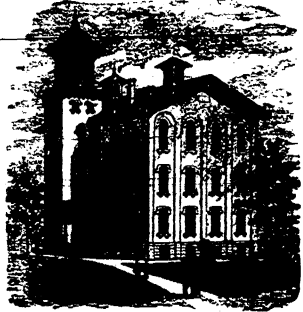

Minutes of meetings held April 4 and 9 were read and approved.

The following petition was presented:

We, the undersigned, do hereby petition the honorable Common Council of the Village of Manchester, Michigan, to extend the sidewalk on the east side of Wolverine St., in block No. 45 from lot No. 8 over to City Road. J. J. Davidter, John Grossman, Ralph Kimble, J. E. Seckinger.
