SHOULD USE FERTILIZER

Even When Prospects Are Good Proper Fertilizers Enhance Crop Values.

From personal observation and from conversation with traveling men we believe that Michigan will have a big corn crop this season. On account of a cold wet spring farmers generally were late in getting their corn planted, but the ground had become warm when the planting was done and the seed sprouted and grew rapidly. Many fields are nearly as far advanced as in other years. But, farmers should use as much fertilizer and phosphates as possible to hasten the growth in order to have the corn crop ripen before frosts come, else they may not get enough suitable seed for next season.

CUCUMBER BEETLE

He Will Soon Be Causing All Kinds of Trouble—Ways To Combat Him.

The cucumber beetle is a source of lots of trouble for gardeners. Not only cucumbers, but watermelon, squash, cantaloupe, beans, peas and other crops are attacked by it. It damages crops in all parts of the United States east of the Rocky Mountains.

This insect is destructive in two stages of its life—the larva or worm stage and the beetle stage. The larva is a small threadlike white worm with dark brown head and tail, which works underground and tunnels the roots and stems of the plants. It is by no means as destructive as the beetle.

The beetle has a black and yellow striped back when its wings are folded, a black abdomen, and yellow neck and legs. It eats the leaves and stems of the plants and later gnaws the rinds of the fruits and renders them unmarketable.

The principal injury is done by last year's beetles that have wintered in the trash left in gardens and fields and in dense woods along ditch banks and river bottoms. These beetles devour the tender stems and leaflets of plants not yet fairly started. They are also carriers of some plant diseases.

After feeding, these last year's beetles lay their eggs in the soil about the roots of the plants the new generation will later attack. The eggs hatch in one or two weeks. When hatched the worm bores into the stem of the plant, or may be

found on the fruit where this comes in contact with the earth. In two to five and a half weeks the larva is full grown. It then pupates which takes from five to ten days, and emerges as an adult beetle about the first week in July in the Central West. Adults continue to appear for several weeks thereafter.

There is no specific remedy for the striped beetle. Spraying will destroy them when they appear in moderate numbers, but is not effective against large numbers. Since the larvae live in the roots and stems, principally underground, spraying will not get them. Hence preventive measures must be practiced.

Covering young plants is effective. A cheap frame may be made by cutting barrel hoops into semicircles. Place the two half hoops at right angles to each other and insert ends into the ground, covering the frame with mosquito netting or cheese cloth. Pack dirt around the edges to prevent the beetles getting under. A square frame about six inches high set around the hills and covered with netting is excellent.

Injury from these pesky beetles can be prevented largely by clean cultivation. As soon as the crop is harvested, burn the vines. It is advisable, however, to leave a few here and there throughout the garden upon which insects which have not been destroyed by fire may gather. Then they may be destroyed with kerosene. If the beetles are destroyed at this time their number next year will be greatly diminished.

Lead arsenate is the best spray to use in killing the beetle. Every part of the plant must be covered with the poison.

As the price of fertilizer is declining farmers will probably not be in a hurry to give orders for fall delivery. Dr. McCoal at the agricultural college says that mixed fertilizer will be lower, but acid phosphates will show less change

LOWER POSTAGE RATE

Letters Go for Two Cents Again After This Month—News Will Be Welcome.

Three-cent stamps will not be redeemed by the postal department. This is the information received by the local postoffice relative to the sale and redemption of three-cent stamps, stamped envelopes and postcards after July 1, when the reduction in postal rates occurs.

Stamped envelopes and postcards will be exchanged if presented by original purchaser, but in no case will money be refunded. One month will be allowed for redemption at face value, but later than that will be conducted at a discount amounting to 25 per cent. The large amount of work in connection with the exchange for the new issues is given as the cause for the time limit. The three-cent stamps may be used on packages and parcels requiring more than the three-cent rate and in that manner no loss will be incurred by the purchaser. In the meantime, it is advised that no more three-cent stamps be purchased than can be used before June 30.

As the new rate does not take effect until July 1, all letters mailed before midnight June 30, must be stamped with a three-cent stamp or letter will be returned to the sender or postage collected at other end.

New Telephone Toll Rates

Effective June 13th, 1919

By order of the Postmaster General, new schedules of rates for telephone toll calls became effective 12:01 a. m., June 13th, 1919.

Under these new schedules the "station to station" rate is the base rate upon which all rates for the various classes of service offered, are computed. This rate is determined by the air line distance between toll points and is computed, for the initial period, on the basis of 5c for each 6 miles up to 24 miles and 5c for each 8 miles beyond that distance.

For toll calls where the calling party does not specify a particular person to be reached at the called telephone, the "station to station" rate is charged. This method provides the cheapest "station to station" rate possible by giving the telephone number of the called telephone. Where the number is not known and telephone directory information is not available, the name and address under which the telephone is listed together with the information that it is a "station to station" call should be given to the toll operator.

For toll calls where the calling party specifies a particular person to be reached at the called telephone and the connection is established and conversation held with that person, the "person to person" rate is charged. As this service requires a greater amount of operating effort, the rate for such calls is about one-fourth greater than the "station to station" rate. (Minimum "person to person" rate 15c).

For toll calls on a "person to person" basis, where the calling party, in placing the call, designates a definite time at which he will talk and the conversation is held, the "appointment" rate is charged. As this service involves the making of the appointment in addition to the operating effort necessary for a "person to person" call, the "appointment" rate is about one-half greater than the "station to station" rate. (Minimum "appointment" rate 20c).

For toll calls made on a "person to person" basis where messenger service is required to secure attendance of the designated person at the called telephone the "messenger call" rate applies. This rate is the same as the "appointment" rate, plus any necessary charge for messenger service.

In connection with all toll calls other than those made on a "station to station" basis where the connection is established but the conversation is not held, because of any reason beyond the control of the telephone company a "report charge" is made equivalent to about one-fourth of the "station to station" rate. (Minimum "report charge" 5c, maximum \$2.00).

Reduced rates, applying only to calls made on a "station to station" basis are quoted for toll service between the hours of 8:30 p. m. and 4:30 a. m. The rate between 8:30 p. m. and 12 midnight ("evening rate") is about one-half the "station to station" day rate, and between 12 midnight and 4:30 a. m. ("night rate") about one-fourth the "station to station" day rate. The minimum night rate is 25c. Where the "station to station" day rate is 25c or less no reduction is made for evening or night service.

The time at which connection is established at originating point governs the rate determining whether the day, evening or night charge applies on "station to station" service.

Day rates apply on all calls other than those made on a "station to station" basis, whether they are made during the day, evening or night.

"Collect Calls" or calls for which the charges are reversed (that is, collected from the subscriber at the called station) are allowed only in connection with "person to person" calls.
