#### TWELVE DEATHS FROM BURNS

Fatalities During January Were Mostly Among Children.

Lansing-The records of the state fire marshal department show that 12 persons lost their lives by fire and 12 more were seriously burned during January. Ten of the deaths and eight of the seriously burned were children ranging from 2 to 16 years of age. The careless use of kerosene and gasoline was responsible for four deaths and our persons being injured.

Children playing with matches aused four deaths and was the cause of one child being badly burnd. Other causes, such as smoking in bed, children playing around hot stoves or left in house alone during

The careless use of kerosene and gasoline and benzine stove polish caused a property loss of more than \$100,000 during January.
