





In passing through South Deerfield, Mass., autoists cross the historic old stream called Bloody Brook, name derived from the freightful massacre by Indians which occurred there on the 18th of September, 1675. In those days King Philip, sachem of the Pokanoket tribe of Indians, was on the warpath. He had so terrified the settlers of the Connecticut River Valley that the northernmost towns of Northfield and Deerfield for eight days during which time be were ordered shandoned. In abandoning Deerfield the settlers had left large stores of newly-harvested grain, and it was in quest of






