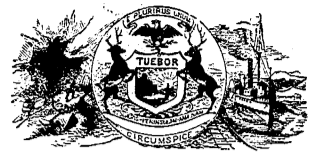

THEIR GOLDEN WEDDING

Former Manchester People Celebrate 50 Years of Married Life in Elaborate Manner.

A Seattle paper states that more than 500 people attended the golden wedding of Rev. and Mrs. E. B. Sutton of that city. After a visit at their home the friends were invited to the Presbyterian church, which was filled to capacity. The wedding march was played, and two sons and two daughters followed by Rev. and Mrs. Sutton marched up the aisle. Rev. M. A. Mathews, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, offered an earnest prayer followed by a unique and impressive ceremony, giving a benediction as the wedding ring was placed on the bride's finger. His address glowed with loving kindness. Three hundred guests remained to partake of refreshments and listen to addresses by several pastor-friends, original poems by others, a cornet solo, "Marching through Georgia," by the band master, a short historical sketch by Rev. Music of Our Indians.

The music of our Indians is solely and simply vocal. It seems to be generally agreed by musical authorities that the Indians' songs have in them nothing borrowed from instruments, nothing of artificial instigation. An Indian melody never serves two sets of words. There is no instance, it appears, where the people have followed our custom of singing the different stanzas of a ballad to the same air.

A large proportion of Indian songs are entirely without words at all, syllables being employed to carry the tones. Perhaps the most striking peculiarity of Indian music is the lack of definite pitch, for there is no such thing as standard pitch among the musicians of the red men.

The Indian begins his song where the natural quality of his voice and his mood at the time render it easiest for him to sing it. The pitch of the song depends upon the individual.

Dickens Names.

The death of a lady of the name of Snodgrass at Bath is an event sufficiently unusual to have attracted more attention than the personal distinction of the deceased warrants, according to "Observer," of the Observer. The name—like those of the associated Pickwick, Tuppian and Winkle—remains so rare that no specimen is to be found in the London Directory for 1919. One might have thought that such household words would tend to perpetuate themselves—that people wishing to change their names would resort to these rather than to the over-worn "Cameron" or "Montmorency." It would, for example, be an easy thing for the solitary "Winkel" in the directory to transpose the last two letters and fall into line with the English tradition. But apparently there is no such tendency, and the Dickens names continue to be very shy of real life.

RETURN OF DEAD TO LIFE

All Countries Have Their Bitter-Sweet Legends on Restoring Those Who Had Passed.

For it is the most bitter sweet of all dreams, this of the restoring of the dead; the core of fire that makes luminous the burial rites of the Egyptians—the grain in the mummy's hand. "Women received their dead raised to life again, and others were tortured, not accepting deliverance, that they might obtain a better resurrection;" one remembers one's childish pondering over the strange refusal of the intimate sure sweetness of return to this world of sunlight and trees. And even yet it is "to the sentiment of the body, the flesh of whose force and color that wandering platonic soul was so frail an abstract," that we cling.

Flesh and blood cannot inherit the Kingdom of God; but the craving that it might be so still shelters in the wording of the creed. St. Paul fought it, his metaphors breaking and straining with too much yearning, sublimating the flesh by the intolerable radiance of the spirit—"mortality swallowed up life." Buddhism fought it, with less transcendent weapon: "neither doth corruption inherit incorruption." It is death, not in its priestlike task of cold abluition, but death the revealer of the secret taint, the sickening flavor of mortality, that reins the illusion of the sensuous world. "Spirit must brand the flesh, that it may live."

We receive ourselves better in the West than in the East. Persephone comes back with no shadow on her face. Clarimonde, carrying the small sepulchral lamp that is left in tombs, is unchanged, only for the fainter scarlet of her smile, and the withering of the blue flowers in her hair. Orpheus saw Eurydice before she sank back into darkness, and that recognition has become one of the symbols for the infinite. That is why the Japanese version of the legend, earth-stained and craven-lighted, seems at first a horrible thing—and it is a long time before one sees the beauty in the horror.—Asia Magazine.

BANK AT BRIDGEWATER

Prominent Men Organize With Capital Stock of \$25,000—Will Erect Building.

When the Detroit, Hillsdale & Indiana railroad was built through Washtenaw county, a settlement was formed near the northern line of Bridgewater township and a station was established there. It was almost exactly midway between Saline and Manchester and there being an excellent farming country surrounding it was thought that a prosperous growth would follow. Soon a post office was opened and a general store and the inevitable saloon. Each year saw new stores, lumber yard, elevator and residences springing into being and now some of the prominent business men have organized a bank with a capital stock of \$25,000 and offered by Chas. F. Scheurer, president; Geo. Klager and George Boettner, vice presidents; Leo Gruner, the present county treasurer, cashier. Jacob Renz, Jacob Scheurer, Jacob Bauer, August Henes, Wm. Kuebler and William Schumacher with the above named officers will serve as directors.

A prominent site has been purchased and a banking office will be constructed at once, but the bank will probably not begin business until January. The bank will be known as the Bridgewater Savings Bank.

The movement to consolidate the rural schools with the village schools of Napoleon started Tuesday evening and continued Wednesday and this evening with W. L. Coffey, of Lansing as speaker. Other meetings will be held throughout the township and it is hoped that all the rural schools will come in. Children will be carried to and from school each day. The longest distance any pupil will be obliged to travel is said to be five miles. Additional school room and more teachers will have to be provided at Napoleon if the plan works. Other parts of Jackson county are talking of doing likewise. Norvell among them. A meeting will be held at maintown hall this Thursday, evening, it is stated that should township schools unite it would be necessary to build a schoolhouse costing \$20,000.

FAMOUS TREES IN CAPITAL

National Botanical Garden Has Many That Were Planted by Nation's Distinguished Men.

Including the modest salary granted its superintendent, the national botanical garden at Washington has always been very economically supported by congress, and deserves high credit for what it has accomplished with a conservative income. But men who cultivate flowers are usually willing to attempt the maximum of beauty with the minimum of working capital. The garden has many things that cannot be duplicated. Particularly interesting to visitors are the trees planted by distinguished men. Charles A. Dana planted an acorn which he brought from China; General Grant planted an acacia; Senators Hoar and Ervarts each planted a cedar of Lebanon, and Senator Crittenden planted an oak. There is a tree planted by Edwin Booth, and another planted by Edwin Forrest. But the most famous tree of all is the hornbeam planted by President Lincoln. As it now stands in the garden the shade of this tree covers about one-tenth of an acre.

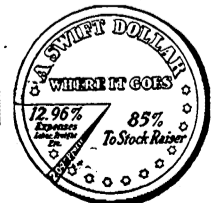


