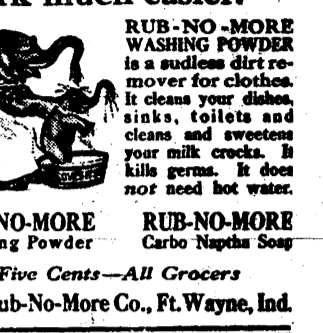

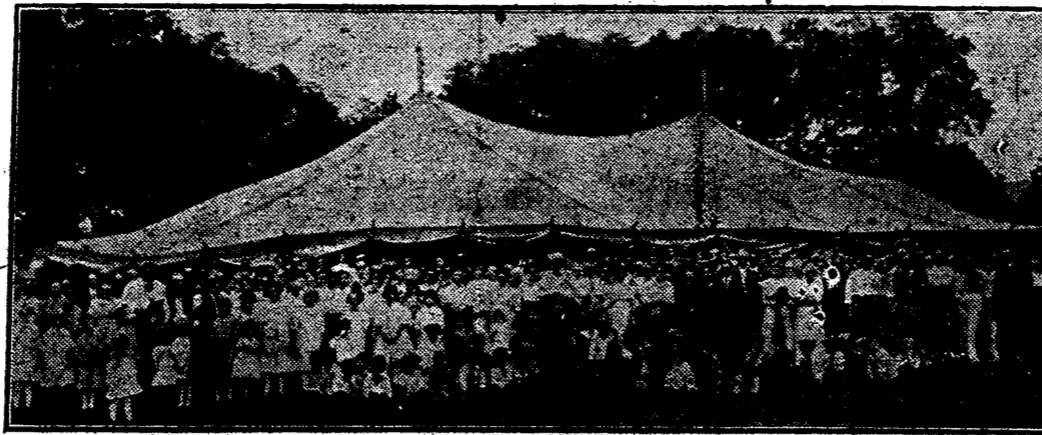

A TYPICAL CHAUTAUQUA SCENE.

The first Chautauqua ever attempted by our citizens began on Friday, July 3rd, and ended Tuesday, July 7th.

Twenty-five of our business and professional men signed a contract with the Central Chautauqua System of Indianapolis, Ind., of which Dr. Harry G. Hill is the manager. They had to guarantee the sale of 450 season tickets at \$1.50 each and furnish seating, a piano, electric lights, etc.

There was a little delay in getting the big tent up and the stage and seating in order Friday and there were only about 250 persons present, but the Illinois Glee Club furnished such good music and Dr. Geo. P. Bible made such an instructive and pleasing address on "Fads and Extremes" that the first entertainment was voted a success and the audience went home to tell their friends and urge their attendance at the succeeding entertainments.

The evening musical and lecture by the same people were even better than in the afternoon. There was also a much larger audience. Saturday being the 4th of July and a national holiday, many had arranged to celebrate it at the lakes and other places. The farmers were also busy in their corn and hay fields but audiences larger than

those of the preceding day greeted the Play-Singers and Gov. Robert S. Yemey who entertained them in a delightful and satisfactory manner.

The sale of season tickets had reached \$16 but the single admissions brought the total receipts up to a more hopeful condition and Sunday, the third day, opened with better prospects for the men who had backed the enterprise.

The Chautauqua program did not interfere with the usual services held at the various churches in the forenoon.

In the afternoon the Morgan-Guller company were somewhat disappointing but James Barkley the cartoonist was so good that it partly made up for their deficiency. In the evening a song recital by the Morgan-Guller company, another talk by Barkley and an illustrated lecture on Panama past and present, by Prof. Frank A. Gause, filled the bill and won generous applause.

Skilton's All-Star University orchestra made splendid music on Monday afternoon and Dr. Harry G. Hill delivered a lecture that captivated the large audience and many words of praise were spoken for those who were instrumental in bringing such a meritorious class of entertainers to the village. The evening entertainment was all music and the orchestra rendered some of the choicest selections from popular operas, etc., in a skillful manner.

At this stage of the chautauqua, Dr. Hill and the committee had agreed how deep the latter would have to go down in their pockets to bring up the deficiency,

but in view of the fact that he would like to make a contract for a chautauqua next year he made a generous concession which materially lightened the burdens of the committee, and not their pocket books so much as they feared. At the evening entertainment pledges were taken of the audience for 516 season tickets which assures the success of next season's chautauqua, and lightens the burdens of the committee somewhat.

A song recital by Miss Mae Sheppard and Miss Gertrude Guller, and child impersonations by Miss Elma B. Smith were greatly enjoyed Monday afternoon. Judge James A. Collins delivered a lecture, "The other half, or against the tide."

In the evening Miss Sheppard gave opera selections and costume songs displaying a voice of rare quality and was freely encored. The readings and impersonations by Miss Elma B. Smith pleased the audience. She displayed her ability to imitate a baby's babble and cry to perfection. Her imitations of birds, etc., were also fine. Judge Collins' lecture closed the program.

While the committee is out a few dollars ahead on the season ticket sale they each feel pleased that the first chautauqua was a success and gladly take an interest in one in 1915 feeling it will be a good thing for the town. It has been an added pleasure to meet and do business with Robert C. Smith the manager who is superintendent of school, at Monroe.
