ARMY WORM MARCHING

Destructive Worms at Work in Some Parts of State—Two Ways to Fight Them.

The army worms, which derive their name from a habit of marching like an army from one field to another, destroying all crops they come in contact with, eating or cutting down practically everything, have attacked Sanilac, Huron and Tuscola counties. Reports indicate slight outbreaks in other parts of the state. That the worms be checked in their efforts to spread or march to new fields is extremely important. Two methods are in common use. One depends on a barrier to keep the worms from spreading to new areas and the other is by means of poison bait which actually kills the worms. The barriers or ditches are of most use when the worms are marching and threatening new fields. The commonest barriers used consist of two or three deep furrows plowed eight or ten feet apart. In fact an overseer or surveyor was here last week looking over the prospect and said that he did not think it advisable to attempt to build a permanent highway along the bank of the lake, but favored laying out a new road running back of Willow Grove and The Farm hotels. When asked if it would not be expensive crossing the marsh between the two places, he said not more so than piling the lake shore, besides they would have plenty of earth in the hills to fill the marsh. However others may look upon the project, we think that such a road as he proposes would be a benefit of all concerned.

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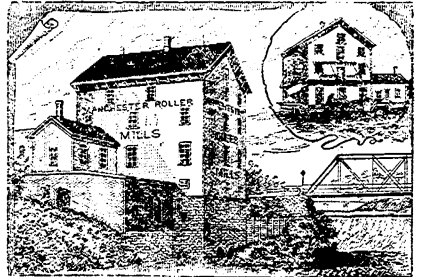
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
