CARE OF LEATHER FURNITURE

Mixture of Vinegar, Whites of Eggs and Turpentine Makes Good Cleaning Compound.

The cleaning of leather upholstered furniture is a question that concerns almost every housewife, for those who do not possess a good cleaning compound, the padded leather chairs, sofas and the leather ottomans, that require brushing three or four times a year.

In preparing to clean such a piece it is best to have the necessary materials at hand, so that the work can be finished at once and without risk of marring the furniture. A good cleaning compound is a liability if the different operations of the work were not done in the proper order.

Prepare three large size cheese-cloths, a basinful of tepid or nearly tepid water, to which has been added a little vinegar, a tablespoonful, and a mixture of the whites of two eggs and a half pint of turpentine. The mixture is stirred until the whites of the eggs are frothy and placed in a bottle before the turpentine, and then the application of it is well shaken in the bottle.

When one speaks of California the Yosemite Park naturally comes to mind. As long ago as 1851 an act of congress granted the Yosemite valley and the Mariposa Grove of giant sequoias to the State of California for public use and recreation. The legislature of California by the act approved March 3, 1909, re-created the jurisdiction over this tract of the United States, and only since June 11, 1906, has the management of the Yosemite National Park been under the control of the federal government.
