50 SAVED FROM BOILING SEA ON COAST OF OREGON

Tug Rescues Steam Schooner Wash ington After an Almost Hopeless Battle With Glant Waves,

Astoria Ore. Nov. 14.—After one of the most perilous and sensational marine experiences for many years at the mouth of the Columbia river, the steamer schooner Washington is now safe in port in tow of the tug Tatoosh, Captain Bailey, which at great risk and with dogged persistence, suc ceeded in passing a line aboard when practically all hope of saving the 50 souls aboard and the unfortunate ves sel was gone.

Owing to the location of the ship the iffe-savers could not get anywhere near her, and could only watch from the shore, powerless to render any as sistance whatever. for rescue was that the ship would drift close enough to shore so that a line could be shot aboard and the peo ple brought to land with the aid of the preeches buoy. Anchors were put out fore and aft


