Bill Is Introduced in State Senate With The Above Object In View.

Lansing, Jan. 15—The first whack at anything having a semblance of German militarism has been introduced in the state senate by Senator Arthur E. Wood of Detroit.

The law which this bill seeks to repeal gives citizens of the state (not less than 10) who have served in the German army, the right to incorporate for promoting the social and benevolent interests of the fraternity known as regiment Michigan.

JOINTWORM IN WHEAT

Pest Ranks Next to Hessian Fly as Enemy of Grain—Method of Control or Destruction.

According to a bulletin just issued by the U. S. department of agriculture, the wheat jointworm is next to the Hessian fly as a grain pest in the wheat states east of the Mississippi river and in parts of Missouri.

The egg from which the jointworm hatches is laid in the stem by an insect resembling a small black ant with wings. When a wheat plant first becomes infested no outward sign may appear.

The larvae of this insect remain in the old stubble until November or December, when about 90 per cent of them change to the pupa stage.

RAIL COLLISION "KILLS TWENTY-ONE"

MOST OF THE DEAD AND INJURED WERE WESTERN MICHIGAN PEOPLE.

LAST CAR WAS DEMOLISHED

Both Trains Were Westbound Running Behind Their Schedules—Railroad Stories Differ.

Batavia, N. Y.—Twenty-one persons were killed and three seriously injured in a rear-end collision on the New York Central main line at South Byron, six miles east of Batavia.

Both trains were westbound, running behind their schedules. Train No. 11, the Wolverine, which was east of a standard preparatory to taking on a second engine for the run up the steep grade between South Byron and Batavia.

Only a few of the 21 dead have been identified. The mangled condition of the bodies and absence of clothing making identification slow and difficult.
