NOT TEACHERS ENOUGH

Country Schools May Not Open Next Fall Because of Scarcity of Pedagogues.

County School Commissioner Evan Essery has issued the statement that there is an unmistakable scarcity of teachers in Washtenaw county. He adds that unless there are sufficient

instructors engaged by the time schools open in September some of the smaller schools for which teachers have not now been engaged may have to remain closed and the pupils of these districts sent to the larger schools.

Just at this time there are openings in three county schools at a salary of \$90 each, per month. A total of 52 of the county rural schools have not yet sent in their report of teachers engaged.

The school board believes that they have secured a superintendent and corps of teachers for 1919-20 that will be able to advance the standard of education beyond that reached by schools in towns of this size, and it is hoped that people in the surrounding townships, who have children seeking better education, will send them here. Everybody feels that in some particulars there has been marked improvement in Manchester. Investigate carefully and you will be convinced that the Manchester schools have advantages worth considering. The Enterprise press has begun work on the annual catalogue and you should make application for a copy as soon as published.

Users of parcel post are now advised by government authorities to include in their packages a card bearing the name and address of the sender and addressee. In this way postoffice officers will be able to forward an article even when the outside label is obliterated or the wrapping entirely removed. The public is further reminded that the return to pre-war postal rates on first-class mail also applies to Canada, England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales and other countries to which domestic rates now apply.

Sentiment of prominent republican business men bankers, lawyers, farmers, workmen and politicians in Lenawee county is overwhelmingly in favor of the speedy ratification by the Senate of the Paris peace treaty with its covenant for a League of Nations, according to Probate Judge Harry L. Larwill of Adrian. Judge Larwill has written Senators Townsend and Newberry, but they apparently don't think that their constituents know what they want.

The Auto Makes It Possible for City and Country People Alike.

To escape the extreme heat of city homes many have rigged up tents and other camping outfits which they strap on their autos and travel about the country visiting interesting points, fishing in rivers and lakes and enjoying the fresh country air. They buy milk, vegetables, chickens, etc., of the farmers and really live like kings at a much cheaper price than it costs them to live in the city. At night a real bed with springs is let down from the side wall, giving them better sleeping comforts than they had at home. They carry almost everything they need and one would say they are having the time of their lives.

STICK TO AGREEMENT

State Superintendent Johnson Calls Breaking Contracts by Teachers Unethical Proceeding.

Thomas E. Johnson, state superintendent of public instruction, urges all teachers to abide by their contracts, regardless of increases in salary that may be offered them; unless it is mutually agreed to by the local boards of education.

He said that the department of public instruction keenly realizes that teachers are underpaid as a class and should have a very material increase in salaries, but where they are obligated by contracts, to discountenance them would be unethical.

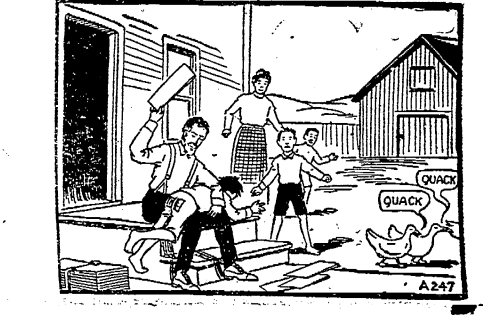

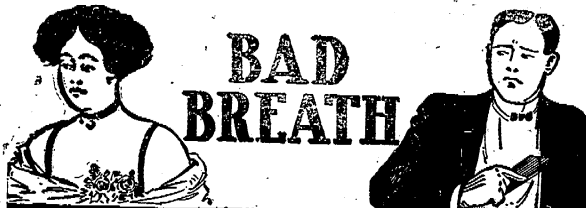

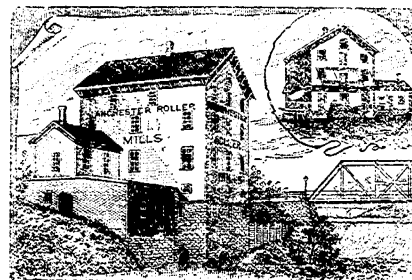
