HAPPENINGS
IN MICHIGAN

CIRCUS TENT BLOWN DOWN BY ELECTRICAL STORM AND TEN INJURED.

STEAMER HUTCHINSON SUNK
Ford Motor Agent Killed in Automobile Collision and Other Interesting News.

Detroit—Ten persons were injured when a circus tent was blown down and considerable discomfort to street car patrons was caused by the worst electrical storm of the season, which passed over Detroit early Sunday afternoon.

For nearly a quarter of an hour hallstones fell, many of them being the size of small hickory nuts. The hail storm was followed by a heavy downfall of rain, lasting half an hour. The hail and rain were accompanied by practically continuous lightning and thunder. The tent was only partly erected when the storm broke. Seeking shelter, about 40 people ran in under the canvas. They had no more than escaped the rain when the wind whipped out the tent stakes and allowed the canvas to fall. The canvas was whipped about in the wind and the side-poles were threshed about like falls. Those injured were struck by the flying poles. Most of the people were near the edge of the tent and were able to escape when it fell.

Steamer Sunk in Fog.
Sault Ste. Marie—The steamer Charles W. Hutchinson was sunk in collision with the steamer Lyman C. Smith about noon Sunday, off Cedar Point Reef in upper St. Mary's river. Owing to heavy fog a large number of steamers were bunched in the river at anchor, waiting for it to lift. They began moving out about 11 a. m. Among the number were the steamers Hutchinson, Lyman C. Smith, Neilson and barge Magna. The Hutchinson's cargo consists of 450,000 bushels of wheat from Fort Williams to Buffalo. There is little, if any, water leaking into the cargo hold. A diver left the Soo on a tug Sunday night with outfit to commence work on the Hutchinson early in the morning. It is expected that by caulking and placing a tarpaulin over the hole the Hutchinson can be pumped out and floated and brought to the Soo for further examination.

Two Drowned at Jackson.
Jackson—In a rain attempt to save the life of his nine-year-old son, Chas. Youtzy, jumped into the Grand River. Both were drowned. The accident occurred just north of the Air Line railroad bridge. The child, whose name was Forrest, had pleaded with his father and mother to permit him to go swimming. The parents took the boy down to the river, the child had been in the river but a short time when he was caught in the current and carried into deep water. The father jumped in and attempted to reach his drowning son, but was himself overcome and sank.

One Killed in Auto Collision.
Detroit—J. P. Lankhoff, 35 years old, newly appointed agent of the Ford Motor company branch at Seattle, Wash., was instantly killed Sunday night in a collision between automobiles just outside of Royal Oak. Mrs. Lankhoff and Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Webb, 125 Louise avenue, Highland Park, were severely injured and were removed to Harper hospital. Mrs. Lankhoff was reported dying in Harper hospital early Monday morning.

Falls Beneath Wagon—Dies.
Hillsdale—While bringing a cow to market Saturday, Alvin Houtz, a farmer living near Reading, was pulled off the wagon seat by the animal and fell beneath the wagon. His team became frightened and the wagon wheels passed over his chest, breaking two ribs, which punctured his lungs. Houtz died Saturday night.

ALLIES CONTINUE TO GAIN GROUND

BRITISH CAPTURE THE TOWN OF FRICOURT AND FRENCH TAKE TWO TOWNS.

BRITISH AEROPLANES ACTIVE
Near La Boisselle the Germans Are Offering Stubborn Resistance—But British Report Gains.

London—The grand offensive of the British and French armies, operating on both sides of the Somme, continued with the capture of Fricourt, three miles east of Albert; Curlu, seven miles southeast of Albert; Frise, south of Curlu, and the wood of Mareaucourt, also south of Curlu, and the capture of 6,000 more prisoners, making the total 9,500. Reports show that the fighting is continued unabated all along the 25-mile front.

The German defense has stiffened determinedly following the shock of the first onslaught in which the Anglo-French hosts penetrated the German lines over a front of nearly 20 miles and to a distance in the center of five miles. The Teutons' apparently reinforced by their reserves, attacked vigorously at Montauban, the point of the wedge which the Allies had driven into their lines, and also at Hardecourt, but were repulsed. At no point have the Germans recovered any of the ground lost.

The town of Fricourt was captured by the British after a terrific struggle. The town had been virtually cut off by the British capture of Mamez, on the east, and Montauban on the northeast, and its fall had been expected hourly. Here the British captured 800 unwounded prisoners, and thus increased their captives to a total of 3,500.

The British official statement shows that the heaviest fighting occurred in the area between the Ancre and the Somme, on the northern section of the Somme front, especially about Fricourt and La Boisselle. Following the reduction of Fricourt, the British made some progress east of the village. Near La Boisselle the Germans are offering particularly stubborn resistance, but the British here also, the war office announces, are making satisfactory progress.

During the fighting the British statement discloses, British aeroplanes were very active in co-operating with the land forces and afforded valuable assistance by bombing numerous German field headquarters and railway centers. In one of these raids, the British aviators were attacked by a score of Fokkers, but succeeded in driving them off. Two of the Fokkers fell and were destroyed. Three of the British aeroplanes are reported missing and probably fell behind the German lines.

