ily, but few grubs. Land which was in wheat or oats last year may contain many grubs this spring, but if clover, which is one of the least susceptible crops, follows, the grubs will scarcely injure it. A rotation of oats, clover and corn has proved very satisfactory in some sections.

The White Grub, so destructive to crops in 1915, is due to make another call this season, says the M. A. C. Tais grub, which becomes a Junebug when it grows up, is very likely to be troublesome in portions of Washtenaw and Wayne counties. The most destructive stage in the life of this insect, which requires three years to complete its life-cycle, comes the year after the eggs have been laid—accounting for the fact that we have this insect destroying crops every three years. The brood of grubs coming this season is a later generation of the ones which did so much damage in 1912 and 1915 to crops in lowa, Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan.

National Army May Help.

Last year, in spite of all the difficulties, the farmers planted the largest acreages in the history of the nation, harvested record crops of most important things except wheat, and succeeded in greatly increasing the number of live stock. Since last year skilled farm labor has been given determed elsestification and the secretary. ferred classification and the secretary of war has asked for power to furlough soldiers of the National army if their training permits, so that they may re-turn to their farms and assist. It is believed that the farmers of the nation can, by effective organization and co-operation, with such assistance as can be furnished, again overcome la-bor difficulties and produce large quantities of foods, feedstuffs and live

stock.

There is an opportunity now for ur ban people sympathetically and con-constructively to study the farm-labor situation and to render assistance. In many towns and cities there are men who have had farming experience, who are ablebodied, and who would doubtless be willing to serve the nation in the field of agriculture at this time Especially for the seasonal strains of planting, cultivating and harvesting, it will not be too much to ask such men to aid the farmers in the necessary un dertaking of maintaining and, if possible, supplementing, the food supply in order to feed the armies and to sustain the civilian population behind them.

Civilians Should Help.

If soldiers are willing to serve in the trenches, to dig ditches, build rail-roads and risk their lives, many civilians can well afford to spare a parof their time to serve in the furrows and in the harvest fields. If it appears that the farmers of a community or region are not able to secure the necessary labor by the usual methods essary labor by the usual memors, then the leaders in the town or city immediately dependent upon that re-gion should organize, establish touch with representative farm leaders, and see if they cannot assist in solving the problem. In so doing they will no only aid the farmers of the nation, but they will vitally contribute to their own well-being and to that of their community. The farmers are willing to do all

that they humanly can, but where their labor supply cannot be furnished from the ordinary sources, it must be re-cruited from those whose very sus-tenance depends upon the farmers. The soldier and the farmer are eager The soldier and the farmer are eager to do their full share; the soldier is taking the chances of losing his life and the farmer is risiding the labors of a year on the chance of the seasons; both incur risks. Very many civilians are equally eager to do their share,
