T is true even upon the lowest plane

that without shedding of blood there is nothing, no mighty result, no achievement, no triumph. Every worthy deed costs something; no high thing can be done easily. No great thing can be accomplished without the shedding of blood. Life is just our chance of making this great and strange discovery. Many of make it. We begin by trifling, by working with a fraction of our strength. We soon see that nothing comes of that. At last, if we are wise, we see that all the strength is needed. What have we beside this? We must disrobe ourselves. We do it; yet our object remains ungained. What more have we to give? We have our blood. So at last the blood s shed, the life is parted with, and he goal is reached. We are happy I we know that everything noble and induring in this world is accomplished by the shedding of blood, not mere ly the concentration of the heart and eul and mind on one object, but the pruning and even the maiming of life. Young men are being taught this les son now, and unless all signs are false they will be taught it more sternly in

Without shedding of blood there is no remission. There has been from the beginning a profound and solemn witness in the human heart to this. Many of the primitive religious ideas are God's deep preparation of the mind and heart of man for the grand gospel of Christianity, the substitution of the Lord Jesus Christ for guilty sinners. This witness is embedded in our language. What is meant by the word "bless?" It is derived from the Anglo-Saxon word for blood. We may legitimately translate this by saying that before we can truly bless another human being we must shed our blood for him. You can lighten a brother's way by cups of cold water, by small gifts, by smiles, by friendly words, and these things are great in the eyes of Christ. But to bless in the superlative degree we must part with

the future.

Doctrine of Atonement, So the Eternal Son shed as it were great drops of blood in Gethsen and offered himself immaculate to God the doctrine of the atonement in terms of human self-sacrifice and self-surrender. But the human analogies help us, and, indeed, the doctrine of the atonement without them would be a mere blank for our minds. 

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL **LESSON**

LESSON FOR SEPTEMBER 21

THE GOLDEN CALF.

LESSON TEXT—Ex. 33:15-20, 20-25. GOLDEN TEXT—"My little children uard yourself from idols."—I John 5:21.

It is incredible that these Israelites hould turn aside after gods made with man's hands in the very midst of such a demonstration of the holiness, majesty and glory of Jehovah. Yet in life it is always but a step from glory to degradation, and one of the easiest moments in which to trip up he saint is at the time of his greatabsolutely unreliable, unstable, may, it is wicked and is desperately deceitful, Jer. 17:9. Following the givng of the decalogue God gave Moses series of laws and ordinances which are an application of that fundamental aw and which form "the book of he covenant." Then the elders of srael are called up into the mountain, the covenant." riven a vision of God, and given to at and drink in his presence, symbolzing communion (Ex. 24). After this Moses and his servant Joshua leave Aaron and Hur in charge of the people and go up again into the mountain. On the seventh day Moses entered the cloud and remained for a period of 40 lays during which time he received the pattern of the tabernacle and the period of time that the people sinned. The first part of this chapter tells is the fact of the casting of the calf. vv. 1-6. God's righteous anger and Moses' prayer of intercession, vv. 7:14. srael's boast, 19:8, 24:3, 7, is now revealed as being but utter weakness and illustrates the worthlessness and anreliability of human nature. irunkard's promised sobriety, the unclean man's promised purity, alike melt in the fierce heat of temptation. Their sin was a direct, positive vio ation of the first commandment, and in it they also broke the second. They did not want to substitute but rathe sought a similitude of God. Aaron aere appears in a poor light; he did not like their proposition (vv. 7, 8), but did not have strength of character sufficient to stand against it. Aaron is like those in the church and out of t who prefer to control a movement which is bad rather than to combat the movement in its entirety.

Human Fickleness.

Notice Aaron's attempt to link old ideas with this new-fangled religion, this "modern expression," "tomorrow is the feast of Jehovah," v. 5. Men and women are today attempting to gloss evil teaching and open sin by associating with it the name of Christ. Fo call such an association scientific is a travesty. The fact, however, that Aaron gave the Israelites what they asked for shows that he had son idea at least of God's attitude toward his people. We have here presented also the fickleness of human gratitude. 
