Big Span Collapses; Many Lives Are Lost

(Daily Press Dispatch, Sept. 12, 1916)

Quebec-The second attempt to bridge the St. Lawrence river here Treatment by Former Naval Surresulted in another failure when the massive center span, weighing over 5,000 tons suddenly collapsed and fell into the river yesterday causing a loss of 27 lives. The span was being raised from pontoons and was about 15 feet above the water when, from some unknown cause, it collapsed and sank into the river, which is 200 feet deep at this place. About 90 men were caught on the span when it began to sway and all of them went down into the water with the structure. The bridge is the largest in the world, its contemplated length from shore to shore being 3,239 feet, with a distance of 1,800 feet between anchor buttressess. The central span is 640 feet long. The first collapse occurred Aug. 29,1907 when 60 engineers and workmen perished in

THE PULRIT WARNED AGAINST POLITICS.

Consecrated Ministry Needed for the Rural Churches.

By Peter Radford.

The farmers of this nation have on their payroll 95,000 preachers and this number applying themselves dilligently and exclusively to the religious work at hand is sadly inadequate to properly serve their respective communities.

Those who put on ecclesiastical robes are in a measure free to unlock every door to the human heart and enter the secret chambers of reason and every person should submit their conduct to review and seek the counsel of those divinely appointed messengers of life, but the moment the minister closes the Bible and opens the law book, he becomes a menace

to society. The difficulty of keeping the preacher in the pulpit is as old as religion. Christ encountered it in the temple when he drove the priests from the bargain counter back to the pulpit. Our pilgrim fathers met it when, through the influence of the clergy, a witch court was established at Salem, Mass., in 1692, that precipitated a legal holocaust threatening to reduce the population to ashes and which was extinguished by the laymen uniting and forcing the preachers back to the pulpit.

The greatest peril to the church to-day is politics. The temptation of the ministry to throw down the cross of Christ and pick up the club of the policeman, to substitute the penalties of the law for the power of the altar and to legislate religion into human hearts, never was greater.

The world never needed a religious ministry more nor political preachers less than it does today. We need ministers to teach us how to live; we know how to vote.

The religious preacher is the most capable servant and the political preacher the sorriest master the world has ever known. Wherever power is placed in the hands of the latter they invariably become intolerant, bigoted and vicious and resort to the whip and the faggot to enforce their opinion.

·Civilization has many times been compelled to drive incorrigible preachers back to the pulpit at the point of the bayonet. Many of the pages of history are wet with blood shed at the hands of political preachers who wrote laws on the statute books that committed arson upon mankind, maimed human beings with the hatchet and sent helpless women to the torture rack, all because they disagreed with their views. When in control of government, the pulpit politicians invari-ably undertake to perform legislative miracles such as casting out witches with the flame of a torch, suborning onscience with shackles and enforcing opinions with the guillotine.

Back to the Pulpit

Politics and religion will not blend. the church perform its mission to temporarily exchange callings, and a civilization that will countenance such conduct will soon decay. Such a traffic in occupations is as unsound in principle as the white slave trade is immoral in practice.

The hand that passes the sacrament should not collect slush funds for po-litical purposes. The gentle voice that comforts us in sorrow and pronounces the last sad rites upon our departed loved ones should not rave and rant on the hustings. I do not believe a preacher can manipulate political machinery and be righteous any more than he could become a burglar and be honest. I think it is as immoral The bill he prays as it would be for him to

A preacher can no more preach a political sermon without converting his pulpit into a political rostrum than he could sell intoxicating liquo WARDEN GIVEN MORE POWER from the altar without converting the church into a bar-room. He can no more purify politics by playing the Proposed to Give Game Department game than he can sanctify, gambling by running a lottery.

I join in the oft-repeated suggestion that a preacher has as much right in political brawls as a saloon keeper and we also admit that he has as much right to get drunk as anyone else, but we would rather he would not do so for the "greater the saint the greater the sin." I think a political bishop can turkey trot in the name of Christianity as consistently as he can enter into a mud-slinging political contest to the disgrace of his church.

It is my opinion that when this world is saved it will be through religious sermons and not through political speeches. Salvation must come to us from the Bible and not from the statute book: It will come through holy councils of consecrated ministers and not from caucuses of postuical preachers.

It must be said to the credit of the church, however, that the political preacher is fast disappearing and may his influence ever shadow ever grow less is the prayer

going Nine Operations for Blood Transfusion.

CASE WAS THOUGHT HOPELESS

Contracted Blood Poisoning While Performing an Operation-Most Remarkable Case Ever Treated in This Country.

New York.-Made a victim of septicaemia while performing a surgical operation two months ago, Dr. Albert Pittis of Plainfield, N. J., whose case was considered hopeless a few weeks later, has recovered completely as the result of undergoing nine operations for blood transfusion. Each operation was performed by Dr. Edward Lindeman of New York, who used a method of transfusion which he de-

vised four years ago.

The recovery of the young surgeon is not only unusual, but physicians say the case is one of the most re markable of its kind ever treated in this country. After physicians had given up hope of recovery Doctor Lindeman was summoned to the Muhlenberg hospital, Plainfield, where Doctor Pittis was a patient. Eight Quarts of Blood Furnished.

After a consultation it was decided that Doctor Lindeman begin his operations. Eight quarts of blood were fur nished for the operations by Miss Constance Pittis and Betram Pittis, sister and brother of the patient, and four members of the local fire department. Doctor Lindeman's method embodie the use of arterial syringes and eliminates the necessity of making an in-cision over the vein in either the donor of the blood or the recipient. By means

of especially devised telescoping tubes

of platinum he pierces the vein, mak-

ing a hole about the size of an or-

dinary needle point. This primary hole is then dilated until of such size as to permit an unobstructed flow. Forty-eight hours after the first transfusion Doctor Pittis showed improvement, although he still was unconscious, as he had been for some time. Consciousness returned to the patient after several operations two weeks later, but his mind was not yet clear. Doctor Pittis steadily responded to the treatment and finally his temerature became normal and his mind

Pricks Skin While Operating.

The poison, which had circulated through the whole body, was exactly like that of the patient Doctor Pittis had been operating on when he became infected. Doctor Pittis' patient had been suffering from septicaemia, too, and while using his instruments skin between his fingers was pricked. The condition of the hand on became so alarming that Doctor Pittis went to the Muhlenberg hospital for treatment. It was said that when he first underwent treatment by the Lindeman method he was closer to death than any other patient who had n operated on by Doctor Lindeman for the same disease and who had re-
