INTELLIGENT FARMING PAYS BIG PROFITS IN MICHIGAN

By H. J. DANIELS.

Every county in the state of Michigan has its "best farm." And always there are several who have reason for making the claim.

Ask anyone in the vicinity of Cadillac to name over the half-dozen most profitable farms in Wexford county and that of Herbert Snyder would surely be in the list. It is located. about two miles from the village of

The Snyder farm is an ideal farm. It consists of 480 acres. Three hired men and Mr. Snyder are required to farm these acres. They use three teams in doing the farm work.

The important thing about any farm and what gives it the name of being a good farm is the profit it pays.

Mr. Snyder has been farming these same 480 acres for twelve years. His land produces from 150 to 300 bushels of potatoes to the acre. The av erage is 200. Last year he raised 8,000 bushels of potatoes on 40 acres. He sold them for 50 cents per bushel, or \$4,000, an average of \$100 per acre. Mr. Snyder has 40 acres in potatoes this year. He expects to realize another \$4,000 on 1914 tubers.

An average yield of hay on the Snyder farm is two tons to the acre. Mr. Snyder has 175 acres in hay this year. He hopes to have 350 tons of hay when he finishes cutting this year. Hay brings the farmer from \$10 to \$15 per ton, an average of \$12. Mr. Snyder expects to dispose of his hay crop for \$4,000. He has equaled this figure in the past.

So \$8,000 is not an unusual sum for the prosperous Wexford farmer to realize off his two main crops, hay and potatoes. And only 215 acres, or less than half his farm, is in potatoes and

One hundred acres of the remaining 265 acres of land is in wood timber. This section is used for pasture purposes, and in it there are several fresh-water springs, making it an ideal feeding ground for Mr. Snyder's horses and cattle. From the cattle he profits heavily through the sale of milk and cream.

This year Mr. Snyder has 75 acres of his land in oats, 25 acres in wheat, and 45 acres in oats, making a total of 145 acres of land in minor crops. Corn on the Snyder farm for the past 12 years has averaged about 105 crates to the acre and has sold at 35 cents per crate; wheat has averaged 25 bushels to the acre and has sold for an average of \$1 per bushel; and oats have run 40 bushels to the acre and sold at from 40 to 50 cents per bushel or an average of 45 cents.

At this figure Mr. Snyder's 1914 corn crop should bring him some \$2,500; his wheat should sell for \$600; and his oats for \$800, making a total of close to \$4,000 for the three minor crops. Mr. Snyder declares this figure is not too high, and at present his crops look better than this figure to

So he will be a disappointed man if he does not receive \$12,000 for the hay, potatoes, oats, wheat and corn he raises this year.

BEST FRUIT FARM IN THE UNITED STATES.

The expression, a "two story bunga low"-which we often hear-is a misnomer. Properly speaking, a bunga low is but one story high, and is covered with a roof having very little pitch to it. But we are always improving things. It would be utterly impossible for the bungalow to travel across the continent from California as far east as Chicago without receiving the inventive attentions of the western sons of our "Down-East" Yan kee ancestors.

In this plan we have a dwelling of modest dimensions, being 25 feet from front to rear, and 32 feet in with a four-foot extension to make room for a pantry. In this way we get three splendid rooms on the first loor, and they are well arranged for convenience and looks.


Pantries were never properly built until this outside attachment was hit upon. It was born of necessity, like nany other valuable inventions, and was improved upon as occasion demanded. Pantries are intended for the storage of food, both cooked and etherwise. Naturally, pantries should be kept as cool as possible, and they be well ventilated at all times. Light is a necessity, and convenience very important, for the pantry is

lar, so that space is economized to the best advantage.

The material for the walls is concrete, preferably run in molds with provision made for dead air spaces, on the hollow wall principle, as this makes the warmest house because it prevents dampness. And it is the cheapest construction if you take lasting qualities into consideration.

A massive effect is given by the neavy loggia piers. And this loggia, by the way, is considered one of the most attractive parts of the whole house. The square openings are easily fitted with fly screens, so it is adapted for an outdoor summer par-lor; and the size is sufficient to be of some use, as it is 10 feet wide and 20 feet long.

The rooms upstairs are stolen from the roof space. And they are right little rooms, too. When I think back a few years to the time when all such room room was counted as attic space, good only for storage of



In one little house where a pantry attachment like this was built on, the space below was made into a coldfruit room. The main cellar wall was id and straight except for a doorway; and a good, heavy door was hung in the opening. The outside wall under the pantry was carried up in the same solid way, and a good outside window put in, which



was covered with a fine wire screen Shelves were built in this fruit room against the outside wall, from near the cement floor clear up to the ceiling. As the room is eight, feet six inches long this gave considerable shelf room; and it proved a splendid place to store canned fruit, butter, eggs, and such groceries as a person likes to buy in quantities and keep

The fruit room and the pantry

above were connected by means of a dumb-waiter, which has just a box about a foot square and three feet long, vertically open on the front side, and fitted with two shelves in the middle. There was a pulley near the ceiling in the pantry, and a rope with a counterweight on the other end which belanced the box so that it would slide easily up and down. With this convenience it was never necesary to tote things up or down cellar any meal time. Very often the box itself contained everything needed, and it was only a minute's work to pull it up into the pantry.

Another feature in this little house that is quite new, is the stairway built around the big chimney. It not only looks well from the large living room, but it occupies the least important corner of the house; and it lands you upstairs in the middle of the hall. in close proximity to the doors leading into the different rooms. 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
