MILLIONS OF FISH PLANTED IN STATE

REPORT OF COMMISSION FILED GOVERNOR FERRIS.

GRAYLING IS INVITED BACK

Attempt is Made to Again Stock Streams of Michigan With Gamest of All the Finny Tribe.

Lansing-During the calendar years 1913 and 1914 there were planted by the Michigan fish commission in the Michigan fish commission in the waters of the state 134,660,835 fish, from small fry up to fingerlings. They were scattered into almost every township in the state and the commission is certain that a large majority of them were able to hold their own and live. after being placed in the water.

Out of that huge number but a little over 5,000,000 were anything but inland water fish. Lake trout in the output were 5,250,500 but some of these were planted in inland waters

The report of the commission, which has just been filed with Governor Fer ple in the state who ask for fish fry for planting purposes and yet do not plant them. It is intimated that here after each person who gets an allot ment of fish will have to be personally known to the commission, or at least recommended by somebody who can guarantee that the fish will be taken care of.

The commission is trying to bring back the grayling to Michigan waters. Fifty thousand of them were planted each year in the hope that once more this gamest of the game fish could be induced to live in this state. The grayling left Michigan streams some years ago upon the advent, in large numbers, of the brook trout.

In 1913, 50,000 grayling were place in the north branch of the Au Sable river, in Crawford county, while last year 50,000 weredivided between the same stream and the Otter river in Houghton county.



FROM SUBMARINE ANGLO-CALIFORNIAN LOSES NINE MEN IN FURIOUS FIGHTING.

SEAMANSHIP SAVES BOAT

Captain Pilots Ship So That Torped Cannot Be Used and Succeeds Though Losing His Own

Life.

London-The first instance since the war began of a steamer escaping from a submarine while actually under attack was reported Monday from Queenstown when the British steamer Anglo-Californian arrived there with her captain and eight men dead and eight others injured.

Among the dead and injured are said to be several American and Cana dian members of the crew.

The Anglo-Californian, which was bound from Montreal for Liverpool. is said to have been bringing a cargo of horses and war material to England. She is a 7.333 ton vessel and carried a crew of about 100 men.

The fight with the German submarine lasted four hours before the steamer escaped.

The steamer's escape from destruction was accomplished with no other means of defense tha nthe indomitable spirit of her captain and crew, combined with masterly seamanship, enabled her to frustrate the efforts of her assailant to torpedo her

The Anglo-Californian left Montreal for the British Isles on June 24. The submarine was sighted at 8 o'clock Sunday morning. Captain Parslow or dered full steam ahead and wireless calls for assistance were sent out.

WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE FROM THE VIEWPOINT OF LEADING FARMERS.

Why should women vote? That is the question that is ringing from ocean to ocean and reverberating from the Canadian boundary to the Mexican border. It is the mission of a newpaper to give the news and the action of the Texas Farmers' Union in opposing woman's suffrage when that question was recently before the Texas legislature is significant as representing the attitude of the organized plowmen. We reproduce in part the argument presented by Hon. W. D. Lewis, president of the Texas Farmers' Union, in opposing the bill: "It is gratifying to note that it is not the farmer's wife who is clamoring for the ballot. She is too busy trying to make happier homes, mold ing the minds of future citizens and sharing with her husband the cares of life to indulge in political gossip. The ballot will give her no relief from drudgery, give no assistance in clothing the children or bring to the home additional comforts, conveniences or opportunities in life. It is, as a rule, the city woman promoted to idleness

"From many standpoints, perhaps a woman has as much right to vote as a man. So has she as much right to plow as a man; she has as much right to work in a factory as a man she has as much right to shoulder musket as a man, but we would rather she would not do so from choice and we regret that necessity ofttimes compels her to earn a living by engaging in gainful occupations. We do not consider misfortune a qualification for suffrage or a business accident a reason for granting franchise We are opposed to woman at the hallot how the same as we are on posed to woman in the field, in the factory or in the army and for the self-same reasons. We had rather see her plant flowers than sow wheat; gather bouquets than pick cotton and rear children than raise political issues, although she may have as much right to do one as the other.


"Sex qualification for suffrage may have its apparent inconsistencies. No general rule adjusts itself perfectly gument advanced by the proponents of woman's suffrage that many cultivated and noble women are far more capa ble of intelligently exercising sovereignty than a worthless negro, but the South never was anxious for negro suffrage, and while culture and refinement, and even morality, are desirable virtues, they are not the only qualifications for franchise.

The primary, inherent and insep arable fitness for suffrage is support ing a family. The plow handle, the forge and the struggle for bread afford experience necessary to properly mark the ballot. Government is a great big business and civilization from the very beginning assigned woman the home and man the busi ness affairs of life.

"There has been much freakish legislation enacted during the past decade that no doubt appeals to woman's love for the ridiculous, but to undertake to unsex the human race by law is the height of legislative folly and a tragedy to mankind.

"We are opposed to the equal rights of woman-we want her to ever remain our superior. We consider woman's de esire to s Whitehall, and the Ottawa Leather the yellow peril of Twentieth Century civilization.

"Woman is the medium through which angels whisper their messages to mankind; it is her hand that plants thoughts in the intellectual vineyard; it is through her heart that hope, love and sympathy overflow and bless man kind. Christ—the liberator of woman-kind—was satisfied to teach the lessons of life and He was a man. He chose to rule over human hearts and re fused worldly power and men followed after Him, women washed His feet little children climbed upon His knee and the Ruler of the universe said that in Him He was well pleased Can woman find a higher calling?"
