ABOUT NEW GAME LAWS

New Laws in Effect—If You Use Gun Get License or Prepare To Pay a Fine.
Township clerks have received copies of the new state game law.

Among new features, a 50-cent bounty is paid on woodchucks and 25 cents on crows. A bounty is also paid on weasels, hawks and owls. The township clerk is the man to report to now.
All persons using firearms must have a license to carry a gun, and if hunting, must carry a game license.
A check is provided on persons who might try to evade the letter of the laws which went into effect Aug. 14, by the requirement that when application is made for bounty payments, the person so applying must make affidavit to the correctness of the date on which he killed the birds or animals. Some, in the opinion of the county clerk, might kill woodchucks or crows before the law goes into effect and keep them for payment later.
It is lawful to kill blackbirds at any time. If a person wishes to kill them when off his own property he must have a hunting license. Crows may also be killed at any season and a bounty received for them.

JACKSON COUNTY
Napoleon took another vote on the question of bonding the consolidated district for \$27,500 to build a new school building, and decided to build.
The large new buildings for the Jackson county fair are now finished, adding 22,000 feet of floor space. But from what farmers say, it will be none too much to take care of the exhibits. The city factories and merchants will fill great space with goods worth seeing. The boys and girls' livestock exhibit will add to the general showing of cattle, sheep and swine.

AVIATORS' DEAN AT STATE FAIR

Will Be Seen in Conjunction With the Great Feature in Fireworks, "The Battle of Chateau Thierry", Each Afternoon and Evening.

Detroit (Special)—Louis Gertson, one of the best known aviators in America, has obtained his release from the aerial mail service and is to resume exhibition flying. He will appear at the Michigan State Fair in Detroit during the 10 days of the fair August 29 to September 7.
He was one of the first pilots carrying mail by airplane between Washington and New York. Several times during his months of flying for the postoffice department he had narrow escapes, from which a fiercer less experienced than he might not have emerged successfully.
Gertson was one of the first fliers in this country. In the earliest days of the airplane he did exhibition flying

ago and electrified the thousands of spectators by looping the loop, flying upside down and through flying by only the light of the moon. He was the first to attempt night flying.
Shortly after appearing at the fair in Detroit he became an instructor at military aviation camps where America's army of flying men received the training with which they later were able to drive the Germans from the sky.
Night flying with many new tricks Gertson has learned in the past two years, together with all the "stunts" known to flying men will be included in his daily and nightly programs at the Fair this year.

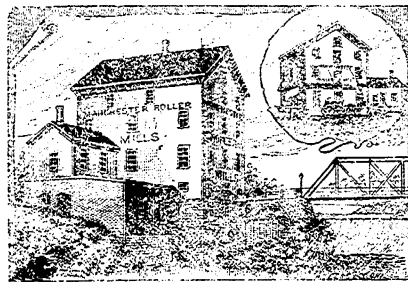

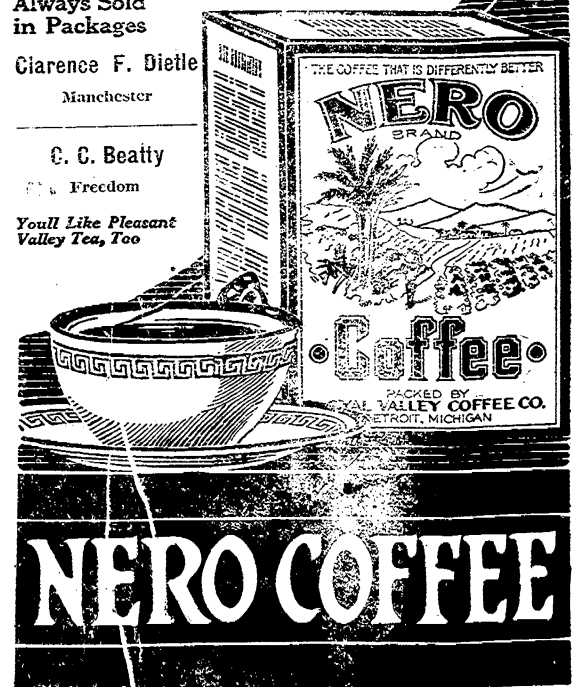
