VALUE OF THE "SCRAP HEAP" PRIME FAVORITE WITH THE GOTHAM FANS

"Secondary Metals" Have Added Much to the Wealth of the United States.

In 1914 the value of the "secondary metals," exclusive of gold, silver, plat inum, iron and steel, recovered in the United States was \$57,039.706, accord ing to J. P. Dunlop of the United State geological survey. This is decrease from 1913 of \$15,746,321, the secondary metals recovered in that year being valued at \$72,786,027.

The term "secondary" does not imply that these metals, which are recovered from scrap metal, sweepings, skimmings, drosses, etc., are of interior quality, but it is used to distinguish them from "primary metals." which are derived from ore. While the survey figures relative to lead, zinc, copper, aluminum, tin and antimony given in this statement cover a large field and form an essential addition to the reports on primary metals, the scope of the inquiry probably reveals less than one-half the extent of the wastemetal trade. The value of the old iron and steel reused amounts to millions of dollars.

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
