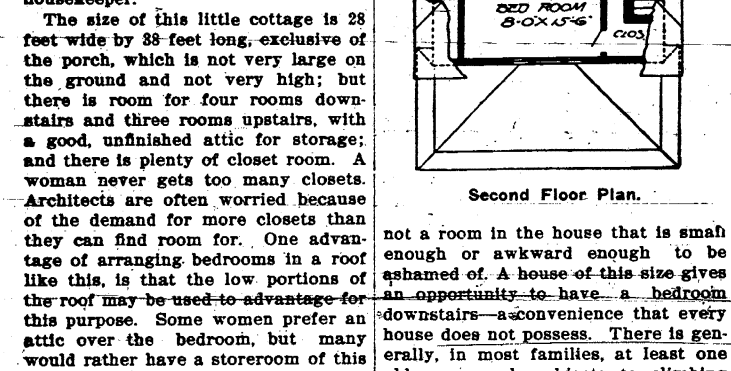

Home Town Helps

Los Angeles is Facing Problem That is Common to Most Growing American Cities.

Every city has a housing problem which is in some respect peculiar and characteristic. In Los Angeles the problem is to be found in a prevalent type of "house courts."

In places thus described a considerable part of the labor population of Los Angeles lives. There are recorded in the office of the city's housing department 10,000 such tenements.

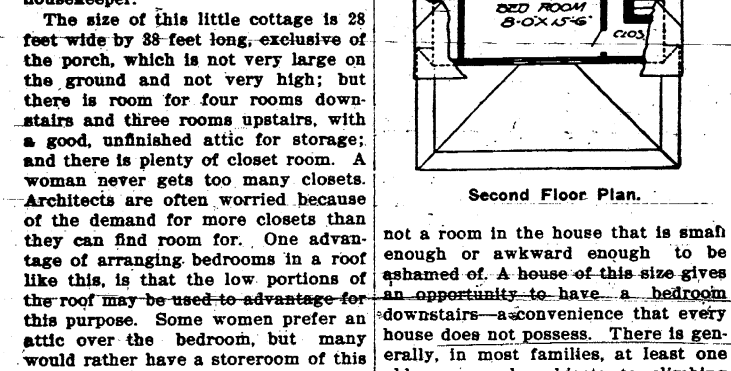

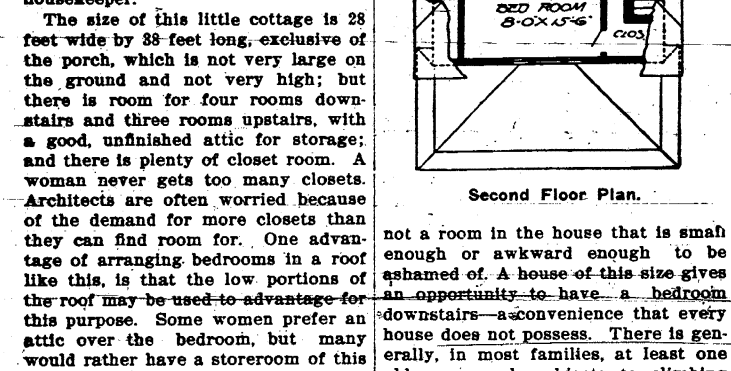

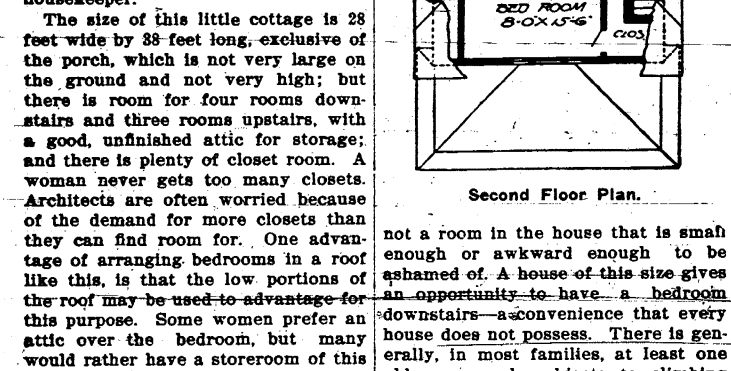
