FIGHTING HAS NO RESULT

German and Russian Armies Locked in Bitter Struggle in Prussian Poland.

Petrograd, Nov. 23.-The German column between the Warthe and Vistula rivers, according to today's official reports from Russian Poland, comhence the fighting consists of straight frontal attacks, in which the losses of both armies are heavy, but neither side so far has been able to gain marked advantage.

The Germans, military observers ot advance farther in this region, since the Russian con-centration, which was delayed by bad roads and by lack of railroads, now is complete.

Russian Official Statement The following official report from general headquarters was issued tonight.

"The fighting between the Vistula and the Warthe continues with great persistence. We have obtained some partial successes.

"The fights on the front of Czenstochowa-Cracow have resulted in no essential changes. We have taken 2,000 prisoners and some machine guns. In Galicia the Austrians have evacuated Novy-Sandez under the pressure of our troops."

Austrians Claim Successes. Vienna, Nov. 23.—The following official communication was issued here todav:

"We and our ally continue our attacks successfully in Russian Poland. Several counter-attacks by the enemy have been repulsed. So far the Austro-Hungarian troops have captured 15,000 prisoners.

### MARKETING WORLD'S GREATEST PROBLEM

WE ARE LONG ON PRODUCTION. SHORT ON DISTRIBUTION.

By Peter Radford Lecturer National Farmers' Union

The economic distribution of farm products is today the world's greatest brought its hardships, has clearly em phasized the importance of distribu tion as a factor in American agriculture and promises to give the farmers the co-operation of the govern ment and the business men the solution of their marketing problem.

This result will, in a measure, com pensate us for our war losses, for the business interests and government have been in the main assisting almost exclusively on the production side of agriculture. While the depart ment of agriculture has been dumping tons of literature on the farmer telling him how to produce, the farmer has been dumping tons of products in the nation's garbage can for want of a

The World Will Never Starve. At no time since Adam and Eve were driven from the Garden of Eden have the inhabitants of this world suffered from lack of production, but ome people have gone hungry from the day of creation to this good hour for the lack of proper distribution. Slight variations in production have forced a change in diet and one locality has felt the pinch of want, while another surfeited, but the world as a whole has ever been a land of plenty

We now have less than one-tenth of the tillable land of the earth's surface under cultivation, and we not only ave this surplus area to draw on but it is safe to estimate that in case of dire necessity one-half the earth's population could at the present time knock their living out of the trees of the forest, gather it from wild vines and draw it from streams. No one should become alarmed; the world will never starve.

The consumer has always feared that the producer would not supply him and his fright has found expression on the statute books of our states urged to produce recklessly and without reference to a market, and regardless of the demands of the consumer

Back to the Soil. The city people have been urging each other to move back to the farm but very faw of them have moved We welcome our city cousins back to the soil and this earth's surface contains 16,092,160,000 idle acres of tillable land where they can make a living by tickling the earth with a forked stick, but we do not need them so far as increasing production is concerned; we now have all the producers we can use. The city man has very erroneous ideas of agricultural conditions. The commonly accepted theory that we are short on production is all wrong Our annual increase in production for exceeds that of our increase in population.

The World as a Farm. Taking the world as one big farm, we find two billion acres of land in cultivation. Of this amount there is approximately 750,000,000 acres on the western and 1,260,000,000 acres on the eastern hemisphere, in cultivation. This estimate, of course, does not include grazing lands, forests, etc. where large quantities of meat are

The world's annual crop approximates fifteen billion bushels of ce reals, thirteen billion pounds of fibre and sixty-five million tons of meat. The average annual world crop for the past five years, compared with the

The world shows an average in crease in cereal production of 13 per cent during the past decade, compared with the previous five years, while the world's population shows an increase

of only three per cent.

The gain in production far exceed: that of our increase in population, and it is safe to estimate that the farmer can easily increase production 25 per cent if a remunerative market can be found for the products. In textile fibres the world shows an increase during the past half decade in produc tion of 15 per cent against a popula tion increase of three per cent.

The people of this nation should address themselves to the subject of improved facilities for distribution.

Over-production and crop mortgage force the farmers into ruinous com petition with each other. The remedy lies in organization and in co-opera tion in marketing.
