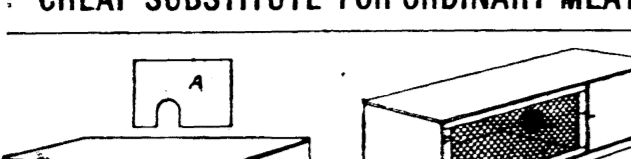

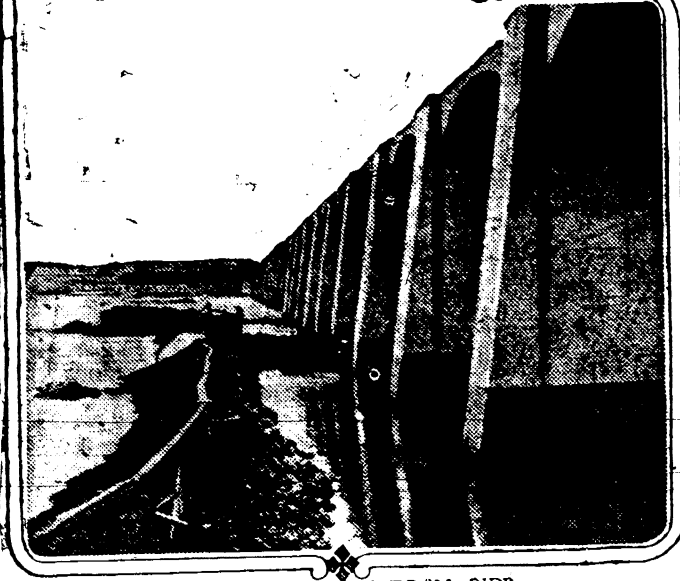

# Water Power of World Wide Effects



SECTION OF DOWNSTREAM SIDE

IN THE heart of the United States, but at a point which is one of the nearest by transportation routes to the countries of Central and South America, is being built a giant water power plant which will greatly affect for good not only its immediate environment, the Mississippi valley, but the whole nation and all the nations in Pan America. The colossal size of the water power there would cause appreciable effects anywhere in the world, and it is located almost exactly at the point where its commercial influence may be exerted most easily and effectively upon world commerce.

The achievement nearing completion is the damming of the mighty Mississippi river, harnessing it to turbine wheels and electric generators and distributing its tremendous power over one hundred miles and more of the most efficient portion of the United States on a direct traffic line to the rest of the western hemisphere. It is not only an unparalleled engineering achievement, but also perhaps the greatest single economic force being fung into the world by the hand of man, excepting only the Panama canal.

Nearly Mile Long.

The basis of the water power development at Keokuk, in the southeastern corner of the state of Iowa, is a great dam extending for nine-tenths of a mile from the Illinois bluff to its junction with the titanic power house near the Iowa shore. This dam is a composite structure of 119 arched spans, all alike, with piers six feet thick thirty feet apart, and spillways in the spans, all alike, over which the water will flow. This dam is a monolith of massive concrete dam down several feet into the hard rock bottom of the Mississippi, but impounding the water by its immense weight. The structure, with the exterior appearance of a bridge, is 53 feet high, 42 feet wide at the bottom, and 29 feet wide on top; the spillways between the piers are 32 feet high, fill the width of the dam at the bottom, have vertical upstream faces, and their downstream face is an ogee curve which delivers the water at the bottom horizontally to the river current. On top of each spillway will be a steel gate 11 feet high. By varying the number of these gates, which are open and closed, the amount of water flowing over the dam will be regulated with the result that at varying stages of the river the pool above the dam will have always an unvarying depth and its surface will always remain at the same place.

The water wheel itself is another example of overcoming the impossible, for experts said that it was impossible to build a turbine which would meet the unusual conditions there. But Chief Engineer Cooper called a council of war and a little later rose from the head of that table with a new design of turbine which tests show has 86 per cent of efficiency as compared with the next best result ever obtained of 75 per cent, and a textbook figure of 75 per cent. It is engineering calculations. The 30 turbine wheels in the Keokuk power house are several times as large in dimensions as any ever made before. Each is at the lower end of a shaft 25 inches in diameter, on the upper end of which is the revolving part of the electric generator standing on the power-house floor. The revolving shaft, with its machines at each end, weighs about 552,000 pounds, and is supported on one bearing which is lubricated by forcing oil between its surfaces at a pressure of 250 pounds to the square inch. ## UNCOVER AN ANCIENT CITY

Ostia Centuries Ago Was One of the Most Important of Rome's Centers of Population.

Pompeii has a rival in Ostia. The third international archaeological congress met in Rome recently and took a day's excursion to vanished Ostia. But few even of those learned men realized the importance of the excavations there going on.

Ostia was founded in the third century B. C., and was about 15 miles from Rome on an island, at the mouth of the Tiber. It was from this port that the naval expeditions set out that made Rome the mistress of the Mediterranean.

When wars of conquest gave way to commerce Ostia was the seaport of the capital of the world, and at the height of its prosperity had 80,000 inhabitants. Besides being a business center it was a favorite summer resort for Romans.

But with the fall of the empire Ostia declined. The raids of the barbarians and of the Saracens ruined the city.

## HOW TO FRY DOUGHNUT

SIMPLE METHOD TO RELIEVE TASK OF DRUDGERY.

Cutting and Extra Steps One Way to Lighten the Housewife's Labors—Potatoes Should Be Cooked in Their Skins.