HANS TAUSCHER ACQUITTED
He Was Charged With Complicity in a Plot to Blow Up the Welland Canal.

New York—Hans Tauscher, former German army officer, was acquitted by a jury of conspiracy to blow up the Welland canal. The jury was out 50 minutes. When the verdict was read, Captain Tauscher's wife, Madame Gadske, the opera singer, and Miss Lotta Tauscher, his daughter, swayed in their seats and wept with happiness. Two men started a demonstration by clapping their hands and shouting in German, but were quickly ejected by court attendants. Tauscher left the courtroom immediately with his family.

The indictment, which charged complicity in a plot to destroy the canal with dynamite, was returned by a federal grand jury April 19 last and named Tauscher, Captain Franz von Pappen, Germany's recalled military attaché; Wolf von Igel, his secretary; Alfred A. Fritzen and Constantine Loxani. Tauscher has been agent here of the Krupp Gun works.

TELEGRAPHIC FLASHES
Michigan Central will erect a new depot at Glenwood.

A troop train of 20 cars, loaded with Carranza soldiers, arrived at Neuvo Laredo, opposite here. It is estimated there were 1,500 men on the train. Arrival of another troop train is reported.

Orders have been received by the Central department of the National Guard to move to the border all units which are "reasonably ready" for service of the Illinois, Missouri, Kansas and Wisconsin guards.

Leopold Werstein, father of the late Louis W. Werstein, of Battle Creek, who took his own life after killing his wife and Will Skinner some weeks ago, will fight his son's will in which he is left practically nothing of the \$200,000 estate.

Michael S. Hutton, former county treasurer of Chippewa county, is \$1,051.74 short in his accounts, according to the report made to the supervisors by an accountant. Hutton claims the antiquated system of county book-keeping is responsible and will make good the amount.

MICHIGAN NEWS BRIEFS

Justice De Gaw, of Detroit, married the first war-bride, Private George Newman taking the precaution to get married before marching off to Grayling.

Charles C. Hopkins, clerk of the Michigan supreme court for the last 34 years, died at his home in Lansing of Bright's disease. He was 67 years old.

University of Michigan summer school will open July 3 and indications point to a registration of 1,800, which would break previous enrollment records.

Dr. E. C. Crane, of the Massachusetts Agricultural college, urged federation and co-operation among farmers' organizations in an address at M. A. C.

Searching parties near Emerson, a hamlet on Whitefish bay, have been unable to find Robert E. Strouw, an Ohio young man who disappeared several days ago.

The state of Michigan had \$12,578,230.03 on hand in all funds at the close of business, June 31 according to the monthly report of State Treasury Haarer.

Frank A. Smith, a Troy farmer, fell into an excavation for a manhole at Rochester. One hip was broken and physicians say he may never recover the use of one leg.

A lazy man is either defective in mind or body according to Dr. Stone, former official of the Kalamazoo hospital, who addressed the probate judges of the state.

According to report of State Fire Marshal Winslow for June, fires, the careless use of kerosene, gasoline and dynamite was responsible for 11 injuries and five deaths.

Colhoun county will vote on plan of bonding for \$800,000 to build 340 miles of good roads. Of this amount \$284,000 will go to build a cement Detroit to Chicago road across the county.

Plans are to be made by Russell Murdock, engineer, for the construction of a public dock at the foot of St. Cosme line, Ecorse, in accordance with instructions of the village council.

The largest class in the history of the University of Michigan was graduated last Thursday, when 1,330 degrees were granted at the annual commencement exercises in Hill auditorium.

Mrs. Gilbert Lalan Freeland, R. F. D. No. 1, has 17 children and thinks she has broken the state record, according to a letter received from her by Gov. Ferris in which she asks if there is a state pension due her.

Arthur Nonn walked away from the north farm at Jackson prison Wednesday. He was sentenced from St. Clair for larceny in 1915. This is the second escape from prison farms in a week.

The St. Clair county board of supervisors changed the good roads construction plan for St. Clair county and elected a new set of road commissioners to take office next January 1.

For the first time since before the massacre over 150 years ago soldiers occupied Fort Michilimackinac at Mackinac City. The upper peninsula troops came down on the early morning train.

Through the example set by Chas. E. Carrier, deputy county clerk, and Hugh Montgomery, registrar of deeds, Kent county officials are now saluting the American flag as they enter the Kent county building.

According to a ruling by Attorney General Grant Fellows any provision of a municipal charter attempting to provide for woman suffrage on strictly municipal matters cannot be upheld because the constitution of the state impliedly forbids the extension of the right of suffrage in such manner.

Calumet & Hecla and 10 subsidiary copper mining companies announced the continuation of the 10 per cent premium for six months, beginning July 1, and an additional bonus of 25 cents a day for the same period. Eleven thousand men affected will receive an additional \$428,500 in January, 1917.

W. R. Caldwell, Escanaba, city manager, has designed and returned to Detroit.

Attorney-General Fellows has ruled for Saginaw county board of supervisors that townships have no right to place in their assessment rolls the property of Michigan railway interurban lines. The property had been placed at \$400,000. The company reorganized under the general railroad law of Michigan, and Saginaw county is told this law shows any traffic law so organizing to be taxable only by the state.
