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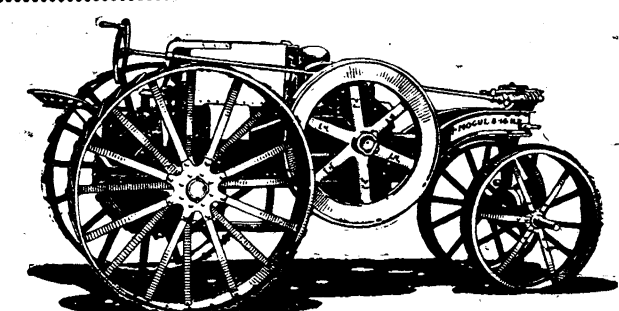

HOUSE DESTROYED BY FIRE

Defective Chimney the Cause and Fire was Not Reversed.

As Mr. & Mrs. Ellen English, who live on their farm one and one quarter miles west of town, were preparing for church Sunday morning they discovered their house was on fire. Mr. English and Mrs. English attempted to extinguish the flames which were on the roof, but the chimney with pipes of water, but a high wind fanned the flames which grew fiercer and fiercer every minute and their scant supply of water proving insufficient they decided to save what they could of the contents.

A telephone call was sent in and soon a number of auto loaded with men and another with the chemical engine trailed behind, were hustled to the scene, but nothing had made such progress that anything could be done to save the house.

The fire was a hot one and the men turned their attention to the barn in order to save them. Had the wind been in the direction of the barns it is doubtful if they could have been saved. Nothing was saved from the upper story of the residence or from the cellar, save a little pig which Mr. English heroically rescued from the latter. Most of the things were taken from the first floor however and the family have moved into part of the Burtless farm house, just east. The loss was a severe one and Mr. & Mrs. English have the sympathy of the community.

This 30 acre farm was known in early days as the Satterlee farm. Arthur Case, who had long owned the place in the village next to the "Car brick yard farm" just east of the old Carrider mill, and at the corner of Territorial road and Jackson street, sold out the farm to the late Mr. Arthur Case, some 40 years ago and afterwards built a new residence upon it, where he resided several years and sold to B. G. English who sold to Edwin English.

The property was insured in the Merchants National fire and Marine Insurance Co. and the owners will meet Saturday to adjust the loss. Mr. English expects to rebuild as soon as possible.

Two or three farmers were in town in sleighs Tuesday morning but we reckon they found bare ground before getting home. However, sleighing is good today.

A considerable number of our village subscribers who live on streets traversed by our rural mail carriers, have put up mail boxes in front of their residences this winter, and are now served by the carriers.

Monday afternoon an old fashioned snow storm set in and soon the ground and most everything else was covered with a generous supply. But at night it ceased snowing and the temperature continued to moderate. Tuesday was a warm bright day.

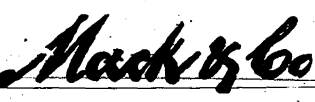
