

TURKEY ALLIED

Now Engaged in Warfare, Including Portugal.

OTHERS MAY BE DRAWN IN

Sultan Has Large Army Officered by Germans, Ready to Take the Field-Turkish Troops Threaten British Occupation of Egypt-Fighting at a Standstill in Western Beiglum-Gen-

London, Nov. 2.—Turkey has defi-nitely thrown its lot with the alliance, and if Portugal is counted there now are 11 powers-Great Britain, France, Russia, Germany, Austria, Belgium, Servia, Montenegro, Portugal, Japan and Turkey—at war, with prospects of four more—Greece, Bulgaria, Italy and Roumania—being drawn in.
