

RABBITS MAY PROVIDE FOOD

Meat Likely to Come Into Demand in Event of Serious Shortage, Thinks Texas Governor.

If the war or any other cause should bring a food shortage to the people of Texas, jackrabbit meat would come into demand, according to the view of Governor Ferguson. The legislature at its regular session appropriated \$200,-000 to be paid as bounties for the extermination of jackrabbits, wolves and wildcats. Under the provision of the bill the state was to have paid 5 cents for each jackrabbit scalp.
