# MICHIGAN NEWS BRIEFS THIRTEEN DEAD IN

The Presbyterian senate of the state will meet in the new Presbyterian church at Howell in 1916, it has been announced by the pastor. The church will be dedicated November 21. The handsome new mausoleum was dedicated Sunday.

Fire broke out in the grinding room of the chicory plant of E. B. Mueller & Co., at Port Huron. Sunday morn ing, and before the flames were subdued damage to the extent of \$25,000 had been done. The plant will be rebuilt at once.

# PITTSBURG FIRE

TWELVE YOUNG WOMEN WORK-ING IN FACTORY ARE VIC-TIMS OF FLAMES.

### MAN WHO RESCUES SIX DEAD

Blaze Starting in Rear of Feed Store Traps Girls in Box Factory in Third and Fourth Stories.

Pittsburg-Thirteen persons were killed and eight injured by a fire in a four-story building, the two upper floors of which were occupied by the Union Paper Box company, on the north side here Monday afternoon. Of the dead all were young women employed by the company except one. Many of the bodieg were so badly burned as to make identification difficult.

The flames started in a pile of straw in the rear of the feed store of James Brown & Co. on the first floor of the building. William C. Kimbel, general manager of the box factory, at once went to the third and fourth floors and warned the girls employed there to leave quietly. The flames gained headway so rapidly, however, that escape by means of stairways and fire escapes was soon cut off. Some of the girls attempted to go to the dressing room for their hats and there huddled on the floor firemen found a ma-

jority of the hodies. One of the heroes of the fire was Peter Vallon, who is among the dead. When the fire was discovered he was working in the building. He groped his way through the smoke to the he staggered to the street with. the unconscious form of a girl in his arms. 

Seek to Prevent Further Damage to Orchards and Forests - General Clean Up Helps-Creosote

Washington.-The department similar case. agriculture is making a special effort this fall to prevent the spread of gypsy and trown tail moths. It is the purpose of the government experts to put into operation some effective means of reducing further damage to orchards and forests by these pests pests In the area infested by these much effective work can be done to reduce the damage that these insects are likely to cause the following year. according to entomologists of the de

moth spin a web in the fall which remains on the tips of twigs and branches during the winter. These webs should be cut and burned so that injury will be caused by the cater pillars the following summer. Par ticular attention should be given to webs of this insect on trees which grow round dwellings or in or chards

The apple, pear, cherry, oak and willow are among the trees which are favored as food by the brown-tail. moth caternillars. In order to minimize the damage which is likely to result, as much time as possible should be devoted to cutting and burning worthless or seedling apple trees and wild cherry trees and brush. If this is done along the roadway and fences the appearance of the region will be greatly improved.
