At this season of the year, when "Christmas" are in their prime, it seems good to add a few of the recipes which we use them.

Maple Parfait—Beat four eggs slightly and pour a cup of hot maple syrup over them. Sprinkle with a third of a cup of brown sugar.

Orange Pekoe Ice Cream—Scald a quart of milk with two cups of sugar. Add a half cup of orange pekoe tea. Let stand five minutes. Beat the yolks of four eggs.
