

HOUSE OF CORRECTION LOSES FORMER MICHIGAN GIRL

Supreme Court Upholds Position of Dairy and Food Department.

Lansing-The state dairy and food department wins in its contention that it has a right to inspect the food used in the Detroit house of correction and while the supreme court was divided, four to four, on the question, when it handed down two opinions Monday, the conviction of Superintendent Bernhardt Jacobs, of the institution, stands affirmed.

Justice Stone wrote the opinion, which says that the house of correction is not embraced within, and was not intended to be embraced within, the provisions of the pure food law, and that the dairy and food inspector Barron, of Howell, recently appointed had no authority to enter the premises. His opinion is signed by Justices Kuhn, Ostrander and Moore.

Justice Brooks, writing the opinion affirming the decision of the recorder's court, says that it is entirely proper for the state dairy and food department to inspect the foods used at the institution; that the state labor de partment would have a right to make are as follows, those names followed inspections as well as the state board of health. The contest for the lord lieutenancy of Ireland has been the most exciting feature of domestic politics in Great Britain during the past year.

Lord Granard, who married Beatrice Ogden Mills, was Lord Wimborne's strongest opponent for the post. Both held offices in the government, but Lord Wimborne, born Ivor Bertie Guest, had the strongest influence with the cabinet, as the Guest family was politically powerful and Winston Churchill used his best efforts to obtain the office for his first cousin.

ALFALFA FEEDER FOR SWINE

Sox Arranged With Opening in Front Will Keep Hogs Supplied With Hay-Little Is Wasted.

A good way to keep the hogs supolied with alfalfa hay is to have a box as shown in the cut on a dry spot just inside the fence, writes L. Olm-sted of Emporia, Kan., in Missouri Valley Farmer. Bolt or nail it to the fence to keep the hogs from rooting it about and upsetting it. The open space should not be too wide or considerable hay will be wasted. The hogs will eat more and waste less if they can get but a sprig or two of hay at a time. The brighter the hay



the better the porkers will like it and the more good it will do them. Be sure to have a cover on the box.

For the encouragement of the farm er who thinks keeping sheep would be a fine thing if he could carry on an extensive business, as is done or the hig western ranches, we quote a Texas wool buyer, who says: "It would be a great thing for the country if every farmer owned a small flock of I buy a great deal of wool at points where there are no ranches near, the produce being grown by the farmers who keep small flocks. I have been often told by such farmers that it costs practically nothing to keep sheep on a farm. They require very little feed. They eat the weeds in the fields and at the same time they enrich the land. I find that the owners of small flocks, as a rule, keep a better grade of sheep and the animals are healthier than are those of the large ranchmen, the wools from the farms always classing higher than



Survivors Continue Raids. But December 16 came this telegram from Manila, Philippine islands:

"Forty men of the crew of the Ger nan cruiser Emden, who were left on Cocos island when the Australian cruiser Sydney discovered the Emden and chased and forced her to run ashore, some time ago, have captured a collier and have mounted two Maxim guns on her and are now raiding commerce in the Pacific, according to a report received here. The report came through officers of the British steamer Malacca, which has arrived at Jolo. The men of the Emden had gone ashore on Cocos island to dismantle the British wireless When the Sydney put in an appearance they fied, but were unable to join their ship. The German party, which is commanded by Lieutenant von Muecke, left Cocos island with a commandeered schooner and plenty of provisions and also their own armed launch and two boats. Where they captured the collier is not stated. The Malacca reports that she steamed to Jolo without showing lights at night."

Fresh Romance of the Sea. And now comes, under date of Paris, December 18, the announcement that the British auxiliary cruiser Empress of Japan had captured the collier Exford having on board the three officers and 40 men of the Emden.

Apparently all the Emden's bravery did not go on the rocks at the behest of the Sydney guns. To be "raiding commerce in the Pacific" on a collier which they had captured, "armed with two Maxim guns" and the rifles and pistols of the landing party, has a dash of something about it that makes one remember that the days of ro mance and adventure are not all over

The London Times said when the Emden was destroyed: "We rejoice that the cruiser has been destroyed at last, but we salute Captain von Muller as a brave and chivalrous foe. We trust his life has been saved, for if he came to London he would receive a generous welcome. Our maritime race knows how to admire a daring and resourceful seaman, and there are few frigate birds, boobies and terns from episodes of modern naval history more remarkable than the meteoric career of the little Emden."


