London, Dec. 16 .- The workingman's compulsory insurance act, providing for compulsory insurance against sick ness and non-employment, is practically a law. It passed the house of lords and needs only the king's signature to make it effective.

> SENATE MAY MODIFY WORDING OF RESOLUTION.

Will Put an End to the Treaty, But Cut Out Accusation That It Has Been Violated by Russian Government.

The Russian government has in-formally informed this government that the Sulzer resolution proposing to terminate the treaty of 1832 with Russia is offensive to the czar's government. This is the resolution that the house passed a few days ago by a vote of 300 to 1.

Russia has not lodged any formal protest with the state department.

The new ambassador from St. Petersburg, George Bakhmetieff, has, how-ever, made it clear to both President Taft and Secretary Knox what the views of the Russian government are in regard to the document introduced by the New York state representa-

Russia is incensed at the wording of the measure, not at the proposed termination of the treaty. Russia does not question the right of the United States to denounce the treaty, but: considers the Sulzer resolution as unnecessarily offensive and will regard the termination of the treaty under this resolution as an unfriendly act on the part of the United States.

The resolution plainly states that the treaty is to be terminated because Russia has violated it.

The views of the Russian government were apparently communicated to Secretary Knox and President Taft by the Russian ambassador. It is practically certain that the senate committee will refuse to accept the Sulzer resolution in its present form. The committee probably will recommend a resolution merely proposing a termination of the convention with Russia, diplomatically omitting any reference to the why and Therefore the whys and wherefores.
