## KILLED AND HURT BY ROADS IN 1914

STATE RAILROAD COMMISSION HAS COMPILED REPORT FOR YEAR.

ACCIDENTS NUMBER 2.383

Three Hundred and Thirty-Two Deaths Result of Which Fifty-Six Were Employees.-Trespassers Are Greatest Sufferers.

Lansing-There were 2,383 accidents on Michigan railroads during 1914.

In these accidents 332 persons were killed and 2,584 injured, according to the railroad commission figures the compilation of which has just been finished. Of the people killed, 56 were employes, 13 were passengers and 149 were trespassers. Others, unclassified, totaled 114. Of those injured, 1,052 were employes, 804 were passengers 174 were trespassers, and 464 unclass

The largest number of employes killed met death by being struck by locomotives or cars. In this manne 21 lives were snuffed out, while but 12 employes were killed in collisions Seven died from the effects of falling from locomotives or cars; four were killed in derailments; four while coupling or uncoupling cars, and two from defects or failures of roadway or equipment.

Seven passengers met death in collisions; two in jumping off trains and two more were struck by locomotives juries received in getting off the cars and one other was killed by falling from a train.

The chief item in the killed among the unclassified are those who met deaths at grade crossings and 64 were killed in this manner. Forty-four were killed at crossings other than grade crossings and one outsider met death on a station platform.

Out of the 894 passengers hurt, 386 vere injured in collisions; 225 in getting on or off cars; while 135 were hurt in derailments.

Trespassers, struck by trains, but not fatally hurt, numbered 98, and 26 of them were hurt by jumping from the trains. At grade crossing 137 persons, neither passengers nor trespassers, were hurt, while 294 were it at places other than grade cross-

Most Rapid Photographs Ever Taken. The most remarkable set of speed photographs ever taken are a part of the war department's exhibit in Machinery Hall at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, San Francisco. They are pictures of a shell from a 12inch coast defense gun in flight, the set including the various phases of the flight beginning just as the great projectile pokes its nose out of the

mussle of the gun.

The pictures were taken with lens having an exposure period of one five-thousandth of a second, this being the fastest shutter ever manufactured. The exposure at the proper time in the flight of the projectile was made by breaking an electric circuit in a wire stretched across trajectory at the desired point and connecting with the abutter.

One picture shows the shell half-Way out of the muzzle before any smoke and gas has escaped. Another was taken when the shell was two feet from the muzzle but hidden by a heavy ring of smoke. A third shows the shell in flight a hundred feet from the muzzle. The photographs are so perfect and the exposure so rapid that carcely any blur is perceptible. They were taken at Fortress Monroe, Va., un-der the direction of Capt. F. J. Behl of the coast artillery corps and head of the department of enlisted specialists at the Coast Artillery school at Fortress Monroe.

Radium Used to Promote Plant Growth.

Some of the remarkable properties f radium are being demonstrated by an exhibitor in the Liberal Arts build-ing at the Paname-Pacific International Exposition, San Francisco, in conection with a new invention making possible the radiotying of water for nedicinal purposes. Demonstrating the power of this

mineral promoting metabolism a num ber of young plants, some existing with and some without the aid of radium, are shown. Those in the radio active soils are seen to be growing much more rapidly than those in common soil, and to have a more healthy This inventor has found a process

of impregnating terra cotta bricks with radium-bearing minerals, and to small bricks placed in water are said to give it remarkable curative properties. The porous bricks last almost indefinitely, losing only half their potency, it is estimated, in 1,800 years Since the discovery of this mineral it has been found that many celebrated waters, as Carlsbad and Baden Raden Owe their health-giving properties to radium. The inventor claims that his Drocess produces in ordinary waters the qualities of these famous springs. The radium ore used in the manuacture of radioactive terra cotta is known as carnotite, a formation found mainly in Colorado and Utah, and now producing three-fourths of the world's radium. ## GERMANY SENDS **NOTE TO AMERICA** ON SHIP AFFAIR

Places Responsibility For Loss Of Lives On Attitude Of British

**EXPRESSES DEEP REGRET** THAT NEUTRALS ARE LOST

Diplomatic Communication Points Out That Submarine Was Justified in Considering Lusitania As An Armed Vessel Carrying Munitions.

Berlin, via London-The following dispatch has been sent by the German foreign office to the German embass: at Washington:

"Please communicate the following to the state department: The Ger man government desires to express its deepest sympathy at the loss of lives on board the Lusitania. The responsi bility rests, however, with the British government, which, through its plan of starving the civilian population of Germany, has forced Germany to resort to retaliatory measures.

"In spite of the German effer to stop the submarine war in case the starvation plan was given up, British merchant vessels are being generally armed with guns, and have repeated ly tried to ram submarines, so that s previous search was impossible.

Not Ordinary Merchant Ships. "They cannot, therefore be treated as ordinary merchant vessels. A recent declaration made to the British parliament by the parliamentary secretary, in answer to a question by

Berlin Officially Justifies Sinking. Bering via Wireless to London-The following official communica-tion was issued Saturday night: "The Cunard Liner Lusitania was Friday torpedoed by a German submarine and sank.

"The Lusitania was naturally armed with guns, as were recently most of the English mercantile steamers. Moreover, as is well known here, she had large quanti-

ties of war material in her cargo "Her owners, therefore, knew to what danger the passengers were exposed. They alone bear all the responsibility for what has happened:

"Germany, on her part, left nothing undone to repeatedly and strongly warn them. The imperial assador in Washington even went so far as to make a public warning, so as to draw attention to this danger. The English press sneered then at the warning and relied on the protection of the Brit ish fleet to safeguard Atlantic







## Toadstools vs , Mushrooms

As the season has arrived for gather ing mushrooms and some of our readers have already gathered them while others are intending to do so, we will give a word of caution from the U. S. depart- the M. E. church, Sunday morning at paired. neat of agriculturs.

between mushroons and toadstools by any of the so-called "tests," according to specialists of the department, and the only safe method is by studying each species from a botanical standpoint. It is well to look with suspicion upon any mushroom which is not positively known to be edible, and they should never be eaten except when perfectly fresh at the time they are prepared for food. As an aid in identifying the common species of mushrooms and in distinguishing between edible and injurious varieties, the department has ecently issued Bulletin 175, Mushrooms and Other Common Fungi. This bulletin names and describes 159 species of mushrooms and other fungi. The importance of being able to identify poisonous varieties is emphasized by the fact that the list comprises 72 oisonous or suspected species.


