROIT SHOWS A PROFIT OF \$40,000.

PONTIAC MAN TELLS THRILLING STORY OF IMPRISONMENT

IN PANAMA. TWO MEN MURDERED IN ROSCOM OF A WOMAN.

State Fair's Good Showing. Secretary Butterfield's figures show that the total receipts of the state fair aggregated \$38,604, of which \$68. 04 were gate receipts. The gate re ceipts last year at Pontiac were \$18, 513. The net profits this year are said to be about \$40,000. It is estimated

that the total attendance was 200,000 President-elect Fred Postal and Di rector A. E. Stevenson, of Port Hu ron, will go to Grand Rapids to visit the West Michigan fair, and to the state fair at Springfield, Ill., to pick up ideas which may be of value in making improvements for next year. Postal says he has no intention dominating the state fair manage ment and he wants no action taker without the full co-operation of the other members on the board.

#### Pontiac Man's Story.

Fred Walker, of Pontiac, Mich., recently released from a prison in Panama, has arrived home. His imprison ment was said to have been caused by American mining interests near whose territory Walker himself was

conducting mining operations.

Walker told some of the adventures which beful him during the period when his enemies were trying either when his enemies were trying either to thwart his work or to cause his disappearance. This struggle against odds began as long ago as 1901, when he first went to Colombia to look after his interests in a mine there. While sailing to his destination a Chinese-Filipino, one of the crew, stole his papers and cash box and made off with them.

Last spring he says he found that part of a mine known as the Old Aub-erette, had been covered by a landslide and that there was copper ore near this landslide. He then went to the alcalde, or mayor, at Canazas, to file his proof of finding copper, but the alcalde refused to recognize the proofs, claiming others were ahead of him and detained him there for 17 days. Then he says the sicalde built a fence about part of the property and threw him into prison.

Their Blood Away. Scores-of canaries and other birds in Baltimore, Md., are the victims of the merciless attacks of mosquitoes. are chopping off the gowns right at Great numbers of birds become weak

insects at night. "Scores of birds die in this city each year," said James A. Graham, s canary fancier, "of the attacks of mosquitoes. At a recent meeting of the Royal Geographical society Alexander Whyte gave this account of his experiences n the interior of Liberia; "For weeks and weeks I have traveled through districts where no white man has been seen before and naturally enough met with considerable difficulty in getting from tribe to tribe. They are very jealous and envious of one another and their chief purpose when they get white man among them is to him there, and the difficulty is to set from village to village. Their great object is to do away with roads and everything in the shape of a road or bridge.
