GUESTS ON UPPER FLOORS ARE CAUGHT IN TRAP AND FEW ESCAPE.

TWO MEN KILLED TRYING TO ESCAPE BY LEAPING.

Destruction of Missouri Athletic Club is Marked by One of the Greatest Fire Tragedies of the Year.

St. Louis.—Thirty-five guests lost their lives early Monday morning when fire destroyed the Missouri Athletic club and the Boatmen's bank.

The fire was virtually out at 6 o'clock at night, after burning 16 hours, and a systematic search for bodies was begun.

The building, a seven-story structure, was destroyed, part of the walls falling and only the shell remaining.

The guests on the upper floors were trapped and their only chance of escape in most cases was to climb down red-hot fire escapes, or jump to the roofs of adjoining buildings, 10 feet away.

Wilson Demands Report From Colquitt and U. S. Consul on Removal of Vergara Body.

GET A FEW FACTS OF HUERTA

Mexico City, March 10.—A squad of police recruited from the army was detailed by the war department to guard the American embassy night and day.

President is Aroused. Washington, March 10.—President Wilson expects a full report from Governor Colquitt and American Consul Garrett as to the manner in which the body of Clemente Vergara, American citizen killed in Mexico, was returned to American soil.

After reading the news dispatches, some saying Texas rangers had crossed into Mexico and had availed themselves of permission by the Mexican federal authorities to American Consul Garrett to recover the body, the president and Secretary Bryan conferred.

Get Few Facts from Huerta. The president pointed out that the Huerta government had supplied little information about Vergara, declaring that it would investigate, but expressing the opinion that Vergara had joined the constitutionalists.

Utter rout of the federal forces near Tampico, Mexico, and the advance of the rebels upon the foreign oil fields surrounding that city was reported to the war department by Rear Admiral F. F. Fletcher, commanding the American squadron in American waters.

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END HEARING IN COPPER COUNTRY

CONGRESSMEN FINISH TAKING TESTIMONY IN UPPER PENINSULA.

SHERIFF DENIES PART IN REPORTING MOYER.

Houghton, Mich.—The congressional committee, investigating the copper miners' strike, Saturday night ended its hearings in the copper region.

The committee questioned Sheriff Cruse concerning the Moyer deportation. He declared false the assertions that he was connected with the affair or paid Moyer's and Tanner's fare to Chicago.

Chairman Taylor said he believes congress will adopt legislation forbidding the transporting of "gunmen" from state to state.

A vast amount of testimony was heard Saturday in defense of the sheriff by Congressmen E. T. Taylor, Switzer and Howell, while Congressman S. N. Taylor and Casey examined a score of witnesses concerning the Calumet Christmas eve disaster.

Prosecuting Attorney Lucas called but five witnesses to combat the testimony to support the federation contention that the panic resulted from a cry of fire by a man who wore a Citizens Alliance pin.

Witnesses for Sheriff Cruse told of the south range raid, participated in by Alliance members and the seizure of guns and ammunition in Union hall.

All present prisoner in the county jail testified that prisoners are not mistreated.

Michigan Panama Exposition Meets in State Capitol.

Lansing, Mich.—The Michigan Panama Exposition commission, appointed by the governor to devise ways and means to raise \$60,000 that Michigan may be represented at the exposition, met in the executive chamber Saturday.

The legislature last winter turned down an appropriation bill intended to defray the expenses of having Michigan represented.

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BRITISH CABINET YIELDS TO DEMANDS OF ULSTER

London—Premier Asquith and his cabinet Monday yielded to the demands of the anti-home rule forces of the Ulster counties of Ireland.

Portland, Mich.—Patrick Quinlan, who was said to be one of the few men who might have explained the mystery of "Holmes' Crime Castle," which was famous in the annals of Chicago crime, is dead at his home near here.

Quinlan was a carpenter and was employed by Dr. J. J. Holmes to build the structure. The police held him for a time as a possible accomplice.

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CUNNINGHAM ASKS MANY NEW LAWS

STATE LABOR COMMISSIONER FILES ANNUAL REPORT WITH GOVERNOR.

WANTS FORTY-EIGHT HOUR LAW FOR WOMEN.

He Would Have Counties Empowered to Maintain Free Agencies for Benefit of Unemployed Workers.
