The following are extracts from a letter written by Corporal Meryl M. Shaver of Chelsea, who is with the 125th Infantry band in France, and published in the Standard:
Have moved twice since my last letter, out to the trenches and then back to our rest camp.
I have been under fire quite a bit, so that I do not mind it as much as at first when the big shells would come whistling over our heads. You can bet I used to get down into the dugout without any second look.
You have heard of the gas they are using. I cannot tell you very much about it, but I would rather have shrapnel any day than gas. There are only two kinds of men as far as the gas is concerned, the quick and the dead. If you get your mask on quick enough and keep it on long enough, all is well. I have been through the gas several times and am still o k. enough, all is well. I have been through the gas several times and am

I am having the time of my life, although it is a different kind of a time than I ever had before. We can go up in the mountain and look down the other side and watch the battle, br have a snowball fight with each other, and then come back to camp and go swimming.

We are all waiting for that big march, not west either, but east, and I hope that it will start soon.

The Washtenaw County War Board has announced the plan under which the next Liberty Loan campaign will be conducted. It will be a voluntary plan, as formulated and agreed to by the divisional chairmen of the county, the bankers, and the members of the War Board.

The plans include the opening of the campaign with a big patriotic parade on Sunday, Sept. 29. The voluntary campaign for subscriptions will be conducted during the week of Sept. 30 to October 5 inclusive.

For the subscription campaign there will be a central headquarters, where the people will be expected to make their subscriptions and this headquarters will be in charge of responsible men. There will be a card index system, in which eyery adult person will be listed by a card.

There is now in process of preparations a big schedule showing what amount of bonds a person should buy, based on income and wealth. This schedule will be printed and distributed and published with the general plan of the campaign, and will be furnished to each ward department at the subscription headquarters.
