Laredo is a city of 28,000 inhabitants, 23,000 of them being Mexicans.

How the city exists I can't tell, but I am absolutely nothing will grow here, except mesquite and cactus. I have looked at the thermometer just once since I arrived and that was at 7 p. m. Sunday night. It was then 100 in the shade. It is sure to average 100 to 115 during the summer, and you know how I love the hot weather. It is very dry though it does not seem so hot as it is and there is usually a breeze which helps you to keep cool and which keeps the mosquitoes away. It is always southeast and at night it blows a mile and flies everything with it. When I go to bed I tie a handkerchief over my eyes and take off my clothes and lie on top of all the covers and the bed. It is sure to be hot and to make you breathe through your nose. In the morning everything is always absolutely full of sand. The soil is a sort of clay that is baked until it is as hard as rock and is covered with this kind of sand. The inhabitants are Mexicans, a few Mexicans (half and half), a very few white people, Mexicans, Italian, Spanish, Mexican, but no mosquitoes.

Our camp is out on the desert near the 5th line, camp in the edge of Laredo. The area is about 100 to 115 during the summer, and you know how I love the hot weather. It is very dry though it does not seem so hot as it is and there is usually a breeze which helps you to keep cool and which keeps the mosquitoes away.

Our officers quarters are in the center of the town. They are very comfortable, but we should worry.

I feel sorry for the pitiful conditions of these poor Mexicans. Their houses are hovels, worse than pig pens and their condition is awful. Although they are not allowed to drink, they are allowed to have a little beer in the saloons, but this is very hard to come by. We always have about two hours, in the evening, of really delightful dancing.
