Among new features, a 50-cent bounty is paid on woodchucks and '5 cents on crows. A bounty is also paid on weasles, hawks and owls. Inc township clerk is the man to report to now.

COAL SHORTAGE NOW


Everybody Advised to Provide for Winter at Once-For Change in Conditions.
