Country Schools May Not Open Nex

instructors engaged by the time schools open in September some of the smaller schools for which teachers have not now been engaged may have to remain closed and the pupils of those districts sent to the larger schools.

Just at this time there are openigs in three country schools at a salary of \$90 each, per month. A total of 52 of the county rural schools have not yet sent in their report of teachers engaged.

The school board believes that they have secured a superintendent and corps of teachers for 1919-20 that will be able to advance the standard of education beyond that reached by schools in towns beyond that reached by schools in towns of this size, and it is hoped that people in the surrounding townships, who have children seeking better education, will send them here. 



Newspapers are increasing their subscription and advertising rates to meet cost of production. It has subscription and advertising rates to meet cost of production. It has come to the pass that publishers are obliged to advance rates without notice, the same as merchants and others. Here is one cause for it: While the postage rate on letters and post cards dropped on July 1. the rate to publishers of newspapers and magazines outside of county circulation was raised considerably. This is the second increase within the last year. The increase will continue on a sliding scale so that in 1921 publishers will be paying 800 per cent increase in postage in certain zones. This is only one of many reasons why it has been found necessary to raise prices.






