# HCHIGAN NEWS BRIEFS ARABIC DISPUTE MORE HOPEFUL

GERMAN AMBASSADOR CONFERS WITH SECRETARY OF STATE.

EVIDENCE SENT TO BERLIN

America Willing to Accept Assurance of Berlin and to Arbitrate Amount of Indemnity But Not Principle.

Washington-Conferences Monday between President Wilson and Secre tary Lansing and between Secretary Lansing and Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, brought the situation growing out of German submarine activities to the following status:

(1)—The German ambassador has been furnished with the evidence of officers and survivors of the Arabic, all agreeing that the liner was proceeding peacefully when torpedoed without warning, and has been advised that the United States desires a disavowal of the attack and reparation for the American lives lost.

(2)-The evidence will be sent by Count von Bernstorff to the Berlin foreign office, to which it has not een available before, and probably ien days will elapse before Berlin can be heard from. In some quarters it is believed possible that the foreign office upon examining the evidence may change its position, and disavow der, who it was declared in the last attacked the liner because he thought she was about to attack him.

(3)—The United States has all information on the case as it now stands at hand and is ready to decide upon its course, but action may be delayed until Count von Bernstorn has had time to exchange communi-

cations with his government.
(4)—While the United States will not consent to arbitration of a principle nor of a question involving the safety of American lives, it has ac-Germany's assurances that cepted peaceful liners will not be torpedoed without warning, and if Germany desires to arbitrate the amount of indemnity, the question of whether the Arabic actually attempted to attack the submarine or whether her actions justified the submarine commander in leving he was about to be attack ed that probably would be agreed

The president and Secretary Lansing were in conference for nearly an hour, and later Count von Bernstorff spent half an hour with the secretary. No announcements were made.

LAST WAR GOVERNOR DEAD

William Sprague Dies in Paris Aged Eighty-four Years.

Paris—William Sprague, famous civil war governor of Rhode Island and twice United States senator from that state, died at his residence here early Saturday morning at the age of 84 years.

His death was due to meningitis, coupled with the infirmities of age.

General William Sprague was th last of the Civil war governors. He outlived every member of Lincoln's cabinet, every chief executive of the states, and nearly every member of congress, of the war period.

He probably was the youngest man in this country ever elected to the governorship of a state. When only 29 years old, in 1860 he was chosen as Rhode Island's chief executive, serving three consecutive terms of one year each. In his third campaign only 65 votes were cast against him in the whole state,

# ENDS GRASS HOUSE

Passes Away With Indians' March Toward Progress.

Relics of Red Man's Former History Disappear as He Adopts the Architecture of the White Man-Examples of Patience.

Chickasha, Okla.—The grass houses in which the Wichita Indians lived were, until a few years ago, one of the most common sights of the reservation in Caddo county, 18 miles west of this city, but they are being rapidly displaced by the white man's ouse. At the present time there are only four left in the entire reserva-

These grass houses represent Indian ingenuity, patience and skill per-haps more than any other relic remaining of their wild life on the pralrie. > dry. When this was done the squaws' work was finished for a time. When fall came they would go along the swamps and rivers where the grass grows tall, strong and wiry, and would collect bundle after bundle of this grass just as it began to dry.

After the grass was all collected it was made into bundles, all of the same size, and all packed as solid as wood, so as to resist the rains and snows of winter. Then the squaws were ready to begin the actual build-

ing of the home.

The first step was for the Indian brave to decide just where he wished his new home to stand. When this was decided on, the squaws drew a large ring just the size that the new house would be when completed, and in this ring they set the poles, three feet apart.

The poles were all brought together at the top in the center of the house and securely lashed together with strips of bark. Outside of this frame was covered with a network of bark strips to hold the poles secure in their places and to form a foundation upon which to fasten the grass.

Then the tedious work began. The bundles of grass were fastened to these strips so close together that it was impossible for any rain to pa through and the Indian might feel simself safe from any storm. The last stage of the house was

# OUR PUBLIC FORUM



R. C. Duff On Cotton As Contraband.

Hon. R. C. Duff, one of the highest authorities on International law in the nation and one of the most capable citizens in the United States, when asked to Investigate the exporting of cotton and interpret the laws of nations on this subject for the American plow-

man, said in part:
"Article 28 of the Declaration of London reads as follows: "The following may not be declared contra-band of war: (1) raw cotton, wool; silk, etc.' Great Britain is not only a signatory of the Declaration of London, but in fact called the conference and insisted

upon the inclusion of raw cotton on the list of absolute non-contraband. Under this declaration, which was subscribed to by all the maritime nations, we have a right absolutely to ship cotton, not only to neutral ports of Europe, but to Germany and Austria themselves. Humanity shudders at the thought of the death of the splendid Americans who went down on the Lusitania, but humanity would have more cause for shuddering if it could have presented to it in some similarly striking and dramatic way the woe, sorrow and suffering that will be occasioned to multiplied thousands of men, women and children in the Southern states as a result of cotton being forced down to starvation prices.

"The reason why cotton does not command 18 or 20 cents per pound is simply because Great Britain has a naval strangle hold on our shipments and, therefore, on the world supply. England sends her ships of war out, into the open seas, captures American cotton, no matter to whom the same may be destined, carries it into British ports, sets up prize courts of her own nomination, which prize courts, of course, are operating in her favor and which, under such circumstances, after whatever delay they elect to impose, assess the damages of the American shipper at whatever price they see fit and then after having by such process, bought' our cotton, she avails herself of the extraordinary high prices existing on the continent of Europe, The American shipper has no recourse except to the government. The acts of Great Britain referred to, according to the well-recognized principle of International law, constitute war against the United States

"This grievance is now of many months standing and the South is about to bring to market another great crop of cotton. Under such circumstances one would expect that our government, without prompting, would know per well how to deal with acts on the part of the British government amounting to warfare against our trade and country.

"It is not necessary for us to resort to war against Great Britain in re-A simple, adequate and obvious remedy would be for the president to advise Great Britain that unless she respects the law of nations as regards our foreign commerce, he will call on congress to adopt a resolution forbid-


