FAMOUS TREES IN CAPITAL

National Botanical Garden Has Many That Were Planted by Nation's Distinguished Men.

Including the modest salary granted its superintendent, the national botan-ical garden at Washington has always been very economically supported by congress, and deserves high credit for what it has accomplished with a con-servative income. But men who culti-vate flowers are usually willing to attempt the maximum of beauty with the minimum of working capital. The gar-den has many things that cannot be duplicated. Particularly interesting to visitors are the trees planted by distinguished men. Charles A. Dana planted an acorn which he brought from China; General Grant planted an acacla; Senators Hoar and Evarts each planted a cedar of Lebanon, and Senator Crittenden planted an oak. There is a tree planted by Edwin Booth, and another planted by Edwin Booth, and another planted by Edwin Forrest. But the most famous tree of all is the hornbeam planted by President Lincoln. As it now stands in the garden the shade of this tree covers about one-tenth of an acre.


STOCK SHOW SALE