Frying doughnuts is a task that is apt to make a great deal of extra work. The woman brings the doughnuts from the pantry on the cake board and holds it in her left hand while she drops the doughnuts in the kettle of fat. The cake board is heavy, the strain is severe and the woman is apt to make many trips between the pantry and the kitchen range.

All this unnecessary work could be done away with by the very simple method of placing the cake board on a shelf above the range within the range which is generally at just the right height to enable her to take them from the board and drop them in the kettle, thereby saving many trips to and from the pantry and also the strength that is used up in holding a heavy board.

In washing potatoes most women scrub and rub and whirl them about with their hands, taking perhaps about 10 to 15 minutes to get them thoroughly clean, when a little 10-cent scrubbing brush would clean them in 3 or 4 minutes, and the scrubbing brush to be used only for this purpose.

In this enlightened age it is to be hoped that no housewife peels potatoes before cooking them, as it is well known that all the valuable food salts are lost under the skin in peeling them before cooking this valuable nutrition is wasted.

In backing stores canvas gloves slipped over the hands will save ten minutes or more in scrubbing at the sink to get the backing from the hands.

The ashes from the kitchen range should always be removed just before washing the kitchen floor, otherwise the housewife is very apt to wash her floor and find she has to remove the ashes and this will generally result in two or three nasty smooches on the floor, as it is practically impossible, even with the greatest of care, to remove ashes without spilling at least a few grains.

### Stuffed Onions.

Cook 10 or 12 onions in salted water, changing the water twice, about an hour, or until nearly tender, drain and cool. Take out the center of each onion without disturbing the outside layer. To this add six mashes, sautéed five minutes in butter. Chop fine, add half a cup of bread crumbs and white sauce or cream to mix. Season with salt, pepper and butter, and fill the open space in the onions with the mixture. Put in a buttered baking dish, sprinkle the top with three-fourths of a cup of cracker crumbs, stirred into a fourth of a cup of melted butter, and bake about 20 minutes, basting carefully with a little butter and hot water. The onions may also be stuffed with pork sausages.

### Rice Bavarian Cream.

Put a little lemon jelly into a wet ring mold and allow it to set. Wash one cupful rice in several waters and boil it in boiling water quickly for 15 minutes. Drain, add two cupfuls milk and cook slowly until rice is tender and milk absorbed. Dissolve one level tablespoonful boiling gelatin with one-half cupful of water, add it to rice and sugar with one teaspoonful vanilla extract with one teaspoonful whipped cream. When cool pour into prepared mold and leave in cool place until set. Turn out and serve with stewed fruit in the center.

### Apple Tapioca.

Pour over three-fourth cup of pearl tapioca, which has been well washed, about a quart of warm water and cook in a double boiler until transparent. Stir often. Add one-half teaspoon of salt. Peel and core six apples, put in a round baking dish and fill holes where the cores came out with sugar. Pour the tapioca over and bake till apples are soft. If you want to prepare this in a hurry steam the apples while the tapioca is cooking and then it bakes very quickly. Eat with sugar and cream.

### Cleaning Coarse Furs.

Water will not clean the coarse furs, such as are used for carriage robes. In fact, they may be scrubbed with hot soapsuds, using a pure white soap, afterward using a comb with strong teeth through the fur. Fat on fur can be removed by using turpentine.

Small, dark furs can be cleaned by sponging with alcohol. Hot cornmeal rubbed into fur will help to restore any lost luster.

### Spoon Bread.

Into a pint of nice sour milk break one egg. Sift together into the sour milk one heaping teaspoonful of white corn meal, half a teaspoonful of salt and a half teaspoonful of soda and beat thoroughly together. Have a well-greased pan, holding a quart, on the stove heating, and when very hot pour the batter into it and put into very hot oven. It should be done a little brown in 15 minutes, and must be served at once.—Commoner.

### A Turkish Dish.

Stew one cup of cold lamb with one teaspoon of minced onion in one cup of water until very tender. Skim out the meat and add to the water enough strained tomato to make one pint, or use more water if you have not enough of the tomato. Season highly with salt and pepper and a little curry or chutney sauce.

### Veal Scallop.

Chop cold roast veal very fine, put a layer in the bottom of a pudding dish, season with salt and pepper cover with a layer of rolled crackers and bits of butter; wet well with milk and continue until dish is full. Wet the whole with beef and milk; in vent a pan over it so to remain steam and bake one-half hour.

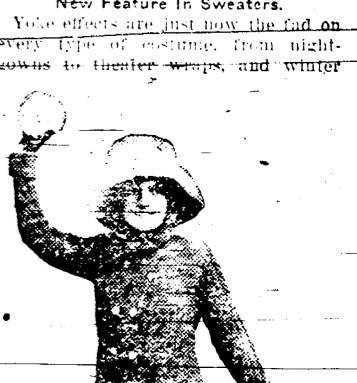

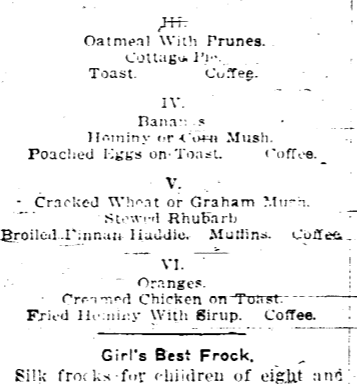
