ARMY WORM MARCHING

Destructive Worms at Work in Son Parts of State-Two Ways to Fight Them.

The army worms, which derive their name from a habit of marching like an army from one field to an-other, destroying all crops they come in contact with, eating or cutting down practically everything, have at-tacked Sanilac, Huron and Tuscola counties. Reports indicate slight outbreaks in other parts of the state.

outheaks in other parts of the state.

That the worms be checked in their efforts to spread or march to new fields is extremely important.

Two methods are in common use.
One depends on a barrier to keep the worms from spreading to new areas and the other is by means of poison bait which actually kills the worms. The barriers or ditches are of most use when the worms are marching and threatening new fields. The commonest barriers used consist of two or three designators. Turn the

ing lowery weather and therefore it will be necessary to keep watch of things all night for the few days that elapse before these worms get full size and descend into the ground.

Poison batts are most useful when size and descend into the ground. Poison baits are most useful when the worms are scattered, and they may be used in addition to the ditching. The bait may be prepared as follows: Sift together one pound of paris green or three-fourths of a pound of white arsenic—not arsenate of lead—and 20 pounds of bran; add half a gallon of molasses or syrup and a little water and stir in three oranges or lemons ground fine in a food chopper, skins and all. This may be broad-casted over from two to five acres of land. It is very attractive to both cut-worms and to grasshoppers. Do not try to substitute any other poison for the Paris green or white arsenic. Neither arsenate of lead nor arsenate of calcium will do the work unless very large quantities of the poison are used. Neither should one use this bait where poultry are likely to pick up much of it, although the bait should be distributed in a finely broken up condition rather than in lumps. Inquiry in regard to profiteering in this county was started in Ann Arbor Monday by Judge Sample and Presecuting Attorney Fahrner.
