A course of agriculture has been added to the curriculum of nine high schools in as many borroughs and townships of Alleghany county, Pennsylvania, this year, and thus far 250 students, of whom 60 are girls are undergoing instruction. The work is being done with the co-operation of the county superintendent of schools and the principals of the high schools. The course will consist of 20 intensive lessons in the class room, followed by an equal class room, followed by an equal amount of instruction in the field.
